Bomb threat disrupts IndiGo flight

An IndiGo flight from Delhi to Bagdogra in West Bengal carrying 222 passengers made an emergency landing at the Lucknow airport on Sunday after a handwritten note on a tissue paper bearing the words "Plane mein bomb" (bomb on the plane) was found in the aircraft, police said. The airline said that the plane was "diverted" to Lucknow after a "security threat" was detected on board. All passengers, including eight infants, and seven crew members were safely evacuated, officials said.

Assam CM leaves for Davos

Assam is set to make history on the global economic stage as Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma leaves for Davos, Switzerland, to participate in the World Economic Forum (WEF) Annual Meeting from January 19 to 23. With this visit, Sarma becomes the first Assamese Chief Minister to attend the prestigious global summit, marking a significant moment in the State's economic and diplomatic journey. The invitation to Assam, extended by the Union government, places the State alongside some of India's most industrially advanced regions at one of the world's most influential platforms for dialogue on economics, development and global cooperation.

PM paves way for new corridor in Kaziranga

GUWAHATI

Calling Kaziranga "more than a National Park — it is the soul of Assam and a priceless jewel of India's biodiversity," Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday performed the bohomi pujan of the Kaziranga Elevated Corridor Project, a major infrastructure initiative worth over Rs 6,950 crore, at Kaliabor in Nagaon district in Assam.

The project involves the four-laning of the Kaliabor-Numaligarh section of National Highway-715 and includes a 35-kilometre elevated wildlife corridor designed to allow the free movement of animals beneath the highway, while ensuring smooth and safe vehicular traffic above.

"Every visit to Assam fills me with joy," Modi said, describing the state as a land of bravery, talent and cultural richness. Referring to his participation a day earlier in the Bagurumba Dhwon festival in Guwahati, he praised the Bodo community's daughters for creating a new record with the participation of over 10,000 performers. Highlighting Kaliabor's historical significance, the Prime Minister recalled that it was from this region that Lachit Borphukan planned the strategy to defeat

'Cong handed over land to infiltrators'

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday slammed the Congress, accusing the party of handing over Assam's land to infiltrators for votes during its rule in the northeastern state.

Modi, while addressing a rally here on the second day of his visit to poll-

bound Assam, said infiltration "kept increasing" during the Congress rule in the state for decades, with illegal immigrants "encroaching upon forests, animal corridors and traditional institutions". "The BJP government is protecting Assam's identity and culture by evicting

infiltrators who encroached land," he asserted. "Infiltrators are disturbing the demographic balance, attacking culture, snatching jobs from the poor and youth, and fraudulently occupying land in tribal areas," the PM said.

the Mughal forces. He said the victory was not merely military but a symbol of Assam's pride, unity and self-confidence. From being a strategic centre during the Ahom era, Kaliabor is now emerging as a vital hub of connectivity and development, he added.

Connectivity boost with two new trains
Assam CM Himanta Biswa Sarma said the elevated corridor would reduce travel time between Upper Assam and Guwahati by at least one hour, offering relief to daily commuters, traders and tourists.

Meanwhile, the two Amrit Bharat Express trains flagged off by the Prime Minister are expected to significantly strengthen rail connectivity. The Dibrugarh-Gomti Nagar Amrit Bharat Express will cover 1,894 km in about 42 hours.

Never wished to cause pain: Rahman after remarks row

After the backlash following his recent comments on alleged "communal" bias in the Hindi film industry, noted music composer AR Rahman shared a video post on his social media on Sunday, saying "intentions can sometimes be misunderstood".

"I have never wished to cause pain, and I hope my sincerity is felt," the 59-year-old composer said in a post on his Instagram handle.

"Music has always been "the way to connect, celebrate and honour India's culture", he said, adding: "India is my inspiration, my teacher and my home. I understand that intentions can sometimes be misunderstood. But my purpose has always been to uplift, honour and serve through music," he said in the video.

TMC MP Yusuf Pathan visits killed migrant worker's home

KOLKATA

TMC MP from Murshidabad Yusuf Pathan on Sunday visited the residence of a migrant labourer from Beldanga whose unnatural death in Jharkhand earlier this week triggered mob violence in the West Bengal town and pledged his support to the victim's family.

Pathan met the parents of 30-year-old Alauddin Sheikh, whose body was found hanging at his shelter in the neighbouring state and brought to his native village in Beldanga on Friday.

"I strongly deplore the harassment and attacks on poor Bengali-speaking migrant workers from Murshidabad and other parts of Bengal

who go outside the state in search of livelihood," Pathan told reporters after meeting the family.

"Our party, Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, party national general secretary Abhishek Banerjee and other MPs and MLAs are taking up the issue with the administration of respective states. We

are also flagging the issue regularly. I am pledging my support to the victim families," he said.

Responding to opposition allegations that he had failed to visit families of migrant workers who were allegedly killed or harassed in other states, Pathan dismissed the charge as "propaganda".

Trouble erupted when police stopped the rath and palanquin of Swami Avimukteshwaranand as he was proceeding towards the



camp, where he sat on a dharma. He said he would not take a dip in the Ganga unless the administration escorted him to the site with respect.

Prayagraj District Magistrate Manish Kumar Verma said the seer had arrived in a palanquin without prior permission.

CBI summons Vijay again in stampede case

The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has issued a fresh summons to Tamila Vettiri Kazhagam (TVK) leader Vijay, directing him to appear once again in New Delhi on Monday in connection with the probe into the Karur stampede. The case relates to a political campaign held in Karur on September 27, 2025, when Vijay was campaigning for TVK. During the event, a massive crowd gathered, leading to a deadly stampede that claimed 41 lives.

2 more Naxals killed on 2nd day of Bijapur op; toll hits 6

BIJAPUR

A day after four Naxalites were killed in an encounter with security forces in Chhattisgarh's Bijapur district, two more Maoist cadres were neutralised during the same operation in the region on Sunday, said police.

The latest exchange of fire occurred in the morning in the forested hills of the district's north-western region, where a joint team of security forces has been conducting an anti-Naxalite operation, Bijapur Superintendent of Police Jitendra Yadav said.

Four Maoists were killed during the same operation on Saturday. They were identi-

fied as senior cadre Dilip Vedja, who was a divisional committee member, area committee members Madvi Kosa and Lakkhi Madkam, and party member Radha Metta.

All four were active in the National Park Area Committee of the Maoists, the SP said.

The identity of the two Maoists killed on Sunday is yet to be ascertained, he added.

Personnel from the Special Task Force (STF) and District Reserve Guard (DRG), both police units, and CobRA (Commando Battalion for Resolute Action), an elite group of the CRPF, are involved in the operation.

ously toured the area, reviewing the arrangements. Quick response teams, health department teams, and ambulance services were also fully active to deal with any emergency situation.


Devotees Applaud the Arrangements

Saadat Police's Swift Action: Two Rape Accused Arrested in Encounter Within 12 Hours, Illegal Weapons Recovered

Ghazipur: The Saadat police team of the district, in a police encounter, injured and arrested two notorious criminals involved in a rape incident within 12 hours. Two illegal .315 bore pistols, two spent cartridges, and three live cartridges were recovered from their possession. In a campaign against crime and criminals, on January 18, 2026, the Station House Officer (SHO) of Saadat, along with his team, was patrolling the area when they received information from an informant that the criminals who had committed the rape in the ruins near Saadat station were present in the police station area with the intention of committing another crime, and could be apprehended if quick action was taken. Based on this information, the SHO of Saadat and his police team attempted to surround and arrest the criminals. Near Savas Mod, seeing themselves surrounded, the criminals opened fire on the police



team with the intention of killing them. The police team, in self-defense, fired back, injuring the criminals in their legs. They were immediately sent to the CHC Saadat, Ghazipur for treatment, keeping in mind humanitarian considerations. A case has been registered regarding the police encounter and the recovery of weapons, and legal action is being taken. The encounter team/arresting police team included Station House Officer Saadat, Vagish Vikram Singh, and his team.

Farmers' Roar from the National Deliberation Camp

Letter of Demands sent to the Prime Minister, 10 Major Demands from MSP Guarantee to Loan Waiver

Prayagraj. Following a four-day national deliberation camp organized by the Bharatiya Kisan Union in Prayagraj, a detailed letter of demands concerning the problems of farmers, laborers, youth, tribals, and the unemployed has been sent to Prime Minister Narendra Modi. The camp, held from January 15 to 18, 2026, saw representatives from across the country engage in intensive discussions on issues related to agriculture, employment, labor, electricity, disaster management, and the federal structure. The letter states that farmers and laborers, considered the backbone of the country, are currently facing the deepest crisis.

If concrete decisions are not taken in time, it will directly impact the country's food security and social balance.

Demand for Legal Guarantee of MSP

The farmers' union has demanded that laws be enacted in Parliament and state assemblies to guarantee a Minimum Support Price (MSP) of 1.5 times the cost of production (C2+50%) for all crops, along with guaranteed government procurement. They have also demanded the opening of



government markets in all blocks and an increase in the moisture limit from 17 to 22 percent, considering untimely rains. A demand has also been raised to fix the State Advised Price (SAP) for sugarcane at Rs. 500 per quintal and to ensure payment of arrears with interest.

Loan Waiver and Free Electricity as Key Issues

The letter of demands includes a comprehensive loan waiver scheme for farmers and agricultural laborers, a ban on the arbitrary practices of microfinance institutions, and interest-free loans. It also demands the withdrawal of the Electricity Bill 2025, a ban on the privatization of electricity and smart meters, and free electricity for domestic consumers up to 300 units and for agri-

cultural purposes. **Emphasis on Employment, Wages, and Social Security**

The demands include the withdrawal of all four labor codes, a ban on the privatization of public sector undertakings, fixing the minimum wage at Rs. 26,000 per month, and a monthly pension of Rs. 10,000 for unorganized sector and agricultural laborers. The letter also calls for ensuring 200 days of work and a daily wage of Rs. 700 under MNREGA.

Objections to Disaster, Fertilizer, and Trade Policies

The farmers' union has demanded that the devastating floods and landslides be declared a national disaster, that a judicial inquiry be conducted by a sitting Supreme Court

judge, and that substantial compensation be provided to the disaster-affected states. They have also demanded the restoration of fertilizer subsidies, an end to the black marketing of DAP and urea, and opposed the forced imposition of nano-fertilizers. Furthermore, they have demanded the rejection of free trade agreements with the US and other countries that harm the interests of farmers and laborers. Appeal for the Protection of the Federal Structure

The charter emphasizes the protection of states' rights, demanding that the states' share in the divisible pool be increased to 60 percent, that the GST law be amended, and that public investment in the agriculture and cooperative sectors be increased.

Farmers' Union's Warning Message

Anuj Singh, the youth president of the Bharatiya Kisan Union (Indian Farmers' Union), said that if the government does not seriously consider these demands, farmers, laborers, and the youth will be forced to launch a larger movement to protect their rights. He stated that this charter is the voice of the working class of the country, which cannot be ignored.

Priyanka to Sharmila, Kanimozhi to Misa—KCR's daughter Kavitha is fighting a bigger battle

KKavitha, daughter of former Telangana chief minister K Chandrasekhar Rao, is hurting. She began her 72-hour hunger strike Monday, demanding 42 per cent reservation for backward classes in jobs, educational institutions and local bodies. Her party, the Bharat Rashta Samithi, is staying away from it. While she is being trolled and ridiculed by political rivals as also party colleagues, nobody has come to her defense. Even her brother and the party's working president, KT Rama Rao, hasn't said a word. To make matters worse, she was dropped as honorary president of the Telangana Boggu Ghani Karmika Sangham (TBGKS), a BRS-affiliated trade union. Kavitha, a BRS legislator, has accused "party insiders" of encouraging those attacking her and also questioned the silence of BRS "brothers". So, what's happening in the BRS' 'first family'? In August last year when she came out of Tihar jail on bail in the alleged liquor scam, her family was waiting for her outside. With tears in her eyes, she kissed her brother KT Rama Rao's hand. A year later, she is looking isolated and abandoned by the family. The controversy surrounding her 'letter bomb' refuses to die down. Not because her father is upset about the letter, in which she expressed disagreement with his way of functioning, but because of how her party has reacted — by virtually abandoning her. Party insiders tell me that while the father did call the daughter "three or four times", the brother has cut off all communication with her. These developments are being interpreted in political circles as a full-blown succession war between Kavitha and KTR, with cousin Harish Rao keeping his ambitions in abeyance and pledging allegiance to KTR. But it's not as simple as that. Party insiders close to the BRS first family tell me that the man behind Kavitha's current woes is not her brother. The one who triggered this storm is someone party circles are calling the 'VK Pandian of Telangana' — a reference to the former IAS officer in Odisha whose "control" over ex-CM Naveen Patnaik alienated Biju Janata Dal (BJD) leaders and eventually led to Patnaik's fall from power. In the case of the BRS' family feud, it's not an ex-IAS officer. It's a close relative and KCR's trusted confidant who, insiders say, has gained 'control' over the former CM. And it's this person that Kavitha has taken up the cudgels against. She has been hurting ever since her letter to KCR was "leaked" — a letter in which she questioned her father for being soft on the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) during his speech marking the BRS' 25th anniversary. She said this gave the impression that the BRS and BJP could work together in the future. The letter also flagged other concerns about the way her party leadership was functioning. It was 'leaked' while she was in the US visiting her elder son. Though she had sent the letter before leaving, many might find it strange that she chose to write rather than speak to her father, possibly a sign of a rift. The fact, however, is that she has been writing hand-written letters — not emails, which KCR doesn't use — for years. The usual practice was that she would hand over a letter during a meeting, which he would read and respond to later. This time, Kavitha sent the letter through her mother, as she was sick and didn't want to risk infecting her elderly father. But when the letter surfaced just before her return to India, she was furious. She apparently saw a pattern — and a familiar hand, someone she always suspected of working against her. Party insiders say she suspects her cousin Jogenapally Santhosh Kumar to be behind the leak. Santhosh is her mother Shobha's sister's son, who is like KCR's "nurse and PA" who stays with him 24x7, taking care of him — much like Pandian did with Patnaik. KCR has given him untrammelled clout.



India sees the value of US defence ties, but MAGA-style tariffs threaten long-term stability

India's defence relationship with the US has been maturing over the last decade — from cautious engagement to structured partnerships, driven by shared strategic interest. What was once a purely transactional partnership, a buyer/seller relationship involving specific procurement contracts, has now assumed a pivotal role in the global geopolitical calculus. However, this evolving alliance is under stress, especially in light of President Donald Trump's sudden imposition of a 25 percent tariff on Indian exports, with additional as yet unspecified 'penalties' for importing oil from Russia. Yet even as economic ties fray, the depth of security cooperation, and the numerous formal agreements that sustain it, offers India both an opportunity and a challenge. The key question is whether India can deepen its defence cooperation with the US, without ceding its strategic autonomy or aligning it with shifting political agendas. At the heart of India-US defence ties lies an architecture of agreements, joint exercises, and co-development initiatives that extend well beyond symbolism. The signing of foundational accords such as COMCASA (Communications Compatibility and Security Agreement), BECA (Basic Exchange and Cooperation Agreement), and the Industrial Security Annex have facilitated real-time intelligence sharing, logistical interoperability, and protected access to cutting-edge military technology. These treaties, once perceived as

intrusive or incompatible with India's traditional non-alignment posture, are now actively deployed to bolster maritime surveillance, domain awareness, and air defence capabilities. Operational collaboration has also deepened. India's acquisition of MQ-9B Predator drones, MH-60R multi-role naval helicopters, and the proposed co-production of GE-414 engines for indigenous fighter jets signal not just defence modernisation, but also a convergence in regional threat assessments, especially vis-à-vis China's assertive posture in the Indo-Pacific. Initiatives such as INDUS-X and iCET are moving beyond procurement to include co-development, startup incubation, and collaborative research in emerging technologies like Artificial Intelligence (AI), Quantum Computing (QC), and Autonomous Weapons Systems (AWS). These engagements point to a long-term strategic partnership rather than short-term expediency. However, there is a fly in the ointment. The July 30 announcement of 25 percent US tariffs on Indian exports, couched vaguely in terms of India's ongoing

defence and energy cooperation with Russia, reveals a recurring dilemma: how stable and reliable is US strategic posture and unconditional support when tested by domestic political imperatives or ideological shifts like MAGA? The tariffs, affecting nearly three-quarters of India's exports, suggest that economic retaliation may be used as a convenient foreign policy tool for strategic coercion. That the current proposed tariffs were triggered not by any rupture in defence ties, but by dissatisfaction over India's continued import of Russian oil and military platforms, underscores the complexity of American reliability. This tension exposes the somewhat hypocritical duality of US diplomacy, in that it seeks convergence on strategic goals while retaining coercive tools to enforce alignment. For India, such moves raise critical questions and strike at the heart of its policy of strategic autonomy. Can the US-India defence partnership flourish in an environment where India's broader economic or foreign policy decisions invite punitive countermeasures? Will access to US platforms and supply chains be withdrawn

or restricted, especially in times of conflict, if India continues to pursue a multi-pronged foreign policy that includes countries like Russia and Iran, which the US views as enemies? The answer probably lies in separating the institutional depth of security cooperation from the dynamic volatility arising out of political posturing. Unlike trade, which is often driven by electoral considerations and domestic imperatives like MAGA, defence collaboration is sustained by bureaucratic processes, institutional memory, and mutual threat recognition. The US Defence and State Departments, and India's Ministries of Defence and External Affairs, operate on longer timelines and are often shielded, though not immune, from the ups and downs arising out of political turnarounds. For example, platforms like the Reciprocal Defence Procurement (RDP), offset clauses, and co-development agreements are more likely to endure and evolve, perhaps with some tweaks, than suffer abrupt reversals. The 2+2 dialogue has endured many political hiccups. The MEA's statement — "This partnership has weathered several transitions and challenges" — reflects the long-term nature of the relationship. India's recent strategic decisions suggest a pragmatic reading of this duality. While defence cooperation with the US has accelerated, India continues to diversify its military suppliers, including France (Rafale jets), Israel (missile defence), and Russia (S-400 systems).

This hedging reflects India's understanding that a strategic partnership does not mean strategic dependence. The refusal to proceed with the proposed F-35 acquisition, despite its symbolic value, signals India's intent to avoid politically sensitive purchases that may jeopardise its diplomatic flexibility or trigger regional escalations. At the same time, India could astutely use its defence commitments as a bargaining tool. By advertising possible future purchases — from Predator drones and GE-414 engines to naval platforms — as strategic inducements, India has levers to secure tariff concessions, obtain market access, and reduce regulatory barriers in trade negotiations with the US. The trade-off is clear. Defence offsets, which require US firms to invest a portion of contract value in India, can be portrayed domestically in the US as job-creating and strategically aligned, softening opposition to trade waivers or procurement reciprocity. Yet this 'carrot' strategy can only go so far. US negotiators remain dissatisfied with India's high tariffs on agriculture, digital localisation policies, and resistance to GM crops, which are seen as barriers to open trade. Even if India were to boost its defence purchases from the US, these unresolved economic grievances will persist. More critically, India's energy and defence ties with Russia and its refusal to adhere to US-driven sanctions create minefields that defence collaboration alone may not be able to navigate.

Geopolitical forces beyond New Delhi's control are at play in Trump's approach to India

US President Donald Trump reigned in trade tensions with India on 30 July, accusing it of imposing "far too high" tariffs and threatening a 25 per cent levy starting 1 August. Despite ongoing efforts toward a mini trade deal and a \$500 billion trade target by 2030, Trump's obsession with trade reciprocity and a "messianic" zeal to correct any trade imbalance overnight with partner countries, looms large over the relationship. He also criticised India's defense and oil ties with Russia, hinting at potential penalties. Still, in typical Trump fashion, he later softened his stance, saying India was now willing to reduce tariffs "very substantially," adding, "We're talking to India now — we'll see what happens." That Trump is displeased with a number of allies and partners has almost become a constant fixture in his second term, and India does not enjoy any special privilege. So, there are two ways of looking at the current spat and the low point in the India-US partnership. First, there is a broader geopol-

itics reshaping Trump's almost pretzelian foreign policy twists. Second, a painful road awaits as Washington-New Delhi negotiations over a mini trade deal whose terms and conditions will remain uncertain, and even if agreed upon, will remain largely ad hoc and piecemeal. Behind Trump's fresh round of rants and wrath aimed at India lies a broader geopolitical curve in Trump's foreign and national security policy. In Trump's first as well second terms, his positive vibe towards President Vladimir Putin of Russia, otherwise an eyesore for America's western allies, has been relatively more welcomed in India. Compared to the Biden presidency, which was crystal clear on confronting Russia and supporting Ukraine sans conditions, the Trump presidency was more forthcoming on talking to Moscow and more circumscribed in its support for Ukraine. However, of late, amid dwindling prospects of a peace deal with Putin, Trump has taken a U-turn in his approach to the Russia-Ukraine war.

Trump tariff forces India to shed illusion. Stop conflating status with power

India now faces what can be best described as the Trump pill — a bracing dose of transactional geopolitics and neo-mercantilist tariffs that upend the diplomatic comfort of the past decade. With sweeping 25 per cent tariffs targeting Indian exports, our longstanding belief in strategic autonomy and global goodwill is being challenged by the brutal arithmetic of trade imbalances and national interests. This isn't just a policy shift; it's a call to recalibrate how India positions itself economically and diplomatically in a world now shaped by profit-first diplomacy. The newly announced tariffs by the Trump administration pose a direct threat to India's export competitiveness. Sectors such as electronics, smartphones, automobile parts, and gemstones will be hit hardest. Comparatively, Vietnam faces only 20 per cent tariffs, and economies like Indonesia enjoy relatively lighter penalties. While pharmaceutical products, semiconductors, and critical rare earths remain exempt for now, there is a growing uncertainty about India's continued access to these carve-outs, particularly as Trump intensifies his focus on bilateral trade "wins." Further compounding this threat is the ambiguity around secondary sanctions tied to India's oil imports from Russia. A punitive surcharge, conveyed repeatedly but not yet formalised, could be crippling. As we shall see, this issue is not merely economic — it strikes at the heart of India's strategic alignment. The stakes for India are high. Without a trade deal with the United States, economic ramifications could be severe. Capital flows may dry up, leading to a weakening rupee. Stock markets are already reflecting investor nervousness, and early estimates suggest India's GDP could suffer a 0.2-0.5 per cent contraction. Unlike Brazil,

Do Chola kings represent a culturally united Hindu India? It's a modern fantasy

History has rarely been away from the headlines over the last few weeks, whether through the rewriting of NCERT textbooks or PM Modi's tribute to the Chola dynasty of medieval South India. The coming month will see the millennial celebrations of the 11th-century Chola emperor Rajendra I, specifically of his conquests in Southeast Asia. There is a loud chorus, at least on social media, that the Cholas—and South India in general—haven't gotten their due in the national historical imagina-

tion. But there's more going on than meets the eye. The fact is that celebrating the conquests of the Cholas misses the woods for the trees. Rather than encourage a deeper understanding of regional histories, we are instead forcing a remarkable medieval society into today's culture wars. To understand the recent political bonanza about the Cholas, first we need to understand what they've left behind—and the many ways in which we've understood this over the decades. Most of what we

know about the Cholas derives from donative inscriptions that adorn the walls of medieval Tamil temples. Interestingly, most Chola-period donative inscriptions were not commissioned by the Chola court, but a broad, shifting spectrum of Tamil-speaking society.

Through these inscriptions, we can see broad social trends. As historians Noboru Karashima, Y Subbarayalu, and James Heitzman have shown, most temple affairs—and, by extension, village affairs—depended on local collectives,

rather than royal officials. These might be collectives of Vellala cultivator families, or Brahmin landlords, or merchants. These collectives, as we'll see soon, were not mute recipients of royal commandments. Temple donors were fairly diverse in the early 10th century (when the Chola dynasty was rising), sometimes including shepherds and washer-people. Over time, temple activities were steadily taken over by men of elite martial or landed backgrounds, often linked to the Chola court.

India wants Rs 3 lakh cr in defense manufacturing

Delhi: The government wants to produce Rs 3 lakh crore in defence by 2029, strengthening India's standing as a global powerhouse. Now, 65% of defense equipment is made locally, up from 65-70% import dependency. According to the Ministry of Defence, 16 DPSUs, over 430 licensed enterprises, and 16,000 MSMEs boost indigenous production capabilities. "The private sector contributes 21% to total defence production, fostering innovation and efficiency," it said. The government wants to expand defence exports to Rs 50,000 crore by 2029, strengthening India's position as a global manufacturing hub and supporting economic growth. Defence exports rose 32.5% to Rs 21,083 crore in FY 2023-24 from Rs 15,920 crore in FY 2022-23. Indian defence exports increased 21 times from Rs 4,312 crore in



2004-14 to Rs 88,319 crore in 2014-24, demonstrating its growing involvement in the global security sector. India exports defense equipment to over 100 nations, with the US, France, and Armenia buying most in 2023-24. In 2024-25, the Ministry of Defence signed a record 193 contracts worth Rs 2,09,050 crore, nearly doubling the previous record.

These include 177 contracts, 92% awarded to the domestic industry for Rs 1,68,922 crore, 81% of the overall contract value. This emphasis on indigenous manufacture supports defence production self-reliance.

Centre will borrow 8L cr, 54% of the objective

The government plans to borrow Rs 8 lakh crore, 54% of its Rs 14.8 lakh crore FY26 borrowing, in the first half. It didn't front-load the borrowing program to avoid raising rates while the RBI pumped record liquidity into the system. Since the market reported little demand for 30-year and longer bonds, the government announced it would borrow less in FY26. Thus, front-loading of the borrowing program has been avoided due to government (fiscal consolidation without compromising quality of expenditure).

Kotak highlights the risk in the lending business strategy

Delhi: Veteran banker Uday Kotak has expressed worries about the banks' business model, pointing out the shrinking gap between deposit and lending rates, ahead of an anticipated rate decrease by the RBI, despite the fact that liquidity is still limited. According to Kotak, leading banks are increasing one-year wholesale deposits by about 8%, which, when accounting for CRR, SLR, deposit insurance, and priority sector lending requirements (but not operational costs), results in a marginal deposit cost of more than 9%. The system as a whole has restrained



growth in low-cost retail deposits (CASA non-wholesale). However, banks are offering home loans at a variable rate of 8.5%. Take out a loan at 8.5% and borrow at 9%, Spread is negative by 0.5%. Additionally, repo rates are probably going to decline. Kotak warned that if the tight deposit situation continues, it may make it difficult for banks to maintain their

business model and asked how they would handle credit and operational expenses. The majority of banks are required to connect their retail floating rate loans to the repo rate. The remarks coincided with a sharp decline in bond yields as investors awaited the RBI's next liquidity injection before its monetary policy committee's decision.

Cabinet approves electronic component program

Delhi: The Union Cabinet approved a six-year Rs 22,919 crore incentive program for electronic component manufacture. The initiative seeks to increase India's domestic value addition and global value chain participation. The Indian Express originally revealed that the government was developing the system, its costs, and its details. The government wants at least 91,600 direct jobs from the scheme and has tied participating firms' annual payments to job creation. Rs 4.56 lakh crore in production and Rs 59,350 crore in investment are envisaged from the scheme. The government wants to target display modules, sub-assembly camera modules,



printed circuit board assemblies, lithium cell enclosures, resistors, capacitors, and ferrites. These are utilized in cell-phones, laptops, microwave ovens, refrigerators, and toasters. "This scheme will reduce component imports. We must

abandon import substitution and promote exports. After mass production, viability follows. Union IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said electronics production is \$120 billion and hopes to reach \$500 billion in the next years.

Gautam Adani Is India's Biggest Wealth Gainer

Delhi: According to the 'Hurun Global Rich List 2025', Gautam Adani, Adani Group Chairman, is India's greatest wealth gainer, increasing his net worth by approximately Rs 1 lakh crore. The ranking showed Adani's fortune rising 13%. Second-richest Indian on the global list, his total is Rs 8.4 lakh crore. Meanwhile, Indian billionaire Mukesh Ambani fell off the top 10 richest list. However, he leads Asia. The Hurun list ranks India third in billionaires. Tesla-SpaceX CEO Elon Musk tops Hurun Global Rich List 2025. India has 284 billionaires, 13 more than previous year.

Airtel prepaid 5,985 crore spectrum dues but stock remains unchanged



Israel to ban dozens of aid agencies from Gaza

TEL AVIV

Israel has announced it will stop dozens of aid organisations working in Gaza within 36 hours for failing to meet stringent new requirements to hand over personal details of Palestinian and international staff deployed in the devastated territory, 'The Guardian' reported.

The list of groups hit by the ban include some of the world's best known humanitarian organisations such as ActionAid, International Rescue Committee and Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF).

Tuesday's announcement by the ministry of diaspora affairs comes amid recent fierce storms, which destroyed thousands of tents in Gaza, exacerbating an already acute humanitarian crisis.

Foreign ministers of 10 nations expressed "serious concerns" about "renewed deterioration of the humanitarian situation" in the devastated territory, saying the situation was "catastrophic".

"As winter draws in, civilians in Gaza are facing appalling conditions with heavy rainfall and temperatures dropping," the ministers of Britain, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Iceland, Japan, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland said in a joint statement released by the UK's Foreign Office.

The statement added, "1.3 million people still require urgent shelter support. More than half of health facilities are

only partially functional and face shortages of essential medical equipment and supplies. The total collapse of sanitation infrastructure has left 74,000 people vulnerable to toxic flooding."

The ministers called for the UN and its partners to continue their work in Gaza, and for the lifting of "unreasonable [Israeli] restrictions on imports considered to have a dual use". Hundreds of items have been blocked by Israel from

"Bureaucratic customs processes and extensive screenings are causing delays, while commercial cargo is being allowed in freely," the statement said.



Granddaughter of JFK no more

Tatiana Schlossberg, the granddaughter of former US President John F Kennedy, has died at 35. Her family announced her death in a social media post shared by the John F Kennedy Library Foundation, writing: "Our beautiful Tatiana passed away this morning. She will always be in our hearts."

In November, Schlossberg, a climate journalist, announced her diagnosis of an aggressive form of cancer. She said in an essay she had been given less than a year to live.

Schlossberg was the daughter of designer Edwin Schlossberg and diplomat Caroline Kennedy, and is survived by her husband George Moran and their children, Edwin, 3, and Josephine, 1.

In a 'New Yorker' article 'A Battle With My Blood' last month, Schlossberg revealed she had been diagnosed with acute myeloid leukaemia in May 2024, after giving birth to her second child.

Hadi murder suspect in Dubai

Dhaka: In the Bangladeshi student leader Osman Hadi's murder case, prime accused Faisal Karim Masud has denied any role, claiming he was in Dubai, contradicting Bangladesh police's allegations about his presence in India, reports said. In a viral video (veracity was not verified), Masud said he did not kill Hadi, claiming a radical political group was involved.

Masud accepted he went to Hadi's office before the shooting but insisted his relations with Inqilab Moncho spokesperson was business related. The video has sparked fresh debate and uncertainty over what really happened.

"I am Faisal Karim Masud. I want to state I am not involved in the murder of Hadi in any

way. This case is completely false and based on a fabricated conspiracy," Masud said.

"Because of this false implication, I was forced to flee the country and come to Dubai. I came here with great difficulty, though I held a valid 5-year Dubai visa," he added.

He claimed his family was being falsely implicated and is being severely harassed and tortured, despite being completely innocent. "They have no involvement whatsoever.

This kind of inhumane treatment of my family is unjust and unacceptable. I strongly protest against it," he said.

About ties with Hadi, Masud said, "Yes, I did go to Hadi's office. I am a businessman; I own an IT firm. I was previously employed at ministry

of finance. I went to meet Hadi about a job. He promised to arrange it and asked for an advance payment."

"Accordingly, I gave him 500,000 taka. He asked me to donate to his programmes, and I provided funds whenever he requested. Last Friday, I gave him money for one of his programmes," he added.

Masud accused Jamaat of Hadi's murder, saying, the student leader was "a product of Jamaat" and he was killed by "Jamaat elements". "This incident is the work of Jamaat. Neither I nor my younger brother was on that motorcycle, and we have been deliberately framed. My family is suffering unjustly. This level of harassment is disturbing and unacceptable."

France to ban social media for U-15s

PARIS

The French government on Wednesday said it would ban social media for children Under-15. If the bill is passed, France would be one of the first democracies to do so.

The bill, scheduled to be presented in Parliament in January, and, if passed, to be enforced in September 2026, is a two-fold initiative. The law will ban social media sites from serving anyone under 15, in addition to enforcing the long-standing prohibition on mobile phone usage in high schools. The proposal follows Australia's decision to prevent its young citizens from accessing social networking sites, which has stirred a controversy over the use of social media and its impact on mental health.

According to **President Emmanuel Macron** and his cabinet, the law is intended to ensure "appropriate

measures are put in place to protect youngsters from inappropriate content, bullying, and sleep disturbances that have become distressingly frequent in adolescents."

There is increasing evidence, over the past decade, of the consequences of excessive social media exposure on the health and well-being of adolescents and also adults. There is mounting research evidence in Europe, the US, Australia, and Asia of increasing levels of teenagers suf-

fering from anxiety, body image disturbances and self-harm.

The implementation of the ban is not going to be easy. According to teachers' unions, the use of phones, although banned in middle schools, is not implemented consistently. High schools are expected to be more problematic, since students are older and independent.

"We do not have the human and technical capacity to implement it," said Jean-Rémi Girard, head of National Office of High School, Middle School, Primary Schools, and Higher Education (SNALC). Whether the policy is right is no longer the question, the challenge is to make it practical.

Notably, under-16s in Australia were banned from using major social media sites, including Tiktok, X, Facebook, Instagram, YouTube, Snapchat and Threads on December 10. The ban is the first of its kind and was being watched closely by other countries.

Jailed Lai's teeth rotting, fingernails falling off: Daughter

The daughter of **Jimmy Lai**, the pro-democracy tycoon jailed in Hong Kong, has expressed concerns about her father's deteriorating health in prison, saying his fingernails "sometimes fall off" and his teeth are rotting.

Lai, 78, has been detained since December 2020 and faces life in prison. Earlier this month he was convicted of colluding with foreign forces under the city's controversial national security law.

Hong Kong and Chinese authorities have denied that Lai has been mistreated in prison, saying he is in "good health". The BBC has seen a letter written by Lai's family urging UK PM Keir Starmer to release Lai's release when he meets Chinese President Xi Jinping next month.

His daughter Claire Lai, who's in exile in London, said she fears she "may never see



him again". "Of course I worry that my father is going to be a martyr, and I don't want him to be a martyr. But I would not be here today. I would not be speaking out if I didn't think this was his best chance of reuniting with our family."

"He is diabetic, he has heart issues which he never had in the past. He has fingernails that turn purplish grey and sometimes fall off. He has teeth that are rotting. He has back and waist pains. Some days it's painful for him to stand. Sometimes he can't stand. And some days he can't even get out of bed," she said.

Isiah Whitlock Jr, 'The Wire' and 'Veep' actor, dies at 71

Isiah Whitlock Jr, known for his memorable acting roles on 'The Wire' and 'Veep', has died at the age of 71, according to his manager. "It is with tremendous sadness I share the passing of my dear friend and client Isiah Whitlock Jr," manager Brian Liebman wrote on Instagram.

Whitlock, who also featured in 'Goodfellas' and 'The Chappelle Show', was a long-time collaborator with director Spike Lee, who also shared a heartfelt tribute to him.

"Today I learned of the passing of my dear beloved brother Isiah Whitlock. God bless," Lee wrote, alongside a photo of the two men shaking hands. "If you knew him — you loved him. A brilliant actor and even better person," Liebman wrote.

In statements to Hollywood news outlets, he added Whitlock passed away in New York after a short illness.

UKRAINIAN UAV ATTACK ON PUTIN'S RESIDENCE

Russia releases video proof

MOSCOW



Russia on Wednesday published video proof of its claims, showing a downed drone it said was launched by Ukraine at President Vladimir Putin's residence in the northwest.

The video, released by Russia's defence ministry, shows the damaged drone lying in snow. It described the incident as a "targeted, carefully planned" attack that had been carried out in stages".

Officials said the UAV was part of a mass drone launch aimed at Putin's residence. They claimed the home was not damaged, and Putin's whereabouts at the time were not revealed.

Moscow called the alleged drone attack a "terrorist act" and a "personal attack" on Putin. In response, Russia said

it would harden its stance in peace talks concerning the Ukraine war. The US-based Institute for the Study of War expressed scepticism over Russia's claims, saying there was no supporting footage or evidence associated with deep strikes from Ukrainian forces to back up the assertion Putin's house had been targeted.

**Sabalenka, Alcaraz advance on opening day at Aus Open**

Venus, oldest player, loses her first round match

MELBOURNE

Aryna Sabalenka and Carlos Alcaraz fulfilled expectations on opening night of the Australian Open, the No. 1 seeds advancing in straight sets in a Sunday session that started with tennis royalty Rod Laver and Roger Federer in the crowd.

Rod Laver Arena was heaving for their first-round matches, capping a day when a record total of 100,763 fans packed into Melbourne Park.

The 45-year-old Venus Williams set a record, too, becoming the oldest player ever in the women's singles draw at the Australian Open.

Out on John Cain Arena, the so-called People's Court because it's open to fans with ground passes, Williams was up two service breaks at 4-0 in the third set before Olga Danilovic rallied to win six straight games in a 6-7 (5), 6-3, 6-4 victory.

The seven-time major winner, playing on a wild-card entry in the singles in just her second major since returning to the tour last year,

plans to continue in doubles. "I'm really proud of my effort today because I'm playing better with each match, getting to the places that I want to get to," she said. "Right now I'm just going to have to keep going forward and working on myself." Sabalenka fended off left-handed wild-card entry Tiantsoa Rakotomanga Rajaonah, 6-4, 6-1 after dropping the opening service game.

"I didn't start my best. She showed up. Fired on. She was playing great," said Sabalenka,

who won the Australian title in 2023 and '24 and was runner-up last year. "It was a tricky start."

Sabalenka prepared for the first major of the season with a title in Brisbane but was a little more nervous than usual because Laver, the Australian great, and 20-time major winner Federer were watching. "I'm a huge fan. I wanted to show great tennis so you guys enjoyed watching me play," she said. "There was definitely a lot of pressure. I was walking, thinking don't look there, don't look there!"
