RBI's MPC meeting between 4 to 6 August, repo rate likely to remain unchanged

New Delhi: The three-day review meeting of the bi-monthly Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) of the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) is going to be held between 4-6 August. RBI Governor Sanjay Malhotra will announce the decisions taken in the meeting on 6 August. Economists have expressed the possibility of the repo rate remaining unchanged at 5.50 percent in the meeting. Economists believe that despite the US's announcement of 25 percent new tariff, the Reserve Bank will not make any change in the policy rates in the August Monetary Policy Committee review meeting.

who are medically discharged after suffering disabilities during training at premier institutions such as National Defence Academy and Indian Military Academy.

As the injuries suffered by them are

prior to commissioning, they are denied ex-servicemen benefits like disability pension or treatment under the Ex-Servicemen Contributory Health Scheme, leaving them without any institutional support.

The safeguard duty was confirmed on Thursday, months after preliminary duty was imposed. Over 250 stakeholders, including automakers and electronics giants.

President, not SC, decides when to seek court's opinion: Centre

NEW DELHI:

Objecting to the judgment mandating the President to seek Supreme Court's opinion on constitutionality of bills, Union govt has said the judiciary cannot dictate to the President how and when to exercise her unfettered discretion to seek the apex court's opinion and on which issues. Faulting the April 8 judgment of a bench of justices J B



Pardiwala and R Mahadevan, the Centre, through solicitor general Tushar Mehta, said a plain reading of the President's powers under Article 143 "shows that an absolute discretion lies with the President to seek

advice. The term 'consult' means the act of asking for advice and indicates that the President is not bound to do so". The judgment had advised the President that whenever a governor reserves a bill for her consideration on the ground that it is patently unconstitutional, the President ought to make a reference to SC under Article 143 "as a measure of prudence".

Muslim women can divorce alone

Delhi: The Election Commission of India is planning to conduct an "intensive house-to-house verification" of the voters' list in Bihar ahead of the assembly polls due in the state later this year, officials said. Concerns have been raised by various civil society organisations, political parties and others persistently over the inclusion or deletion of names in the electoral rolls, the officials said. To ensure the system is completely robust and error-free, the ECI is considering an intensive house-to-house verification during the upcoming electoral roll revision before the Bihar Assembly polls, an EC official familiar with the matter said, requesting anonymity. Such an intensive and rigorous revision of the electoral rolls has been done in the past as well with the last such exercise undertaken in 2004, the official said. The regular exercise of revision of electoral rolls is undertaken annually throughout the country.

Delhi: The Telangana high court ruled that a Muslim wife has an absolute and unconditional right to dissolve her marriage through khula, without the husband's consent. This ruling highlights Muslim women's autonomy in personal law. In Islamic kula, a woman gives up her right to maintenance (mehr) to end her marriage. A bench of justices

Moushumi Bhattacharya and BR Madhusudhan Rao ruled that khula is a no-fault, non-confrontational divorce initiated exclusively by the woman and takes immediate effect in the private sphere. "Since the wife's right to demand khula is absolute and does not require a cause or the husband's acceptance, a court's only

Google pulls offline map app from Play Store per government requests

Delhi: Google and Apple removed MAPS.Me offline navigation app from Play and App Store. The app misrepresented India's border. To Google's nodal officer, Priyadarshi Banerjee, the Survey of India (SoI) submitted MAPS.Me a notice under Section 79(3)(b) of the IT Act, 2000, in December 2024. The software misrepresents Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh, according to the notice. The app's Google Play Store homepage now displays "We're sorry, the requested URL was not found on this server". SoI reportedly provided notice to Google, but since the app is unavailable on Apple's App Store for Indian

consumers, it's unclear if Apple was notified. The publisher accessed the letter using Lumen Database. It says: "The maps.me app on Google PlayStore portrays an Indian map with an incorrect external boundary, endangering India's sovereignty and integrity. The Survey of India (SoI) was appointed by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) in 2020 to "disable access to incorrect maps of India."

The poll body announced "Special Intensive Revision of Electoral Rolls" in Bihar and "house-to-house verification" to enroll all eligible citizens. June 25, according to the Commission. It said a draft electoral roll will be released on August 1 and the final one on September 30. The Bihar assembly elections schedule can be revealed in the first week of October.

Tiger kills farmer in Duhwah reserve, 3rd death by big cat in a month


Bareilly: A 45-year-old farmer was killed by a tiger near the Palia range of Duhwah Tiger Reserve in UP's Lakhimpur Kheri, the third human fatality in a big cat attack in the district within a month, officials said on Saturday. Harishchandra Lal was cutting grass on Friday evening when the tiger dragged him into a sugarcane field. His partially eaten body was found on Saturday morning during a joint search by villagers, police and forest officials. One of his legs was recovered some distance away. The incident triggered protests by local farmers who blocked the Sampoornanagar road and demanded action.

Pilibhit Tiger Reserve introduces new method to count tigers by gender



PILIBHIT: The Pilibhit Tiger Reserve (PTR) has carried out a sex-based estimation of tigers in its core forest area, finding 14 males and 53 females. The gender of 12 tigers could not be determined due to unclear stripe patterns in images captured by camera traps, the officials said on Thursday. The internal estimation began in Nov last year, with the 602 sq km core forest divided into 316 grids of 2x2 km each. A total of 632 camera traps were installed in two phas-

es, and the data was downloaded in March by World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) experts. Over four months, the images were analysed and matched to identify individual tigers. The exercise showed

PTR's tigers, which often stay in agricultural fields in nearby villages due to the reserve's overpopulation.

"If we include these stray tigers, the total population in Pilibhit could be close to 100," said divisional forest officer Manish Singh. Singh added that the survey confirmed an ideal male-to-female ratio of 1:3-4. "The salient finding was that some male tigers travelled over 70-80 km, which is unusual for this reserve," he said.



Couple attempt suicide after families oppose marriage; girl dead, youth critical

Bareilly: An 18-year-old girl died and her 19-year-old boyfriend was left critical after the two allegedly consumed poison at their respective homes in Budaun's Dataganj area, following opposition from their families to their relationship. Police said the youth, who lived in the same locality as the girl, had been forced into marriage two months ago. Dataganj SHO Gaurav Bishnoi said, "The couple had been in a relationship for the past three years despite the youth being married elsewhere. On Friday, after a complaint from the girl's father, the youth was scolded by his family. He consumed poison a few hours later, and the girl too consumed poison sometime after. The girl died during treatment on Saturday, while the youth is still under observation."

The SHO added, "The body has been sent for autopsy, and we are monitoring the youth's condition. So far, no complaint has been lodged by either family." This is the second such case in Budaun within a week. On Aug 11, a 22-year-old man and a 17-year-old girl from the same village were found hanging from a tree after their families opposed their marriage.

Woman kills self, accuses in-laws of dowry in 'note'

Agra: A 26-year-old woman was found hanging at a home in Muzaffarnagar's Shivpuri area on Sunday, police said. She allegedly killed herself after "facing frequent dowry harassment". Before taking the extreme step, she purportedly posted a "suicide note" on her social media account.

A bench of CJI Sanjiv Khanna and Justice Sanjay Kumar ruled that only the government can rescind acquisition for the full land or a portion of it, hence even a public organization that acquired land cannot surrender it to someone privately. Litigation over purchased land, mostly due to third-party rights, has delayed numerous projects.

Isro chief announces India's lunar mission by 2035



Prayagraj: Isro chairman and secretary, department of space, Dr V Narayanan announced that India will land astronauts on the Moon through an indigenous mission by 2035 and achieve a completely indigenous human space mission by 2040. He was addressing the students at the 22nd Convocation ceremony of Motilal Nehru National Institute of Technology (MNNIT) in Prayagraj. Dr Narayanan, the chief guest on the occasion, highlighted that India's space programme has

High Court upholds influencers' fact-based criticism

Delhi: The Delhi High Court allowed social media influencers to criticize consumer goods with scientific facts. The Court denied San Nutrition Private Limited's request for an interim order to stop four influencers from criticizing its whey protein products. The judge, Justice Amit Bansal, ruled that restricting speech before a trial would be unreasonable. "Reasonable criticism, comment and parody is largely protected within the right to free speech under the Constitution."

Emphasising India's reliance on imported technology

It delivered two Ming-class submarines to Bangladesh in 2017, gifted a P625 frigate to Sri Lanka in 2019, and committed to exporting Yuan-class submarines to Thailand. Although the Thai deal encountered difficulties when Germany refused to supply key propulsion components.

Thailand decided to proceed with the acquisition, underscoring China's persistence in maintaining its naval export commitments. Additionally, Pakistan is set to acquire at least eight Hangor-class submarines and other naval equipment from Beijing, further enhancing China's presence in the region. India has increasingly aligned itself with Western naval powers to address maritime challenges through collaborative efforts. France was among its earliest Western partners, and the countries' cooperation has grown stronger over time. India also participates in joint maritime missions with European nations and European Union Naval Force (EUNAVFOR) initiatives such as Operation Atlanta and Aspides. Furthermore, India contributes to significant maritime security dialogues such as the Coordinated Maritime Presence (CMP) and Enhancing Security Cooperation In And With Asia (ESIWA). India's 2023 inclusion in the Combined Maritime Forces (CMF), led by the US Central Command, underscores its dedication to enhancing collaborative security in the western Indian Ocean. The IFC-IOR exemplifies India's commitment to collective security, even though it remains a preliminary step toward a more robust maritime security framework. Advancing to the next level will require India to engage in the technically complex task of real-time information sharing through secure legal frameworks beyond Open-Source Intelligence (OSINT). The Quad's Indo-Pacific Maritime Domain Awareness (IPMDA) initiative highlights the challenges in achieving seamless data-sharing capabilities. To counter hybrid threats and protect critical infrastructure, India must prioritise sharing vital intelligence and deploying unmanned systems for coordinated surveillance. Strengthening such partnerships will bolster India's naval capabilities and contribute to broader maritime security across the Indian Ocean Region. The commissioning of new naval platforms marks a significant milestone for India but also highlights persistent challenges, particularly in achieving technological self-reliance in engine manufacturing. Although the INS Surat, INS Nilgiri, and INS Vaghsheer were designed by India's Warship Design Bureau and built by Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Limited, their engines were procured from foreign manufacturers, exposing a critical dependence on external sources. INS Surat, the fourth and final ship of the P15B Guided Missile Destroyer Project, employs a Combined Gas Turbine and Gas Turbine (COGAG) propulsion system. This system uses Me6E and DT-59 reversible engines sourced from Ukraine's Zorya Mashproekt, a key supplier for India's frontline warships. Despite the ongoing war in Ukraine, India has continued to rely on Zorya, underscoring the critical nature of this dependence. To secure the supply chain, Bharat Forge acquired a 51 per cent stake in Zorya's India arm in 2023. Similarly, INS Nilgiri, the first ship of the P17A Stealth Frigate Project, launched in 2019, uses a Combined Diesel and Gas (CODAG) propulsion system. This system incorporates LM2500 engines from General Electric in the US and MAN diesel engines from Germany, further emphasising India's reliance on imported technology despite its strong indigenous design capabilities.



Bangladesh is on the brink of political upheaval

Bangladesh is on the brink of significant political upheaval. The escalating tension between Muhammad Yunus's interim government and the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) signals a turbulent period ahead. With stakes high for domestic power dynamics and regional stability, the developments in Bangladesh demand scrutiny, particularly from neighbouring India. At the heart of Bangladesh's political discord lies the clash between the interim government, led by Nobel laureate Muhammad Yunus, and the BNP, the dominant political force in the country. Following the ousting of Sheikh Hasina in August 2024, Yunus assumed leadership of an interim government tasked with implementing electoral reforms and facilitating free and fair elections. However, his reluctance to outline a concrete timeline for elections has drawn sharp criticism from the BNP. The BNP, emboldened by its strong grassroots support and organisational strength, has been pressing for elections by the end of 2025 at the latest. Any delay, the BNP fears, could undermine its momentum and strengthen the newly emerging political entities being nurtured by Yunus and his allies. This includes the Anti-Discrimination Students' Movement (ADSM), whose leaders are reportedly in the process of forming a political party with Yunus's backing. Yunus's proposal to delay elections until reforms are complete, potentially into 2026, has further fuelled suspicions. BNP leaders view this as a calculated move to consolidate power and allow the nascent "king's party" to establish itself. This manoeuvring has



triggered accusations of bias and unethical behaviour, as the interim government's primary mandate was to ensure a swift transition to democratic governance, not to reshape the political landscape. Compounding the tension is the involvement of Bangladesh's Islamist factions. The Islamists, including the Jamaat-e-Islami, have thrown their support behind Yunus, seeking opportunities to further their agenda under his leadership. In exchange, they have reportedly received tacit approval to intensify efforts to Islamise the country and target religious minorities. The BNP's confrontational stance toward the Jamaat highlights the growing rift between the former allies. By invoking the Jamaat's controversial role during Bangladesh's 1971 Liberation War, the BNP has sought to delegitimise the Islamist party. However, this strategy risks escalating street-level violence, as the Jamaat is known for mobilising its supporters in aggressive displays of force. With the interim government's apparent alignment with the Islamists, the stage is set for widespread unrest. The current crisis draws parallels with the political turmoil of 2007-2009 when an army-backed caretaker government attempted to implement a 'minus two' formula—banning both the BNP and the Awami League from politics. Yunus's government appears to be reviving elements of this approach, potentially sidelining the BNP and fostering the rise of alternative political entities. The BNP's leadership, including acting chairman Tarique Rahman, has categorically rejected such moves. The party insists that only an elected government can undertake major constitutional and institutional reforms. This principled stance underscores the BNP's commitment to restoring democratic norms but it also sets the stage for a protracted power struggle. As the BNP ramps up its demands for immediate elections, the likelihood of mass protests looms large. Any attempt by Yunus to suppress dissent through state machinery could further erode his credibility and exacerbate public discontent. Simultaneously, the emergence of a new political party under the aegis of the ADSM risks fragmenting the opposition landscape, complicating the BNP's path to power. The

role of external actors, particularly Western powers, cannot be overlooked. While Yunus enjoys considerable international support, his inability to stabilise the political situation and hold timely elections.

could prompt a re-evaluation of this backing. Western stakeholders, wary of Bangladesh's descent into chaos, may pressure Yunus to expedite the electoral process. For India, the unfolding crisis in Bangladesh presents both challenges and opportunities. The political landscape in Bangladesh is marked by heightened tensions, particularly between the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), the interim government led by Muhammad Yunus, and Islamist factions. Historically, India's relations with the BNP have been strained due to ideological differences and the BNP's association with anti-India sentiments. However, recent diplomatic overtures have paved the way for improved ties. The BNP's assurances to safeguard India's interests and curb anti-India forces signal a significant shift in the bilateral equation. In contrast, Yunus's administration has been viewed with suspicion in New Delhi. The interim government's alignment with Islamist factions raises concerns about the potential for increased radicalisation and instability along India's eastern border. Furthermore, Yunus's reluctance to engage meaningfully with India on key issues, coupled with his perceived bias against Indian interests, has strained relations further. This lack of cooperation has heightened India's apprehensions about the broader implications for regional security and economic integration. India

stands to benefit from a BNP-led government, which promises greater stability and cooperation on key bilateral issues, including border management, trade, and counterterrorism. Supporting the BNP's call for timely elections aligns with India's strategic goals of fostering a democratic and secular Bangladesh. Such a government could also strengthen India's Act East Policy, by providing a stable and cooperative neighbour that supports regional connectivity and trade initiatives. However, overt interference in Bangladesh's internal affairs risks backlash and could jeopardise India's long-term relationship with other political stakeholders in the country. Maintaining a balanced and nuanced approach will be essential for New Delhi.

In conclusion, the unfolding crisis in Bangladesh presents a complex mix of challenges and opportunities for India. By adopting a balanced and proactive approach, India can navigate this delicate situation, strengthen its bilateral ties with Bangladesh, and contribute to the broader goal of regional stability and development. Bangladesh's political trajectory remains uncertain, with heightened confrontations expected between the BNP, Yunus's interim government, and Islamist factions. This three-way struggle will shape the country's democratic future and determine the balance of power in South Asia. For the BNP, mobilising public support and maintaining organisational discipline will be crucial. The party must navigate the complex interplay of domestic and international pressures to secure its position as the principal political force.

The deal will also enable the return of displaced people in Gaza to return to whatever is left of their homes, and daily delivery of food and other supplies by hundreds of trucks. But things can still go wrong. There can be accidents or attacks from either side, which could break the truce. that there may be some rationalisation of duties on capital goods required for solar upstream manufacturing could be seen so that overall that industry can really take off. "We expect continuation and maybe broadening of the PLI support towards the solar module value chain. We already have a few interventions there, which are likely to be extended deeper," Dwivedi said. But some of the mud will stick. That's the tragedy for the daughter of Bangladesh's founding father Sheikh Mujibur Rahman—even her staunchest supporters admit her chances of ever returning to her motherland look very slim. Not just her niece, several other members of Sheikh Hasina's family are also under investigation for corruption that, some estimates say, totals a mind-boggling \$5 billion. The corruption case is linked to an alleged land grab in Dhaka and, more infamous

ly, to a Russian-funded nuclear power plant. In 2013, Sheikh Hasina travelled to Moscow to seal the deal and was photographed standing beside President Valdimir Putin, Siddiq, and other members of her family. When questioned about her presence in Moscow, Siddiq tried to explain it as a family event, but the photo was impossible to dismiss. Apart from family, powerful ministers and industry leaders—allegedly with Sheikh Hasina's blessings or blind eye—also cost Bangladesh billions. A white

paper on the economy, presented in Dhaka by a specially appointed finance committee in December, put the cost of corruption across public and private sectors at a staggering sum. Perhaps the most striking was the claim that "illicit financial outflows averaged \$16 billion annually from 2009 to 2023—more than double the combined foreign aid and FDI inflows."

Whether investigations into this immense corruption have yielded documentary evidence or not is open to debate. But for now,

Chief Adviser Mohammed Yunus has made his administration's objective clear. "The theft of billions of dollars in public funds has left Bangladesh with a significant financial deficit," Yunus said in a statement this week. "The funds stolen from Bangladesh belong to its people. We will continue to work with our international partners to ensure that justice is done." Over 1,000 crypto heists have netted hackers \$12.7 billion.



Delhi: Data indicated that cyber thieves have stolen over \$1.71 billion this year, bringing total losses to \$12.7 billion spanning more than 1,000 heists. Cryptocurrencies' great value and anonymity attract criminals, driving the value of criminal crypto transactions to alarming highs, according to CryptoPresales.com. According to Compartech data, hackers stole over \$1 billion in five of the past 10 years, including 2024, demonstrating the continued battle for law enforcement and regulators to manage these crimes. Crypto heists increased 15 times in the past decade, from 12 in 2014 to 176 this year. The disparity is even greater than the 283 crypto heists reported in 2023, the most ever. A decade of crypto heists is disturbing, even though the annual number has fallen. Research has found 1,008 crypto heists since 2014, costing the sector over \$12.7 billion.

The GST panel postpones calling for reduced insurance costs

Delhi: The GST Council voted to exempt gene therapy used to cure cancer from taxes, and postponed a proposal for lower rates while lowering the tariff on fortified rice kernels used in PDS to 5%. The council determined that 18% GST would be applied to the margin of suppliers for all used cars, including electric vehicles. Even though there won't be any tax transactions involving private citizens, businesses or used car sellers would be subject to the fee. According to Sitharaman, states desired a greater fee, but the Center had suggested a 5% tax on EVs. The GST Council issued a number of clarifications, one of which was that ready-to-eat popcorn would be subject to a 12% tax, similar to the namkeen tax, if it were pre-packaged with salt

and spices. Caramelized sugar will be subject to an 18% tax. In a similar vein, the council stated that as voucher transactions were neither a delivery of commodities nor services, they would not be subject to taxes. It also made it clear that small enterprises that pay rent to unregistered landlords and are covered by the reverse charge system will not be required.

Indian gold demand is dampened by price fluctuations

Delhi: This week, unpredictable pricing in India delayed gold purchases, while rising rates in China may balance seasonal demand. A Chennai jeweller claimed buyers are waiting for gold prices to fall after two weeks of volatility. After climbing to Rs 79,120 last week, Indian 10 grams prices dipped to Rs 75,459 (\$887.28) this week. Indian dealers offered a discount of up to \$8 an ounce over official domestic pricing, including 6% import and 3% sales levies, down from \$9 last week. Many states oppose insurance rate reduction

Delhi: The powerful GST Council may have to delay a decision on the middle class-focused issue of waiving goods and services tax (GST) on term insurance and lowering health insurance rates from 18% to 5% due to opposition from numerous states. However, it may raise the second-hand vehicle charge from 12% to 18%, rejecting demands to cut it to 5% for electric vehicles. Due to concerns from states like West Bengal, Kerala, and Karnataka, insurance has not received the backing expected while there is no consensus on



adjusting pricing. Bihar deputy chief minister Samrat Chaudhary led a GoM to modify prices. The Centre will need to work hard on Saturday to convince states to agree to Chaudhary's GoM's insurance tax adjustments. States worry that lower rates may reduce revenue, especially since the compensating cess was removed to compensate for gaps. The Centre and states collected Rs 16,400 crore from GST on life and health insurance in 2023-24, down somewhat from the year before. Revenue loss could reach Rs 2,500 crore yearly. Since the anti-profiteering clause has been removed, it is unclear how the GST Council can ensure that consumers benefit from lower taxes.

Adani Defence & Aerospace buys Air Works for Rs 400 crore

Delhi: Adani Defence & Aerospace said that it had reached a formal agreement to acquire Air Works, India's largest private-sector MRO provider, for Rs 400 crore. "Adani Defence Systems & Technologies Ltd (ADSLT) has signed a

share purchase agreement to acquire 85.8 per cent shareholding in Air Works India (Engineering) Private Ltd," a press release said. Air Works maintains narrow-body, turboprop, and rotary aircraft in Hosur, Mumbai, and Kochi

with regulatory permits from over 20 countries. The statement stated Air Works, a civil aviation industry leader, has deep defence MRO capabilities, executing projects for major Indian Navy and Air Force aircraft.

Over 1.6 crore Jio subscribers leave in four months

Delhi: At Reliance Jio Infocomm Ltd., India's largest telecom operator, approximately 1.65 crore subscribers have dropped in the past four months. Reliance Jio lost 37.6 lakh mobile users in October, 79 lakh in September, 40 lakh in August, and 7.58 lakh in July. Airtel, India's second-largest telecom carrier, gained roughly 24 lakh members in October after losing 14.3 lakh in September, according to TRAI data. In August and July 2024, Airtel lost 24 lakh and 16 lakh users. In October, Vodafone Idea lost 19 lakh mobile subscribers, up from 15.5 lakh in September.

Redeveloping railway stations opens Rs 30,000 cr in business opportunities

Delhi: EPC companies are expecting Rs 30,000 crore in business from contracts to redevelop/revamp railway stations in the next two years. The Railways have sanctioned 1,318 station redevelopment/revamps, which Icra Ratings estimates will provide Rs 30,000 crore in commercial potential for EPC firms over the next two years. The government previously planned most station renovation projects as public-private partnerships, accounting for 12% of the national asset monetisation pipeline target. However, due to pricing restrictions, real estate development market risks, and a lack of PPP experience in railways, the government reallocated station redevelopment work to the EPC mode in December 2022 and increased the budgetary allocation by more than seven times from Rs 2,159 crore in FY23 to Rs 15,511 crore in FY25. Railway station rehabilitation offers EPC businesses Rs 30,000 crore in business potential due to intense competition in traditional segments like roads and buildings, according to Vinay Kumar G of the agency. In the past two years, station redevelopment project awards have seen modest competition, with maximum discounts of up to 18% and a median discount of up to 4%, similar to other railway EPC projects with a median discount of up to 5%.

Canon targets chip companies opening India operations



Delhi: Japanese image and optical products giant Canon India President and CEO Toshiaki Nomura feels its semiconductor lithography equipment for chip production has a bright promise in India and is in negotiations with firms putting up facilities here. Canon did not identify names but said there is huge potential since several chip manufacturers are considering India for semiconductor manufacturing. Many chipmakers are considering India as a new manufacturing location.

Nomura informed us that they are discussing our product and service with all chip manufacturers. He said this is a "good opportunity for us" for the Tokyo-based business to contribute its technology, goods, and services to this Indian market area. "We install equipment to make chips using our technology and goods. Negotiations are underway.

NHPC invests 25,500 cr in Bihar 1,000 MW solar project

Delhi: NHPC Ltd.'s chairman and managing director Raj Kumar Chaudhary announced that the country's largest hydropower company will invest Rs 5,500 crore in a 1,000-megawatt solar power project in Bihar. At the Bihar Business Connect 2024 investor forum, the business and state government signed an investment MoU. "We have proposed to invest Rs 5,500 crore in setting up a 1,000 MW solar power project," stated. The project might be launched in 1.5-2 years after land purchase. Land is essential for solar projects. He urged the state government to help acquire land so we could finish the project on schedule. The company's website says it has roughly 7 gigawatts of active hydropower projects and 9.3 under construction. Chaudhary said NHPC plans to build a modest solar plant to create green hydrogen. "The green hydrogen produced will be used to power passenger buses," stated.

Delhi : Sanyam Bhardwaj, CBSE's examination controller, says pupils often encounter academic stress, peer pressure, substance abuse, mental health issues, career worries, digital addiction, and life skills. Collaborations like "Say No to Drugs and Yes to Life" with NCB, IHBAS, and others boost students' mental health and life skills. Campaigns teach pupils drug dangers, coping methods, and early intervention. Through expert-led conversations and interactive activities, CBSE encourages awareness, pushing students towards a mindful and holistic life. Through such seminars, programmes and summits for students, parents, counsellors and principals in schools, CBSE continues to increase its outreach, benefiting thousands annually. The 2025 CBSE board exam format modification was made to eliminate rote learning. Board



exams vary from other competitive exams in that they have extended responses and objective questions. Some problems don't require direct solutions; they can be solved in steps that earn points. Competency-based questions need steps to answer and are based on the application, thus they can't be answered by cramming. He thinks that increasing the amount of competency-based questions from 40% in 2023-24 to 50% in 2024-25 will eliminate rote memorization. Bhardwaj says that pupils who attend class consistently tend to solve the huge, complex

questions and answer appropriately on tests. Students who just prepare for objective-type questions and don't attend school will miss the steps and write answers immediately in the Board exams, losing scores. "In fact, it has been seen many times that a student is able to perform well in competitive examinations and fails to perform well in the Board examinations," says Bhardwaj.

To protect pupils, CBSE has cut ties with 21 "dummy" schools and degraded six. To avoid disruption, fake school students in classes X and XII were allowed to take the Boards.

Delhi: The third-generation Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) will get a boost from Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's announcement of new facilities to accommodate 6,500 more undergrads over five years. The finance minister said in her Union Budget speech Saturday that IIT Patna's dormitories and infrastructure would be increased. "The total number of students in 23 IITs has increased by 100 percent from 65,000 to 1.35 lakh in the past 10 years. Sitharaman remarked, "New infrastructure will be built in the five IITs founded after 2014 to educate 6,500 more stu-

dents." In 2024, the 23 IITs offered 17,740 seats across various courses and categories. The five IITs founded after the Modi government took office in 2014 were in Tirupati, Palakkad, Bhilai, Jammu, and Goa, plus ISM Dhanbad become IIT (ISM) Dhanbad.

Five IITs, barring IIT Goa, will add seats, officials said. IIT Goa lacks a permanent campus, though many fledgling IITs have grown steadily. Since 2016, it has been in temporary facilities at Goa Engineering College in Farmagudi. A senior official in the Ministry of Education remarked, "IIT-Goa has not been

included at this moment since it does not have a permanent campus." Additionally, the government announced to grant 10,000 fellowships for tech research at IITs and Indian Institute of Science (IISc) for the next five years under the PM Research Fellowship Scheme. The government has raised IIT funding to Rs 11,349 crore, 10% more than last year's Rs 10,324.5 crore estimate and 8.4% more than the revised Rs 10,467.13 crore estimate. The higher education budget has risen by 5% to Rs 50,077.95 crore from Rs 47,619.77 crore and by 7.7% from Rs 46,482.35 crore previous year.

The government of Maharashtra says it would not pay for eggs for the midday meal.

Delhi: The opposition vehemently criticized the decision, as Maharashtra became the latest BJP-ruled state to ban eggs from midday meals for students in grades 1 through 8. The school education department changed the list of foods served during midday meals in a government resolution this week, eliminating the inclusion of sugar and eggs. Rather, it instructed schools to serve nachni sattu and "egg pulao" as optional meals. Nonetheless, it stated that these things, as well as sugar for desserts, had to be organized by the general public without the need for further government support. The state has changed the list to adhere to the meal items prescribed by the Center, according to an official who defended the action. While some states use their own resources to offer eggs, the federal government, which provides 60% of the funding for midday meals, does not include them in its list. Goa and Madhya Pradesh recently banned eggs due to criticism from some groups.

Health and wealth benefit from flexible work hours.

Delhi: The Economic Survey supports allowing manufacturers to average legally capped working hours over three weeks or longer rather than week-by-week. Industry captains want larger hours. Delhi: Business Standard sources reported that SpiceJet informed the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) that it will spend Rs 400 crore in two years to restore 36 grounded planes. The regulator met with the carrier last Friday to discuss restoring grounded jets. Sources said this followed the airline's Rs 3,000 crore qualifying institutional placement from global investors and mutual funds. The airline did not respond to Business Standard's request for comment. At the QIP, the airline identified 36 grounded aircraft out of 58. The EC also allowed a university representation on St. Stephen's College's governing body to connect DU and the college. DU also updated donation rules to fund scholarships, honors, and capital assets. Under this, the government, trusts, and corporations may set up scholarships. Under this, the establishment of scholarships will be allowed by government entities, trusts, business houses.

New UPSC PwBD guidelines avoid misconduct and fraudulent certifications



Delhi: The Union Public Service Commission (UPSC)'s CSE 2025 requires online submission of certificates and documents at the preliminary stage of the exam, which includes submitting the necessary information and supporting documents for various claims, such as date of birth, category (SC/ST/OBC/EWS/PwBD/Ex-Servicemen), educational qualification, and Service preferences, with the Online Application Form. Examination candidature will be canceled if the registration and online application form lack the relevant information/documents. "All of these changes should be explicitly stated in the notification, or the exam-conducting authority can create an educational video for specially abled candidates," he says. They appear puzzled and

unable to complete the Prelims application form (due February 11, 2025). Candidates must also write about their interests, hobbies, achievements, and NCC Scout participation in the Prelims, which were previously announced after the Mains. "The goal is to get the best candidate profile information before the Prelims," Kottaram explains. IRS officers were recruited under PwBD reservation advantages. UPSC must examine claims and papers if aspirants submit fraudulent documents. Kottaram notes that mental illness is a grey area in

the notification's five impairment categories, making it easy to misuse. Accreditation teams will now perform evaluations exclusively online, replacing on-cams visits with virtual examinations. But for colleges, the changeover will be hybrid; most inspections will be remote, but some reviewers will still visit campuses to retain some monitoring. The decision follows the CBI's recent arrests in the case involving Andhra Pradesh's Koneru Lakshmaia Education Foundation (KLEF), where management reportedly

bribed NAAC peer visit inspectors for good ratings. "We chose to do whatever it takes to eliminate corruption. Stopping in-person visits will greatly reduce the issue," stated NAAC executive committee head Prof Anil Sahasrabudhe.

"With so many weekly inspection visits, it was hard to track what happened. Now, all this is recorded." NAAC head Ganesan Kannabiran hailed the switch to online inspection a "surgical strike" against corruption. The latest CBI law-

suit challenged NAAC's peer review system. He remarked, "These are unwelcome in higher education, and NAAC, a quality assurance agency, is committed to eradicating them." The K Radhakrishnan Committee's basic (binary) accreditation scheme was to begin in July 2024, but it didn't. It's currently April-May 2025. The new schedule will also introduce maturity-based graded levels (MBGL) to encourage institutions to improve their academic and research capacities. Special committees are completing its framework. 650 schools are in line for the old grading system.

Low affordability hits car demand: Kia India MD

NEW DELHI: With car prices going up between 35-50% over the past 3-4 years, owing to safety and emissions mandates, affording a vehicle has become difficult for mass consumers and sales are likely to see a moderate growth of 3-4% in the coming year, Kia India MD Gwangju Lee said on Thursday.

To generate demand, Lee suggests, govt can look at reducing taxes on cars from the current levels where mid-sized cars and bigger ones have a GST rate of over 45%, while smaller ones (under 4-meters) are taxed at over 28%.

As the company prepares to launch affordable EVs as well as other mainstream cars, Lee said that the increase in car prices came at a time when incomes for many middle-class users did not go up at the same pace. As part of its strategy to perk up demand in the volume-laden entry SUV market, Kia drove in the all-new Syros mini offroader, which will stand besides its Sonet



model, also an under 4-meter car.

Lee said that the boxy Syros, which will come with a 1-litre petrol engine and a 1.5-litre diesel, will also be offered with an electric version over the next one year. The company has developed the new vehicle after taking into account the customer preferences here, something it also did during the development of the Seltos and Sonet SUVs and the Carens MPV. But while the company expects to generate healthy volumes from the new model, whose price will be revealed at a later date, the Syros also comes in a segment that is crowded.

Amazon's cloud unit bets on new models

LAS VEGAS: Amazon's cloud unit AWS unveiled new AI models and chips to take on rivals like Microsoft, which has had an edge due to its ties with ChatGPT-maker OpenAI. Exactly two years ago, the launch of ChatGPT forced tech giants to redraw plans, wiping out billions from market caps of companies that were slow to adapt. Pioneered renting out data infrastructure, was seen to be losing grip on its cloud dominance over the past two years.

NEW DELHI: The Centre has circulated a draft legislation to ban lending by unregulated entities, including by platforms, with violators facing imprisonment of up to seven years. Lenders, who harass and use unlawful means for recovery, face up to 10 years in jail, with those promoting such lending facing a term of up to five years.

The move comes amid several complaints of borrowers taking loans from digital lending platforms, including those operated by Chinese entities, at exorbitant rates. And these platforms often harass cus-



tomers by blackmailing them in case of defaults. There have been instances of borrowers committing suicides due to harassment, prompting the Centre and the regulator to step in. The plan is to notify certain activities as "unregulated lending" with a

"competent authority" tasked with regulating the segment and also maintain a database on lenders. The authority headed by a secretary-rank officer will have powers to provisionally attach the accounts of the lender and call for data.

Private Equity and Venture Capital investments surge 156% year-on-year

NEW DELHI: Private Equity and Venture Capitalist funds invested \$4 billion in November, according to a joint report by IVCA and EY released on Wednesday. This shows a 156 per cent year-on-year increase while a 15 per cent decline from the

previous month. The month recorded 87 transactions, up 47 per cent from 59 deals in November 2023. While 2024 had started off on a strong note, geopolitical tensions, uncertainty over US elections outcome, and inflation weighed on the markets, as did the bid-ask spread between seller expectations and buyer valuations," EY's Vivek Soni said. He further said that pure-play PE/VC investments showed significant growth, reaching \$3.5 billion in November, representing a 297 per cent rise.



\$11.3 billion: Startup funding sees marginal rise in 2024

MUMBAI: After two years of funding slump, investments into India's startups are seeing some revival. Investors infused about \$11.3 billion into startups this year, a slight improvement from funding worth \$10.7 billion recorded last year, data sourced from market research firm Tracxn showed. In the coming year, companies are expected to see a sizeable amount of funding cheques but the deployment of capital will be cautious, keeping in line with the trend seen for quite sometime now and late-stage deals (over \$100 million) will take time to close, venture capital (VC) firms said. Not to say that there's a lack of capital-VC firms raised an estimated \$2.5 billion in funding in 2024 alone compared to less than \$2 billion in 2023 and some of them plan to raise new funds in 2025; but investors want to ensure they make the right bets.

"As investors, we are very clear that we need to see a company's path to profitability, we need to see good governance structures, assess firms' go-to market strategies deeply and figure out founders' ability to deliver. When you diligence all of these, it takes some time and investing capital takes longer," Padmaja Ruparel, co-founder at IAN (Indian Angel Network) Group told. Quick commerce player Zepto led startup funding this year having bagged \$1.4 billion in investments alone amid a surge in investor appetite for rapid deliveries. A clutch of companies including PhysicsWallah, Rebel Foods, Eruditus and Purple also managed to raise fund.

Sensex tanks nearly 1,000 pts on US Fed's cautious stance

MUMBAI: Hawkish statements from the US central bank chief on Wednesday night led to a global sell-off in stocks that also weighed on investor sentiment on Dalal Street. Sensex opened weak, remained in the red through the session and closed 964 points down at 79,218 points.

This was the first time since Nov 29 that the index closed below the psychologically important 80K mark, BSE data showed. In the last four sessions the sensex has lost a little over 2,900 points, translating to 3.6%. On the NSE, the nifty too followed a similar path and closed 247 points lower at 23,952 points. This was nifty's first close below the 24K mark since Nov 28, NSE data showed. In Thursday's session selling was across the board with foreign funds again leading. At close, net selling by foreign portfolio investors (FPIs) was Rs 4,225 crore. In comparison, domestic funds were net buyers at Rs 3,943 crore, data from BSE showed.


