Court acquits Patkar in 20-yr-old case

A Delhi court on Saturday acquitted activist Medha Patkar in a 20-year-old criminal defamation case filed by Delhi LG VK Saxena. Judicial Magistrate Raghav Sharma ruled that Saxena failed to prove "beyond reasonable doubt" that Patkar made defamatory remarks during a 2006 television broadcast. Saxena, then heading an NGO, alleged Patkar falsely accused him of receiving Sardar Sarovar Nigam contracts. Originally filed in Ahmedabad and transferred to Delhi in 2010, the court concluded the prosecution did not establish the offence under Section 500 of the IPC, ending two decades of litigation.

Sex CD case: Baghel faces fresh trial

A Special CBI Court in Raipur has reversed a 2024 order that discharged former Chhattisgarh Chief Minister Bhupesh Baghel in the 2017 sex CD case. The court also rejected appeals from co-accused Vinod Verma, Kailash Murarka, and Vijay Bhatia, upholding the charges against them. The case involves a controversial video allegedly targeting then-minister Rajesh Munat. Originally arrested for extortion and defamation, Baghel and journalist Vinod Verma were accused of circulating the "doctored" content. Following a CBI probe, the special court's ruling brings the veteran Congress leader back under trial.

Arson sparks fresh political rift in Ballari

The political rivalry in Ballari intensified Friday night after a model house owned by former minister Gali Janardhan Reddy was set ablaze. While police attributed the fire to a "reels-related" dispute among eight detained youths, Reddy and the BJP dismissed the claim, demanding a CBI inquiry. Reddy alleged the vandalism was orchestrated by Congress MLA Bharath Reddy, citing previous threats and January's violent clash that killed a Congress worker. Opposition leaders R. Ashok and Chalavadi Narayanaswamy accused the government of shielding the MLA and sponsoring local violence. As Janardhan Reddy consolidates his influence following a court-ordered return to the district, the incident signals a dangerous resurgence of Ballari's factional wars, fueled by a long history of mining-related political conflict.

Will raise internal issues with leadership: Tharoor

Congress MP Shashi Tharoor on Saturday said he has some "issues" with the party which he would take up with the leadership, and asserted that he has never violated the organisation's stated positions in the Parliament.

Any internal differences should be discussed within the organisation and not through the media, he said.

His remarks come amid reports that Tharoor is upset over Congress leader Rahul Gandhi not adequately acknowledging his presence at a recent event in Kochi and over alleged repeated attempts by state party leaders to sideline him.

"All I can say is that there are issues which I need to take up with my own party leadership and not in a public forum. I will be going to Delhi for Parliament and I will get an opportunity, I believe, to make my concerns very clear to the party leadership and get their viewpoint, have a proper conversation."

"I am in Congress for the past 17 years. Let's not go too far. As far as I am concerned, whatever has gone wrong, needs to be addressed and it

'I will remain unapologetic on Op Sindoos stance'

Kozhikode: Congress leader Shashi Tharoor on Saturday said that there has been only one instance of "public disagreement on principle," with the party, which occurred after the Pahalgam terror attack and the response with Operation Sindoos, for which he remains unapologetic. "After the terror attack, which killed 26 people, the Congress leader had said that the act "cannot go unpunished, there has to be a kinetic response. I have at no stage violated any of the Congress' positions in Parliament; the only issue on which there has been public disagreement on principle is about Operation Sindoos, where I did take a very strong stand, and I remain unapologetic about that," Tharoor said.

Speaking to reporters here, the Thiruvananthapuram MP said he had informed the

Congress leadership about his inability to attend a party meeting. He said that some reports about him might be true, while others could be false. Tharoor explained that he wanted to attend a literature festival and that continuous travel was difficult.

"However, I will certainly attend all party activities in Parliament, and at that time I can meet the party leadership," he said.

Responding to a question on alleged unfair treatment at a party event in Kochi, Tharoor said he would not comment on it.

He also said that he wanted to exhibit his book on Sree Narayana Guru at the literature festival.

Earlier, answering questions during a session at the Kerala Literature Festival here, Tharoor said he had taken a strong stand on Operation Sindoos and remained "unapologetic" about it.

Explaining his position, Tharoor said that as an observer, commentator and writer, he had written a newspaper column after the Pahalgam terror attack, stating that it should not go unpunished and that there should be a kinetic response.

Government calls all-party meet ahead of Budget Session

NEW DELHI

Ahead of the Budget Session of Parliament, the government has called an all-party meeting on January 27 to discuss the legislative and other agendas.

The Budget Session will begin on January 28, with President Draupadi Murmu's address to the joint sitting of Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha.

In a rare occasion in parliamentary history, the Union budget would be presented on February 1, which is a Sunday. This will be Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's ninth consecutive budget.

The all-party meeting, convened by Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju, will be held at the main committee room of Parliament House annex at 11 am on January 27," a government source said.

The Budget Session will continue till April 2. The first phase will conclude on February 13, with Parliament reassembling on March 9.

The session comes at a time when the opposition Congress is conducting a nationwide campaign against the Viksit Bharat-Guarantee for Rozgar and Ajeevika Mission (Gramin) Act, which replaces the UPA-era Mahatma Gandhi National Employment Guarantee Act.

ISRO chief: PSLV failure won't affect Gaganyaan timeline

Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) chairman V Narayanan on Saturday denied any possibility of delay in the Gaganyaan mission following the failure of the PSLV rocket mission earlier this month.

The ISRO chief said that the organisation is currently studying the cause of PSLV mission failure, and called it an individual mission which would not affect the progress of the Gaganyaan mission.

"These two are independent programs, and it (failure of PSLV) will not have any impact. The investigation is ongoing," V Narayanan told ANI.

On January 12, the Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle (PSLV)-C62 mission carrying the 'Anvesha' / EOS-N1 satellite

and 15 co-passenger satellites launched by India

encountered an anomaly during the end of the PS3 burn stage, with ISRO chairman V Narayanan stating that "a deviation in the vehicle's flight path" was observed.

"A detailed analysis has been initiated," the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) posted on X.

ISRO Chairman V Narayanan said a disturbance was observed in the vehicle at the end of the third stage, which was otherwise proceeding as expected.

"Today, we have attempted

the PSLV C62 / EOS - N1 Mission. The PSLV vehicle is a four-stage vehicle with two solid stages and two liquid stages. The vehicle's performance near the end of the third stage was as expected. (However), near the end of the third stage, we are seeing increased disturbance in the vehicle. Subsequently, a deviation in the vehicle's flight path is observed. We are analysing the data and will come back at the earliest," Narayanan said.

This was ISRO's first major launch of 2026. The mission aimed to place an Earth observation satellite into orbit from the First Launch Pad (FLP) at Sriharikota.

The mission was carried out by New Space India Limited and represents the ninth dedicated commercial mission to build and launch an Earth Observation satellite.

Congress slams BJP govt over transfer of Sambhal CJM

New Delhi: The Congress slammed the BJP-led government on Saturday over the transfer of Sambhal Chief Judicial Magistrate Vibhanshu Sudheer, who had directed that an FIR be lodged against police personnel in connection with the Sambhal violence, and alleged that this is not an administrative move but a "direct assault on judicial independence".

The opposition party urged the Supreme Court and the Allahabad High Court to take suo-moto (on its own) cognisance of the "arbitrary and deeply-troubling transfer" of Sudheer.

Congress' media and publicity department head Pawan Khera said timely judicial intervention is essential to uphold the rule of law.

Vande Bharat veg-only menu sparks regional cultural row

IndiGo vacates 717 slots after DGCA curbs flights

MUMBAI

IndiGo has vacated 717 slots at domestic airports after aviation watchdog DGCA curtailed the airline's winter schedule by 10 per cent following major operational disruptions in early December, sources said.

Of the 717 slots, 364 are from

six metro airports: Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai, Kolkata, Bengaluru and Hyderabad. Most of the vacated slots among these cities are from Hyderabad and Bengaluru, the sources added.

Data shared by the sources show that the vacant slots are spread over the January to March period. As many as 361 slots have been vacated for

March, compared to 43 for February, while 361 slots have been vacated for January.

Against this backdrop, the civil aviation ministry on Thursday asked other airlines to submit their requests for operating domestic flights on the vacated slots.

"IndiGo has submitted a list of 717 slots to the ministry, which it has vacated after the

domestic winter schedule was reduced by 10 per cent in early December last year," one of the sources said.

The airline generally operates over 2,200 flights daily, trimmed services following the DGCA directive.

Meanwhile, Air India will operate its newly inducted Boeing 787 Dreamliner with certain limitations as

Karan Adani, MD of Adani Ports and Special Economic Zone Ltd (APSEZ) which manages the Vizhinjam port, on Saturday said the company will be investing a cumulative Rs 30,000 crore in the development of the seaport. Along with the additional investment of Rs 16,000 crore under phase 2 and a cumulative commitment of Rs 30,000 crore, the port's capacity will be increased from 1 million Twenty lakh equivalent units (TEUs) to 5.7 million TEUs by 2029, he noted.

India's tax-to-GDP ratio mirrors major global economies: Report

NEW DELHI

India's combined tax-to-GDP ratio, accounting for both central and state collections, currently stands at 19.6 per cent, positioning the country at par with several major global economies. While the central gross tax revenue remains lower at 11.7 per cent, the integrated figure exceeds those of other emerging markets such as Hong Kong, Malaysia, and Indonesia. However, the ratio still lags behind advanced economies like Germany and the United States, which report ratios of 38 per cent and 25.6 per cent, respectively.

A report from Bank of



Baroda highlights that this gap represents a significant policy opportunity, as India possesses larger potential due to favourable demographics. The report notes that more efforts are being directed towards holistic tax reforms, including simplification, rationalisation, and digitisation, with signs of improving tax-to-GDP ratio in the near term.


said that making the youth self-reliant and providing them with employment is the top priority of the central government. Such employment fairs are an effective means of providing opportunities to the youth.

Revamp anganwadi model for Viksit Bharat. Workers should be seen as frontline educators

Integrated Child Development Services Scheme – the Anganwadi Services Scheme was launched in 1975 as an innovative experiment to address maternal and child health, nutrition, and early childhood development. Aligned with the objectives to improve children's health, nutrition, and development, reduce mortality, morbidity, and dropout rates, and empower mothers through counselling, the ICDS framework is designed to nurture holistic development. Through a lifecycle approach, it targets children aged 0-6 years, pregnant and lactating mothers, and adolescent girls, delivering supplementary nutrition, immunisations, health check-ups, non-formal pre-school education, and nutrition counselling. Anganwadi Centres (AWCs) are the focal points for delivering ICDS services, and Anganwadi workers (AWWs) and helpers are the fulcrum of rendering these vital services through AWCs and home visits. Today, through a strong network of more than 1.4 million Anganwadi centres (AWCs) covering 100 million particularly vulnerable mothers and children, ICDS has emerged as the largest service delivery program for mother care and child development. As ICDS celebrates 50 years this year, it presents a valuable opportunity to celebrate its achievements, reflect on the gaps and challenges, and propose a way forward to align with the futuristic needs of Viksit Bharat. Since this launch, ICDS boasts a robust framework that enables it to adapt and evolve meaningfully in the future. Its evolution to currently Saksham Anganwadi & Poshan 2.0, combines schemes Poshan Abhiyaan, Scheme for Adolescent Girls, and Poshan Bhi, Padhai Bhi, emphasising holistic development and real-time monitoring. Today, all AWCs and over 101 million beneficiaries are registered on the Poshan Tracker, enabling real time tracking of service delivery and outcomes. Over the years, ICDS has played a crucial role in equitably addressing malnutrition, early childhood care, and maternal health across India. India is moving in the right direction toward achieving the SDG 2030 targets for maternal and child mortality. Research has demonstrated that early childhood interventions targeting nutrition, education, and health can substantially enhance human capital, especially in developing countries. An IFPRI study published in the Bulletin of the World Health Organisation highlighted improvements in both equity and coverage of ICDS from 2006 to 2016, with increased service utilisation (58 per cent to 71 per cent), especially among Scheduled Castes and Tribes. Another study examining the linkages between utilisation of ICDS and underweight among children aged 6-59 months from 2015-16 to 2019-21, attributed improvements in ICDS utilisation to 9-12 per cent of the observed reduction in underweight children. A peer-reviewed study in The University of Chicago Press Journals found that children who were exposed to ICDS during the first three years of life completed 0.1-0.3 more grades of schooling than those who were not. As India advances towards Viksit Bharat, ICDS must not only strengthen its existing interventions but also embrace transformative paradigm shifts to effectively address emerging challenges, harness new opportunities, and align with the evolving aspirations of society. Firstly, the pace of improvement in nutrition needs to be accelerated. Malnutrition rates remain high – stunting among children under five is 36 per cent, underweight at 32.1 per cent, and anaemia prevalence at 67 per cent, especially in comparison to global benchmarks. Sub-optimal Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) practices, where only 42 per cent of infants are breastfed within the first hour, and only 11 per cent of children aged 6-23 months receive an adequate diet. Anaemia among pregnant women (52 per cent), children (67 per cent), and women of reproductive.



Religious autonomy isn't absolute



Imarat-e-Shariah, a strong socio-religious group with a big influence on a section of Indian Muslims, organised a huge protest at Patna's Gandhi Maidan. The rally, named 'Waqf Bachao, Samvidhan Bachao – Save Waqf, Save the Constitution' – quickly gained momentum, with thousands of Muslim protesters from Bihar and nearby states vocally condemning the Waqf Act amendment as a violation of both constitutional rights and religious freedom. This was not just a protest; it was a firm declaration against a law perceived as an infringement on fundamental freedoms – freedoms that many believe must be protected at all costs. Speakers at the rally claimed that the Waqf Amendment Act crushes not only the Islamic principle of Waqf (charitable endowment) but also assaults the very core of religious autonomy. Faisal Wali Rahmani, head of Imarat-e-Shariah, made it clear: the Act is a dangerous overreach that jeopardises the community's ability to govern its own affairs. "This conference," he declared, "is a peaceful, constitutional demand to roll back this draconian legislation." His words rang out as a challenge to those who would allow such overreach to stand unchecked. I fully agree that every Indian has the right to free speech and peaceful protest, as guaranteed by our

Constitution. But the argument surrounding religious autonomy is far more complicated than it seems. This notion of autonomy isn't about personal religious practice – it's about collective and organisational control. The idea that a religious group should have the unrestricted right to manage its own affairs raises some troubling questions. First, does this imply that such a group is somehow separate, not truly a part of the larger nation? Second, is there not a risk in projecting this image of self-containment – as though the community exists outside the national fabric? The implications are far more profound than they may appear. What if every community or tribe starts to argue that no one has the right to interfere in their affairs, claiming that their practices and core values are above the reach of national laws or human rights? Imagine a community that argues the government should have no say in child marriage, defending it as a matter of

religious or cultural tradition. Would such a stance be accepted simply because it aligns with the idea that each group should be able to uphold its own values? Surely, we would not accept such practices under the guise of religious freedom. At what point do we draw the line between protecting religious rights and ensuring that these practices don't violate basic human rights or endanger individuals? The core issue is whether any belief or practice – no matter how deeply rooted in religion or culture – can be allowed to override the fundamental principles of justice, equality, and human dignity. When leaders of the Muslim community, or any religious group, invoke the Constitution, they often present it as though it grants them an unfettered right to religious freedom – one that allows them to manage their affairs without interference from the state, its legislature, or its judiciary. But what is overlooked is that this right to religious free-

dom is not absolute or separate from other constitutional values. It exists within a broader framework that includes human rights, equality, and justice for all citizens. The Constitution, in its design, ensures religious freedom – but it does so with the understanding that such freedom must never come at the expense of the dignity or rights of others. This means that the Constitution's values – those of equality and justice – must always take precedence over any individual or collective religious right when they begin to infringe on these fundamental principles. Once we are clear on this, we can oppose Waqf amendments that we believe infringe upon our rights. The idea that any community has the inherent right to manage its own affairs solely under the umbrella of constitutional rights is a dangerous one. As I make this distinction, it is crucial to point out some things. While the Patna protest may be framed as a defence of constitutional rights, the very organisation leading it – Imarat-e-Shariah – operates a parallel system within the Muslim Personal Law framework despite lacking formal judicial authority. The argument often put forward is that these bodies deal with matters like marriage, divorce, inheritance, and Waqf when all parties

Karnataka's fake news bill won't survive a court challenge

Karnataka's proposed Misinformation and Fake News (Prohibition) Bill, 2025, is poorly drafted and replete with structural infirmities. It is also at odds with existing central laws and its constitutional validity is questionable. Let's see how. The bill deprives social media intermediaries of their statutory immunity from state persecution for user-generated content, a legal protection commonly referred to in internet law as 'safe harbour'. India's nodal Information Technology Act, 2000 (IT Act) provides for safe harbour protections and allows social media companies to host user content with conditional immunity, within a clearly defined legal framework. In contrast, Karnataka's fake news bill proposes to hold social media companies accountable for violating any provision of the proposed law. The bill envisions a government-appointed Fake News on Social Media Regulatory Authority, with sweeping

powers to preemptively block or ban content it deems illegal. However, it does not clarify how these powers will sync with the safe harbour protections under the IT Act. Without safe harbour protections, social media companies could face a deluge of criminal penalties for content that is difficult to monitor and filter, such as superstitions or unscientific claims, both deemed illegal under the bill. The Authority's blocking powers create a parallel mechanism to the content-blocking procedures already prescribed under the Centre's IT Act. The lack of standard procedural safeguards, such as the need to notify penalised parties or offer them a fair hearing, further disregards the minimum standards set by the IT Act. That law limits content blocking to specific grounds such as public order, sovereignty, and integrity of India, friendly relations with foreign states, or preventing incitement to an offence – all of which correspond to the restrictions.

Success to failure, UPSC is a family affair

A couplet by Mirza Ghalib could well serve as the unofficial motto of UPSC aspirants: Ragon mein daudte phirne ke hum nahin qayal; jab aankh hi se na tapka to phir lahu kya hai – I'm not impressed by blood that runs in the veins; if it doesn't spill from the eyes, what kind of blood is it? After all, aspirants live, for lack of a better description, a suspended life built on the edifice of junoon (passion) and self-doubt. But sometimes, it all comes together. The result is announced, and the aspirant's name appears on the list. Those who succeed are elevated to near-mythical status. Their photos decorate news-

paper pages and coaching centre hoardings, and they are invited for felicitations and motivational talks. But what is not celebrated is the silent effort of an entire support system – a quiet, unpaid workforce made up of family members, friends, and partners. It has been said that it takes a village to raise a child. Cliched but true. The same holds for success in the UPSC exam. If UPSC is the Everest of Indian competitive exams, and the topper is the climber, then their family members are the sherpas who make the ascent possible. The mother, often a school dropout herself, becomes the planner.

Relatives are told not to visit, and the TV volume is turned down. The father, already exhausted by the demands of underpaid work, becomes proficient in the mechanics of prelims, mains, optional, DAF (detailed application form), and ethics papers. Siblings absorb any and all friction in silence. Affection is expressed not through words but by consoling oneself: "Let him focus, we will manage." A natural question arises: why do families do this for an exam where the acceptance rate is lower than that of Harvard? The ideal of public service and giving back to society is sine qua non, but sometimes it is only a

necessary condition, not a sufficient one. First, the dream of cracking the UPSC is one that originates in the family, not the aspirant. A good score in Class 12. A local officer who is feted like royalty. A personal experience with socio-economic dysfunction. All these experiences (and more) plant the seed. "Ladke ko IAS/IPS banana hai". Whether the child is a doctor or an engineer, the end goal remains the same: to make them a Collector or SP sahab. Second, the fragility of the Indian middle class, especially in small towns and peri-urban India. This class, often first-generation salaried or self-employed.

Therefore, it was inevitable that Muslims diverged into pan-Islamism when the national movement emerged in India. It's true that Sir Syed Ahmad Khan had been wary of the pan-Islamist ideas, and opposed its propagation by the peripatetic preacher, Jamaluddin Afghani (1838-1897). But his opposition was because of pan-Islamism's anti-British edge – and Sir Syed was a British loyalist. — rather than any thought for Indian nationalism, which he had contested. What's known as global Islam or Ummah today was, in the late 19th and early 20th century, termed pan-Islamism. Contrary to what the terminology conveys – an ideology encompassing and shared by the entire Islamic world – it actually denoted the political attitude of Indian Muslims who, though domiciled in India, sought the meaning of their existence in belonging to the global Muslim community. India was incidental to their worldview. They were born here, but belonged elsewhere. What affected them the most, at the deep emotional

Google under CCI investigation over gaming firm complaint

Delhi: India's Google regulatory issues are growing. In 2022, the Competition Commission of India (CCI) fined the US tech giant for abuse of dominant position in its Play Store and Android mobile device ecosystem. Now, the fairplay regulator is investigating a complaint filed by gaming company WinZO. CCI directed its investigation arm to investigate and report within 60 days after finding a prima facie case. "Based on the facts and circumstances of the case, the commission believes Google is in violation and justifies further inquiry. The CCI bench, chaired by Ravneet Kaur and three members, ordered the director general to investigate. A Google spokesman declined to comment. WinZO, an online gaming company, claimed that Google's Play Store prohibits Real Money Game hosting. "Due to Google's unreasonable and



restrictive policy, all apps offering real money games of skill are only available for download from their website (a process called sideloading)," it told CCI. On Android devices, using this process to reach WinZO displays a disclaimer/warning, tarnishing its image. WinZO stated warnings are without validity and "completely illegal" and cost the company. It also claimed Google displays another "baseless warning" when users pay for skill-based games. "Such payment warnings are arbitrary as Google has not set any criteria for displaying them," WinZO complained to CCI.

US retailers utilize Trump tariff threats to boost sales

Delhi: Local media stated that many US businesses are advising clients to buy now before President-elect Donald Trump's proposed tariffs hike prices. Trump threatened 60% tariffs on all Chinese goods and 10% to 20% tariffs on other goods during his campaign. He announced plans to impose 25% tariffs on Mexican and Canadian imports and 10% on Chinese imports.

"Total Energies rejects corruption in any form," it declared. "This indictment does not target Adani Green Energy (AGEL) itself, nor any AGEL-related companies." Total Energies claimed it learned about Gautam Adani's and others' indictment from US public pronouncements. Gautam Adani, his nephew



NBCC India will buy sick PSUs and redevelop land banks

Delhi: Two sources say NBCC India Ltd. wants to buy defunct public sector undertakings (PSUs) to redevelop and monetize their land. The state-run construction company wants to leverage its success in developing land for government-owned companies. Developer is in talks to acquire non-operational PSUs through a new entity to monetize their land banks.

Delhi: The Union Finance Ministry proposed raising the insurance sector's FDI ceiling from 74% to 100% in a consultation paper. The insurance FDI limit was raised from 49% to 74% in February 2021. The government said the proposal to alter insurance legislation will make insurance more affordable, grow the insurance industry, and streamline corporate operations.

An office memorandum dated November 26 proposed lifting the FDI ceiling in Indian insurance businesses from 74% to 100% and



allowing insurers to conduct one or more kinds of insurance business and associated or incidental operations. The suggestion also cut foreign reinsurers' Net Owned Funds from Rs 5,000 crore to Rs 1,000 crore. IRDAI can also set lesser entry capital (Rs 50 crore) for underserved or unserved regions on

Gold loans rise 50% in seven months

Delhi: Bank loans against gold jewelry rose 50.4% in the first seven months of the year. Despite single-digit growth in every other personal loan area, credit rose sharply. RBI issued sectoral deployment of bank credit. Gold loans totaled Rs 1,02,562 crore in March 2024. Growth was 56% year-over-year, up from

13% in October 2023. NBFCs' move and a preference for secured loans over unsecured ones contributed to the first-seven-month gold loan surge, bankers said. Bank loans to NBFCs fell 0.7% to Rs 1.5 lakh crore in the first seven months. Bankers also said that rising gold prices allow borrowers to repay previous loans

and get higher new ones. Analysts see rising gold loan demand as an indication of financial instability. RBI ordered banks and financial companies to review and fix their gold loan rules and procedures within three months last month. After an examination, evergreening was found to hide bad loans.

Commercial LPG hike by Rs 16.5 per cylinder, jet fuel up 1.45%; household cooking gas remains unchanged

NEW DELHI: The cost of commercial LPG and aviation fuel prices surged on Sunday following the monthly revision aimed at aligning with trends in international oil prices. State-owned oil firms raised commercial LPG rates, used in hotels and restaurants by Rs 16.5 per to Rs 1818.50 per 19 kg cylinder. Aviation turbine fuel (ATF) prices in Delhi, which hosts one of India's most active airports, saw an increase of Rs 1,318.12 per kilo litre, marking a 1.45 per cent increment. The new rate stands at Rs 91,856.84 per kl, according to state-owned fuel retailers. The prices of ATF and LPG vary from state to state, depending on local taxes, including VAT. This marks the second consecutive monthly increase in jet fuel prices, which were previously raised by Rs 2,941.5 per kl, or 3.3 per cent, on November 1. ATF prices were reduced by 6.3 per cent (Rs 5,883 per kl) on October 1 and by Rs 4,495.5 per kl, or 4.58 per cent, on September 1. In Mumbai, the ATF price increased to Rs 85,861.02 per kl on Sunday from Rs 84,642.91 previously. The price of commercial LPG have also increased for the seventh consecutive month. In the most recent review on November 1, commercial LPG prices were raised by Rs 62 per 19-kg cylinder. Over the course of five price hikes, commercial LPG prices have increased by Rs 172.5 per 19-kg cylinder, reaching their peak this year. Four monthly price reductions before the current cycle began in August were offset by the recent hikes. Prices for 19-kg cylinders were reduced by Rs 148 across the four rounds. Currently, commercial LPG costs Rs 1,980 in Chennai, Rs 1,927 in Kolkata, and Rs 1,771 in Mumbai for a 19-kg cylinder. However, the rate of cooking gas used in domestic households, however, remained unchanged at Rs 803 per 14.2-kg cylinder. State-owned Indian Oil Corporation (IOC), Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd (BPCL), and Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Ltd (HPCL) revise the prices of ATF and cooking gas on the first of each month.

Tgana rejects Adani's 100-cr contribution

Delhi: Telangana chief minister A Revanth Reddy announced that the state government will not accept the ₹100 crore CSR donation from the Adani Group for the Young India Skills University in Ranga Reddy district, citing current circumstances and controversies. We thank you for committing 100 crore to Young India Skills University on behalf of your Foundation via letter. We have not sought donors for physical transfers of monies since the university did not acquire the IT exemption under section 80G, Ranjan wrote. The official added that he was "instructed by the chief minister not to seek the transfer of funds in view of the present circumstances and arising controversies". According to the US Department of Justice indictment, Adani executives and Azure Power executives bribed Indian government officials in five states to win solar energy supply contracts worth over \$2 billion over 20 years between 2020 and 2024. The scam reportedly started in Odisha and spread to Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Chhattisgarh, and Jammu & Kashmir. The Telangana chief minister said everyone may lawfully invest, despite accusations that the state government accepted Adani Group funding. Reddy said Congress leader Rahul Gandhi has stated that the company that wins the bids according to the regulations will invest.

The first half is a perfect package; it has a couple of good action sequences, there's a bit of comedy, romance, drama, and a lot of emotional scenes. You will get tears in your eyes a lot of times while watching the first half of *Border 2*. The interval point promises that the second half will concentrate on the war.

The second half of *Border 2* begins on an emotional note. There's a scene featuring Mona Singh that will make you cry a lot. The movie then moves towards the war sequences. The war scenes have been shot very well, especially the scenes featuring the Indian Navy and the IAF. There are many goosebump moments.

But the film dips a bit when the war focuses on the Indian Army. The scenes look stretched and messy. However, towards the climax, the film gains momentum, giving us a goosebump moment, and of course, it makes us cry a lot again.

Cheekatilo arrives with the swagger of a thriller ready to rattle skeletons in society's cupboards, only to realise halfway that it has misplaced the key. At 2 hours and 6 minutes, the film certainly has time on its side, yet much of that time wanders into cul-de-sacs of clichés and narrative detours. The premise

is juicy enough. Sandhya Neluri, a crime anchor tired of peddling TRP tantrums, chooses to expose the rot festering beneath polite silences. When her beloved intern Bobby dies under suspicious circumstances, she launches a podcast named Cheekatilo to chronicle true crime and embolden victims to come forward.

It is a setup that practically begs for urgency and intrigue.

For a brief moment, the film seems to promise precisely that. Then, in a curious act of creative self-sabotage, it laces the plot with disjointed episodes that feel more like anthology fragments than a cohesive investigation. As Sandhya traces an unsettling pattern of deaths across the Godavari region since 2000, the film ought to tighten its grip. Instead, it loosens it and occasionally drops the rope entirely.

The technical finesse only highlights what the writing

withholds. The production values sparkle, the frames are polished, and the lighting team has clearly worked overtime. Yet the story feels like a polite party guest who refuses to make meaningful

conversation. One can sense intention behind the craft, but little inspiration guides the narrative. The overall impact becomes strangely hollow. It's a thriller stranded without palpable thrill.

Actors' performance *Cheekatilo* rests squarely on Sobhita Dhulipala's shoulders, and she carries the film with an earnestness that keeps it from collapsing altogether. She lends Sandhya a well-grounded mix of fatigue, moral conflict, and grit. Her performance alone gives the narrative a pulse.

Everyone else, unfortunately, stands in the shadow of her art.

Vishwadev Rakachonda appears as the supportive love interest, orbiting the margins of the story with a calm that borders on invisibility. Aamani and Vadlamani Srinivas, as his parents, shine in their limited scenes and bring warmth which the film lacks.

The police officers, victims, and assorted side characters are all rendered in broad strokes. Their personalities are so thinly sketched that one half expects them to flutter away with a strong breeze. The emotional stakes, therefore, remain perfunctory.

Music *Cheekatilo* aspires to be a socially conscious thriller but ends up feeling like a *déjà vu* buffet of familiar tropes. It has a commendable premise and robust technical backing, yet the writing falters and the execution stumbles. The result is a polished but overwhelming echo of thrillers we have seen before. A recycled jamboree that promises far more than it delivers.

Border 2 actress reacts to negative PR campaign against Varun Dhawan, calls it heartbreaking





had worked very hard for it. It wasn't like he was sitting there in a star's capacity, thinking it was just another film. He was genuinely working for the film. I never felt he was a misfit. I felt he played the part amazingly well, and I hope that when people watch the film, they'll realise he's actually very good in it."



I had met him earlier at a screening of *Dhadak*, so I told him that we had met before, and he said he felt the same. Karachi fire: Kin protest as many missing

Nearly a week after the fire in shopping centre in Pakistan's Karachi, anger and despair among families of the missing erupted as they protested against the lack of urgency by officials, 'The Express Tribune' reported. Women clutching photos of sons, husbands and brothers assembled near the site, accusing officials and rescuers of moving painfully slowly while their loved ones remained unaccounted for. The toll from the January 17 fire has risen to at least 67.

Ruling party boss reelected in Vietnam

Vietnam's To Lam was re-elected on Friday as the general secretary of its ruling Communist Party. The decision came at the conclusion of the National Party Congress, the country's most important political conclave. No announcement was made about whether he will also become president. If To Lam were to get both positions, he would be the country's most powerful leader in decades, akin to Chinese leader Xi Jinping.

2 dead as boat sinks in South China Sea

Two people died and four were missing when a Singapore-flagged cargo ship with 21 Filipinos on board capsized in the South China Sea, Chinese officials said on Friday. The Chinese Coast Guard and navy operations from People's Liberation Army's Southern Theatre Command have rescued 15 people. The boat sank 100 kms northwest of Scarborough Shoal, said Chinese Coast Guard.

Nine killed in Pakistan's KP avalanche

Nine people were killed after an avalanche struck a house in Pakistan's northwestern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province on Friday, police said. A child was also injured in Chitral's Domel mountainous area.

21 killed in Myanmar airstrike

A military airstrike this week on a Myanmar village sheltering displaced people from Bhamo, where a final round of the 3-phase poll is to be held, killed 21 people, a rebel group said.

AMERICA TRYING TO BEFRIEND JAMAAT IN BANGLADESH: CLIP

Washington: As Jamaat-e-Islami readies for its strongest showing in Bangladesh poll next month, 'The Washington Post' has reported US diplomats are quietly signalling a willingness to engage with the once-banned party. The paper on Thursday cited a leaked audio clip of a closed-door interaction between a US diplomat and some female Bangladeshi journalists on December 1, 2025, at the US embassy in Dhaka.

The US official said Bangladesh had "shifted Islamic" and predicted Jamaat would "do better than it's ever done before" in the Feb 12 poll. "We want them to be our friends," the official added, asking if journalists could bring members of the party's "influential student wing", Islami Chhatra Shibir, onto their programmes. The unnamed diplomat downplayed worries Jamaat would try to force its interpretation of Islamic law on Bangladesh, saying "we would have 100% tariffs put on them the next day".



Hasina said Bangladesh had slipped into its "darkest hour", transformed from a peaceful nation into a landscape marked by fear, bloodshed and repression. "What was once fertile and calm is ruled by terror," she said, alleging, violence, torture and sexual assaults were being carried out with impunity, particularly against women and minorities.

UAE MEET | As trilateral talks involving US begin, no sign of Moscow and Kyiv softening their positions on Donbas region

Land dispute in focus at Ukraine peace talks

ABU DHABI

Ukrainian, Russian and American negotiators were holding meetings on Friday in the UAE, marking the first trilateral talks since the start of the war in Ukraine, tackling the vital issue of territory with no sign of a softening of positions to end the four-year conflict.

This round of talks, President Volodymyr Zelensky said on Friday, could focus on post-war control of territory in eastern Ukraine's Donbas region, which has emerged as a major stumbling block through months of negotiations.

"The question of Donbas is key. It will be discussed how the three sides... see this in Abu Dhabi today and tomorrow," he said. The talks would resume on Saturday morning.

The Kremlin confirmed Russian officials would take part in a security working group meeting in Abu Dhabi with the Russian delegation led by Igor Kostyukov, the head of Russia's military intelligence. The secretary of the national security council, Rustem Umerov, will lead Ukraine's delegation.

A bilateral working group on economic issues between Russia and the US was slated to take place separately, the Kremlin said.

On the table is a revised 20-

point peace plan drawn up by Ukraine and the US. That plan covers a range of issues like potential territorial arrangements and security guarantees, as well as plans to rebuild the war-ravaged nation.

But the Ukrainian and Russian authorities are still at odds over territory, with Russia demanding a big chunk in the Donbas, and on security guarantees.

Steve Witkoff, US President Trump's special envoy, and Jared Kushner, Trump's son-in-law, were also expected to be in Abu Dhabi. The Kremlin said Witkoff would lead the bilateral economics talks alongside Kirill Dmitriev, the

Kremlin special envoy and head of the country's sovereign wealth fund.

Witkoff said on Thursday in Abu Dhabi, working groups would handle components of the peace plan, including what he called "military-to-military" aspects and "prosperity," or postwar economic recovery.

Late on Thursday, Witkoff and Kushner met for 4 hours in Moscow with Russian President Vladimir Putin. Yuri Ushakov, Putin's foreign policy adviser, said after the meeting it had been "useful in all aspects, both for us and the US."

He said Russia wanted to end the war "through political

and diplomatic means" but that until then it would continue to push on the battlefield, "where the Russian Armed Forces hold the strategic initiative."

During the Kremlin meeting, Putin underscored there was no hope of achieving a long-term settlement if Ukraine was not prepared to resolve "the territorial issue according to the formula agreed upon in Anchorage," Ushakov said, referring to a meeting in Alaska last year. During that meeting, Putin agreed to cease fighting if Kyiv handed over the remainder of the Donetsk region and agreed to other nonterritorial demands.

Nato troops avoided Af front line: Don sparks row

LONDON / WASHINGTON

Donald Trump has sparked outrage among British MPs and veterans after claiming Nato troops stayed away from the frontline in Afghanistan, 'The Guardian' reported.

The US president made his comments in an interview with 'Fox News' in which he reiterated his suggestion Nato would not support the US if asked. Trump has long criticised the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation, which also includes 30 European allies and Canada, over his belief that other members don't pay their fair share.

"Maybe we should have put Nato to the test: Invoked Article 5, and forced Nato to come here and protect our Southern Border from further invasions of illegal immigrants, thus freeing up large numbers of Border Patrol Agents for other tasks," Trump posted on Truth Social.

Article 5 refers to Nato's mutual defence clause, which states that an "armed attack" on one member is considered an attack on all 32 member-states.

His remarks drew condemnation, with critics pointing to the 457 British deaths in Afghanistan and highlighting Trump's avoidance of military service in Vietnam.

A total of 3,486 Nato troops died in the 20-year conflict, of which 2,461 were US service men. Canada suffered 165 deaths, including civilians.

Denmark, which has been at loggerheads with the US



over Trump's designs on Greenland, had 44 combat deaths in Afghanistan, the most per capita outside the US. In the interview with 'Fox News', Trump said: "We've never needed them. They'll say they sent some troops to Afghanistan ... and they did, they stayed a little back, a little off the frontlines."

"I will never forget their courage, their bravery and the sacrifice they made for the country. President Trump's remarks are insulting, appalling. I am not surprised the remarks have hurt the loved ones of those killed or injured," said UK PM Keir Starmer.

Armed forces minister Al Carrs said, "Trump's comments are utterly ridiculous and a real shame."

Tory party leader Kemi Badenoch called US president's remark a disgrace.

Calvin Bailey, a Labour MP and former RAF officer who served alongside US special operations units in Afghanistan, said Trump's claim "bears no resemblance to the reality experienced by those of us who served there".

The Conservative MP Ben Obsey-Jecty, who served in Afghanistan as a captain in the Royal Yorkshire Regiment, has been in the response to 9/11, and it is worth reflecting on now."

ment, said it was "sad to see our nation's sacrifice, and that of our Nato partners, held so cheaply by the US president".

Tan Dhesi, the chair of the Commons defence committee, said the US president's comments were "appalling and an insult to our brave British servicemen and women, who risked life and limb to help our allies, with many making the ultimate sacrifice".

The foreign affairs committee chair, Emily Thornberry, described the comments as "so much more than a mistake", and "an insult" to the families of those who had died. Stephen Stewart, a former soldier and an author and journalist, said: "Trump's comments are as offensive as they are inaccurate. It's hugely ironic someone who allegedly dodged the draft for the Vietnam war should make such a disgraceful statement."

"He has desecrated the memory of hundreds of British soldiers who made the ultimate sacrifice in Afghanistan, people who we called friends and comrades. If he was a man of honour, he would get down on bended knees to ask forgiveness from the families of the fallen."

Bailey added: "As I reminded the US forces I served with on 4 July in 2008, we were there because of a shared belief, articulated at America's founding, that free people have inalienable rights and should not live under tyranny. That belief underpinned the response to 9/11, and it is worth reflecting on now."

TikTok seals deal to form new US entity

Washington: TikTok has finalised a deal to create a new American entity, avoiding the looming threat of a ban in the US that has been in discussion for years on the platform now used by over 200 million Americans.



The social video platform

firm signed pacts with investors including Oracle, Silver Lake and the Emirati investment firm MGX to form the new TikTok US joint venture.

The new version will operate under "defined safeguards that protect national security through comprehensive data protections, algorithm security, content moderation and software assurances for US users," the company said. American TikTok users can continue using the same app.

Trump praised the deal, thanking Chinese leader Xi Jinping specifically "for working with us and, ultimately, approving the Deal". He hoped "long into the future I will be remembered by those who use and love TikTok."

'Turbulent' times: Jinping assures Brazil's Lula of Beijing's support

Beijing/Sao Paulo: China's President **Xi Jinping** (L) assured his Brazilian counterpart on Friday China would stand by the Latin America's biggest economy and the Global South, and called for both nations to maintain the role of the UN, Xinhua said. Xi's comments in a telephone call with President **Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva** followed the latter's criticism of the US attack on Venezuela in an opinion piece in the 'New York Times' this week. Xi said China and Brazil should safeguard the shared interests of the Global South and jointly maintain the role of the United Nations in the "current turbulent international situation", the agency said. Lula's office confirmed the 45-minute call, saying both leaders "reiterated their commitment to strengthening the United Nations as a path to safeguarding peace and stability in the world".

AMERICA TRYING TO BEFRIEND JAMAAT IN BANGLADESH: CLIP

Washington: As Jamaat-e-Islami readies for its strongest showing in Bangladesh poll next month, 'The Washington Post' has reported US diplomats are quietly signalling a willingness to engage with the once-banned party. The paper on Thursday cited a leaked audio clip of a closed-door interaction between a US diplomat and some female Bangladeshi journalists on December 1, 2025, at the US embassy in Dhaka.

The US official said Bangladesh had "shifted Islamic" and predicted Jamaat would "do better than it's ever done before" in the Feb 12 poll. "We want them to be our friends," the official added, asking if journalists could bring members of the party's "influential student wing", Islami Chhatra Shibir, onto their programmes. The unnamed diplomat downplayed worries Jamaat would try to force its interpretation of Islamic law on Bangladesh, saying "we would have 100% tariffs put on them the next day".

No work, no shopping, no dining out. Hundreds of businesses across Minnesota were expected to close and many people vowed to pause everyday activities on Friday as part of a general strike against the Trump administration's immigration crackdown, NYT reported.

As tensions mount and a sense of fear of detention by immigration agents permeates the state, vendors, labour unions and residents said they would take part in an economic blackout and gather at prayers and protests on what organisers called a "Day of Truth and Freedom."

"It's tense and emotional, and folks are hurting," said Bishop Dwayne Royster, the executive director of Faith in Action, which is helping with the organising effort.

Minnesotans, he said, are demonstrating "deep resilience and willingness to stand together in ways I haven't seen before," he said.

ICC drops Bangladesh from T20 World Cup

World body brings in Scotland; informs all member nations

NEW DELHI

The ICC has pushed Bangladesh out of the upcoming T20 World Cup, bringing in Scotland after BCB refused to let its team travel to India citing security concerns in the wake of Mustafizur Rahman's ouster from the IPL.

Scotland's entry ended the month-long suspense after Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) repeatedly insisted that their matches be shifted to Sri Lanka and even suggested their group being swapped with Ireland.

The Irish Cricket board however categorically dismissed the suggestion.

At the ICC Board meeting, Bangladesh were taken to the cleaners with an overwhelming 14-2 verdict in favour of the 'Tigers' travelling to India for their games. The ICC gave the BCB a 24-hour deadline to change its stance but with Asif Nazrul being adamant, the cricket crazy nation's hopes of playing the T20 World Cup went up in smoke.

It has been learnt that top ICC officials including chairman Jay Shah were in Dubai on Friday and late evening an e-mail was sent to BCB chairman Aminul Islam Bulbul informing him about global body's decision.

"An e-mail was sent last evening to Bangladesh Cricket Board chairman intimating him that his board didn't get back to ICC officially after the 24 hour deadline that was given to them to decide if they wanted to come to India," an ICC source told PTI on conditions of anonymity. "The BCB did a press con-

ference in Dhaka before officially intimating the global body which is a violation of protocol. They have been categorically told that they are being replaced. Scotland is the new team in the World Cup."

The ICC also intimated all the participating member nations separately about Bangladesh being dropped from the tournament.

Bangladesh Sports Ministry advisor Asif Nazrul had advised against national team travelling to India, citing security issues despite being given repeated assurances by the ICC. Scotland will thus play their four group league games against West Indies (February 7), Italy (February 9) and England (February 14) in Kolkata followed by a game against Nepal in Mumbai on February 17. The BCB, in a desperate measure, had also approached the Dispute Resolution Committee (DRC) of the ICC, unaware about the terms of reference of the sub-committee.

INTERVIEW | South Africa legend feels team that handles pressure best will win

JONTY BACKS INDIA AT T20 WC

MUMBAI

South Africa legend **Jonty Rhodes** feels the team that can handle pressure the best will triumph at the ICC Men's T20 World Cup starting next month but felt India certainly had the home advantage.

The South African legend was speaking on the sidelines of unveiling the ICC Men's T20 World Cup trophy at the Brew District for the Lollapalooza India event for Budweiser, at the Mahalaxmi Racetrack, here on Saturday.

"It's so interesting. I mean, the South African teams had a few injuries, they've had to change a team. There's so much cricket happening globally that quite a few of the squads are having similar issues. But with 20 teams at this T20 World Cup, I reckon there's probably eight on any given day that can put their hand up and say, we can win this World Cup. So try and predict four of them."

Rhodes felt the home ground advantage was certainly there with India.

"I mean, India, you've got home ground advantage. But we've seen that doesn't always work. There's no guarantee for success, but it does play a big part. It's got to be the team that can handle the pressure on the day. Because that's what T20 cricket is about. It's about high intensity moments. And those players, not just the most talented ones, but the ones that can

kind of calm down. Deal with each ball on its merit. Make the right decisions. And that's where you win and lose trophies," he added.

With ICC ousting Bangladesh from the T20 World Cup owing to the latter's refusal to play their matches in India, Rhodes felt it was a tough call but he can understand the situation saying he was reminded of South Africa's Apartheid era situation. "I think it's tough. You know, I come from a background of apartheid era South Africa, where sport and politics had to mix and because of that we were forced to change. Political and

sporting sanctions were imposed upon the minority government. And eventually we changed. And at the right time, for me, the 1992 Cricket World Cup came about when we were not yet a democracy. So, you know, I've seen politics and sport. And everyone talks, oh, you can't mix the two. But sometimes it does," the legendary fielder explained.

"So, difficult. You know, it's a tough decision. I feel really sad, hard done by the Bangladesh players. You know, the T20 World Cup is such a platform to showcase your skills. "T20 cricket has those high-intensity moments. And if you can slow it down and breathe and make more good choices than bad ones, you know, that impacts the team. You know, if you're all panicking and change your mind every ball that is bowled, it unsettles the side. So, I think the team on the day is able to make those choices. And it often comes from the captaincy," he added.
