Yamuna water level close to danger mark

Risk of flood

Due to the opening of all 18 gates of Hathnikund Barrage

New Delhi: The water level of Yamuna in Delhi has reached 205.24 meters, very close to the danger mark, raising the risk of flood here. Due to the opening of all 18 gates of Hathnikund Barrage in Haryana and the release of about 1.78 lakh cusecs of water, the threat of flood has started looming over Delhi. The water level of Yamuna in Delhi rose



above the warning mark of 204.5 meters and reached 205.24 meters by 1 pm today. The danger mark of Yamuna in Delhi is 205.33. The Delhi government says that the situation is being constantly monitored. In the advisory issued on Sunday by the Irrigation and Flood

Control Department of the Delhi Government, it has been said that the water level of Yamuna can cross 206 meters at 2 am on August 19. The department has issued instructions to vacate the ghats of Yamuna. Delhi Pradesh Congress Committee President Devendra said in an ex

post that due to the rapid rise in the water level of Yamuna river, there is a danger of flood looming over Delhi.

For Delhi, which gets flooded even with a little rain, this situation is extremely serious and sensitive. He said that we hope that the government will immediately take all necessary precautions. Flood management, cleaning of drains and disaster relief preparations should not be seen only in files but in ground reality. The lives of Delhiites are at stake and this is not the time for political rhetoric but for responsibility and accountability.

Notice to Centre and Army chiefs regarding insurance coverage of cadets

New Delhi: The Supreme Court has taken suo motu cognizance of the situation of cadets who were expelled from military institutions due to disability during military training. The bench headed by Justice BV Nagarathna has asked the Central Government and all the Army Chiefs whether such cadets can be given any other alternative job in the army after treatment. The next hearing of the case will be on September 4. The court also issued



notice to the Center and the Chiefs of the Air Force, Army and Navy. During the hearing, the court suggested the government to consider giving insurance cover to such cadets, increasing financial assistance. The court asked ASG Aishwarya Bhati, appearing for the Central Government, to obtain instructions from the Central Government regarding.

Instructions for action against those selling fake fertilizers, seeds and pesticides

I visited the field yesterday, hundreds of farmers were present there: Shivraj

New Delhi: Union Agriculture and Farmers Welfare Minister Shivraj Singh Chauhan has taken a tough stand on the issue of sale of fake fertiliz-



ers, seeds and pesticides. In a high-level meeting with senior officials of the department and Indian

Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) at Krishi Bhavan on Monday, he directed to take strict action against

those selling fake fertilizers, seeds and pesticides. The Agriculture Minister said that factories and shops should be sealed if any irregularities are found. Shivraj Singh said that all the officials should take the damage of farmers' crops very seriously, so that farmers can be saved from losses. He has also given instructions to conduct raids on a large scale and to go to the fields and investi-

gate. In the meeting, Shivraj Singh said that not just one but hundreds of farmers in different districts are facing problems due to fake fertilizers, seeds and pesticides. Such complaints come from many places, farmers say that they are putting medicine in the field but it is not having any effect.

Shivraj Singh said, I am very worried. The pain of these farm-

ers should be understood seriously. Yesterday I myself went to the farmer's field and saw that the farmer had applied a medicine due to which the soybean crop was completely destroyed. When I visited the field yesterday, hundreds of farmers were present there. He said that those who sell such cheap or fake medicines and fertilizers and seeds should not be spared at all.

New Delhi: The Supreme Court, while hearing a case, said that when the condition of roads is so bad that there is a 12-hour long traffic jam, then how can people be charged Rs 150 as toll. Commenting on the problem of traffic and waterlogging in



Delhi, it said that Delhi becomes paralyzed in two hours of rain. Chief Justice made this

remark while hearing a petition of the National Highway Authority. The National Highway Authority had challenged the order of the Kerala High Court, in which the Court had banned toll collection on a dilapidated National Highway 544.

CM issues stern warning over NSA and Gangster Act

Delhi: Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath has issued a warning that those who use drones without proper authorization or who distribute false information about them in an effort to incite fear may face prosecution under the Gangster Act and, in extreme circumstances, the National Security Act (NSA). He ordered high-ranking authorities to take strong action against infractions and to increase district-level drone surveillance and patrols. False allegations of burglars in western UP using drones to scout homes they target have sparked a spate of mob attacks, which led to the instruction. Yogi stated during a review conference with senior police officials that the state had outlawed the unlawful use of UAVs and that anyone caught misusing them will face legal consequences. Drone abuse, he said, would not be accepted. We will not



Yogi administration monitors decline in Haj applications

Delhi: Out of a total of 30,000 spots available for Hajj-2026, just 13,000 have been filled out thus far. An additional seven days, until August 7, are now available for application submissions. There were 13,600 pilgrims who made the Hajj last year, with 15,000 applications received out of a possible 30,000. The state got over 17,000 Haj applications in 2024.

As of 2023, the figure was at 26,000. As a fundamental tenet of Islam, the Haj is a pil-

grimage that all Muslims are obligated to undertake. We sent a letter to the Centre, and as a result, they extended the deadline for Haj 2026 applications by one week, from July 31, 2025, to July 31, 2026.

The minister of state for minority welfare, Muslim waqf, and haj in Uttar Pradesh, Danish Azad Ansari, stated that they have received approximately 13,000 applications thus far, but they are optimistic that this figure will rise.

Government personnel cannot be fired due to disability

Delhi: The Supreme Court ruled that public sector companies cannot automatically retire employees who develop disabilities while on the job without considering viable redeployment options. The court emphasized that an employer's discretion stops at the employee's dignity. While judicial caution is necessary to prevent abuse, it shouldn't be used as a reason to ignore injustice. "The Court is not crossing a line by intervening, it is upholding one drawn by the Constitution itself," reaffirmed a bench of justices JK Maheshwari and Aravind Kumar, in a major affirmation of the constitutional right to dignity and equality in



employment, when an employee is removed from service for a condition he did not choose and where viable alternatives are ignored. A judge ordered the Telangana State Road Transport Corporation (TSRTC) to rehire a driver who had been forcibly retired in 2016 due to a diagnosis of

color blindness in their ruling on August 1. The court slammed TSRTC for crossing the line into administrative error and violating constitutional principles and statutory requirements by not considering the driver's expressed desire to be reassigned to a non-driving position.

Nitish Kumar-led Bihar govt doubles honorarium for school support staff

Delhi: Support staff in state-run schools, including kitchen staff, security guards, and PE teachers, will see a significant rise in their honorarium, according to JD(U) leader and Bihar chief minister Nitish Kumar, who made the announcement just

before the state's elections. Announcement made. According to the CM, this move is in line with the state's efforts to improve education since his administration took power in November 2005. We have been relentlessly pursuing educational

reform since our government was formed in November 2005. The overall education budget has grown from 4,366 crore in 2005 to 77,690 crore currently, according to Kumar. The amended structure increases the monthly payment for chefs.

Abhishek Banerjee named TMC Lok Sabha unit head

Delhi: West Bengal chief minister Mamata Banerjee has handed her nephew and the Trinamool Congress' (TMC) national general secretary Abhishek Banerjee charge of the party's Lok Sabha unit amid a fresh public slanging match between its lawmakers Mahua Moitra and Kalyan Banerjee. According to party leaders aware of the matter, Kalyan on Monday offered to resign as the party's chief whip in the Lok Sabha after the fallout. The resignation is yet to be accepted, said the party leaders. "Abhishek Banerjee called me and told me not to push my resignation. He said, 'He wants to talk to me.'" Moitra, when asked about Kalyan's purportedly sexist comments



during the 2024 Lok Sabha campaign, said, "You don't wrestle with a pig because then you get dirty." "There are deeply misogynistic and sexually frustrated people in India and they have representation in Parliament," she added.

Kalyan Banerjee, in a post on X, hit back at Moitra. I

have taken note of the recent personal remarks made by Ms. Mahua Moitra in a public podcast. Her choice of words, including the use of dehumanising language such as comparing a fellow MP to a "pig", is not only unfortunate but reflects a deep disregard for basic norms of civil discourse."

Bastar villages get 300 phone towers

Delhi: Centre and state have built at least 300 cell phone towers in Chhattisgarh's Bastar region in areas freed from Maoist rule in the last year. Security troops and Maoists fight over cell phone towers. Tower construction is a government priority. Destroying them is equally vital to Maoists. According to sources, at least 32 cell phone towers were built in Abhujmad, a vast forest of 5,000 sq km in Maoist-affected Bastar regions. In recent years, security troops penetrated portions of Abhujmad that had never been mapped and was Maoist-controlled.

Why can't you forget your differences: Raj Thackeray



Delhi: If Raj and Uddhav Thackeray can come together after 20 years, why should party workers fight among themselves? This is what Maharashtra Navnirman Sena (MNS) chief Raj Thackeray asked his party's office bearers as he urged them to set aside their differences and come together ahead of the local body elections across the state, according to senior leader Bala Nandgaonkar. Addressing his party's Mumbai-based office bearers and workers at Rangasharda

Auditorium, Thackeray said that everyone in the party should work together to ensure its victory in the upcoming civic polls, and leave the issue of forging alliances to him, Nandgaonkar told reporters. With local body elections, including the crucial Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) polls approach-

ing, Raj organised Monday's meeting to rally MNS workers and give some important instructions. "He said that all workers, including former candidates and office bearers, must be taken along in the process," said N a n d g a o n k a r . Thackeray expects the BMC polls to be held in January or February next year.

Court challenges Uttar Pradesh government's Bankey Bihari temple ordinance

Delhi: The Supreme Court found that the government of Uttar Pradesh had moved in a "clandestine" and "tearing hurry" when it passed an ordinance to seize the Bankey Bihari temple in Mathura. The state and the temple administration were given one day to respond to the court's proposal that an interim administrative committee, presided over by a former high court judge, oversee the day-to-day operations of the temple and make recommendations for its comprehensive development with the goal of encouraging religious tourism. The "Uttar Pradesh Shri Bankey Bihari Ji Temple Trust Ordinance, 2025" was signed into law by the Uttar Pradesh government on May 26. This ordinance granted a state-run trust the authority to oversee the temple's operations and finances. The UP government was

In response to recent comments made by the Supreme Court in a case concerning the alleged harassment of a Noida resident for feeding stray dogs, the protest was spearheaded by former Union minister and senior BJP functionary Vijay Goel. Creating a safe haven in your own home is our recommendation.

The highest court in the land had made the remark, "Feed every dog in the community in your own house," emphasizing the need of protecting both stray animals and the public from harm.

Visitor registration for Mussoorie is now mandatory

Delhi : The Uttarakhand tourism agency has implemented a new requirement that all tourists visiting Mussoorie must now fill out an online registration form. When guests check in at hotels, guesthouses, or homestays, they will be asked to fill out an application. After

visitor footfall nearly doubled between 2022 and 2024, the change became operational to tackle overcrowding and manage traffic. A report on tourist arrivals in the town can be obtained by registering guests, according to Brijendra Pandey, the district tourism officer. Businesses must first

register on the site by entering information such as the owner's name and phone number, the facility's type (hotel, homestay, other), the property's name, the number of rooms, and the total capacity.

After that, they will take attendance. We have asked

our fellow hoteliers to comply with the new restrictions, as per the directions of the tourism department," Mussoorie Hotels Association president Sanjay Aggarwal said. Hoteliers are divided on the matter; some see the change as a "hindrance" while others support it.

A fresh plea for help in the fight against Delhi's stray dog problem



Delhi: The increasing problem of stray dogs in Delhi has been reaffirmed by former Union minister Vijay Goel, who has repeatedly demanded that the government and the MCD act swiftly to address the issue. Goel urged that anyone feeding stray dogs in public locations be fined and that FIRs be lodged, citing a recent incident in Mumbai as an example. "Rabies, a deadly disease, can be transmitted through dog bites. Rabies kills more than 20,000 people annually in India.

"Why can't people who feed stray dogs on the streets be held accountable if pigeon feeders can be?" he said. According to Goel, the Brihanmumbai


Municipal Corporation (BMC) was ordered to record FIRs against violators in a recent judgment by the Bombay High Court, which deemed mass pigeon

feeding a public annoyance and health threat. The five demands that he had previously stated—a toll-free hotline for complaints, recompense for victims of dog bites, penalties and formal reports for public feeding, a census of stray dogs immediately, and improved money and personnel to change the Animal Birth Control (ABC) Rules—were restated. To put an end to the practice of public feeding of stray dogs, he demanded the deployand civil defense volunteers.

The family members kept the body in the hospital premises for about 4 hours and kept demanding action against the doctor. On receiving the information, police force from many police stations also reached the spot. After the assurance of police officers, the body was taken from the hos-

pital. The post-mortem of the body will be done tomorrow. The wife said, action should be taken against the doctor who performed the operation. The family members say that the operation was done by Dr. Rajul Abhishek of SRN Hospital. The wrong operation was done and after the operation, the patient's condition deteriorated and he died. The doctor said, the number will come after a month in SRN. Dr. Mukesh Kumar Yadav (35 years) was a resident of Lalgopalganj, Kasimpur village of Soraon tehsil. He was a

veterinary doctor. He was suffering from primary stage of mouth cancer. He had come to Tata Hospital for a checkup. Wife Kiran Yadav said, "I had shown Rajul Abhishek to SRN hospital. They said, it will cost three lakh rupees and the patient will be cured. The doctor said, we will have to wait for a month to get the operation done in SRN hospital. Therefore, the operation will have to be done in a private hospital. After this, the operation started at 3.40 pm on Friday in Mohak Hospital. He was conscious for 12

hours of the operation. He also made hand gestures. After this, he became unconscious. He was taken to the ventilator. But the husband died. Seeing the atmosphere getting chaotic, the staff left the hospital and ran away. Seeing the anger of the family members, the entire staff of the hospital ran away from there. The entire hospital was transformed into a police camp. The new patients who were coming kept waiting in the waiting area for hours. Wife Kiran and father were crying badly. Father said, the doctor had asked for 6 units of blood, we immediately arranged for the blood and brought it. Wife Kiran says crying that she has 2 small children. We and the children were the only support. Went.

Encounter between police and criminals, two criminals got shot in the leg

Lucknow: Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, on Monday, said that unlike before 2017 when it often took years to nab criminals, Uttar Pradesh police now apprehend them within 24 to 48 hours, aided by technology and forensic science. The Chief Minister made the statement while inaugurating the three-day International Summit on the Dimensions of Cyber War, Multilateral Legal Framework, Forensics and Strategic Countermeasures, organized on the third foundation day of the Uttar Pradesh State Institute of Forensic Sciences (UPSIFS) in Lucknow. The Chief Minister added, "In Indian



tradition, every churning has always yielded Amrit. This tradition, continuing since the Vedic era, finds expression in the grand events at the

four Kumbh locations of the country. Such traditions keep alive India's ancient knowledge systems, strengthen social unity, and encourage the exchange of ideas. India's naval diplomacy: Building trust in the oceans

India's focus on its land borders has historically stemmed from past learnings from medieval-era invasions and in the current era, involved conflicts over land borders or around states contiguous to its boundaries. It is only in the last few decades that the role of the Indian Navy has gained prominence, as India aims to step up to a larger role in the global power hierarchy. In 2020, as India and China clashed in Galwan, several analysts pointed towards the need to use India's natural maritime advantages in its regional rivalry with China and in more effective power projection as an emerging and responsible global force. Keeping in mind India's ambitions in steering regional geopolitics, the role of the Indian Navy emerged from the shadows of India's arsenal to take on a more prominent role. Aside from developing its capabilities, India has recently played an active role in humanitarian and rescue missions, thus stamping its growing reputation as a responsible and capable maritime power. In the process, the navy has become a chief instrument in providing teeth to the country's aspirations outside the region. The Indian Navy is increasingly being seen as a capable and confident naval power that can be relied upon to make the seas a safer zone. "I think the scale of India's naval deployment is quite unprecedented, and in some ways this represents the confidence the Indian Navy has in its own abilities and the requirement to be seen as a benevolent regional player that is not simply looking after its own interests but also the interests of the global common," says Harsh Pant of the Observer Research Foundation in New Delhi. As the war wages in Gaza and with the Yemen-based Houthi rebels attempting to broaden the war by mounting attacks against passing ships, the US has retaliated by striking the Houthis. The war occasionally threatens to spill over to other parts of the region aside from the environmental risks that sinking of ships pose to the coral reefs in the region. Amidst this, India has made its presence felt by deploying warships and surveillance east of the Red Sea against any attack by the Houthis and pirates. In this context, it must be said that the Indian naval presence has made it safe for the conduct of commercial trade in the region.

With the states around India possessing limited capacity to use naval capabilities in the high seas, there has been a regular concern around the lack of law enforcement in the seas as pirates have continued to enjoy the largesse of terrorist groups, smuggling contraband, trafficking and attacking commercial vessels and affecting trade. "Maritime power is more than a matter of policing the commons or accumulating and projecting military force in the littorals. Sea power is equally about creating prosperity for the people and meeting the needs of national development," writes Abhijit Singh, Head of the Maritime Policy Initiative at the Observer Research Foundation. It was China that sent its naval ships to the Gulf of Aden two decades ago to ensure that commercial vessels were safe from pirates. Over the years, China has muscled its way into the Indian Ocean Region and in doing so, has raised concerns about its intent of colonial expansion. On the other hand, an expanding Indian role in protecting waters is building its credibility as a naval power that has both the capacity and the willingness to deploy naval assets to protect the sea lanes of communication, without attracting the unease that China's ulterior aims in its investments in ports and infrastructure projects have aroused. India's consistent patrolling is a reassuring presence in the deep waters. that cuts through ideological swamps.

The role of state fiscal capacities in national growth

India's economic progress is a composite reflection of the growth trajectories of its states. Given the federal structure of the country, each state operates with a degree of autonomy in implementing policies that drive their individual economies. This results in a broad spectrum of growth rates across states, highlighting significant disparities. For the nation to achieve holistic growth, it is imperative for all states to experience economic advancement. Despite this, there is a notable discrepancy in the attention paid to fiscal matters at different levels of government. The Union Budget, detailing the central government's finances, often



garners substantial scrutiny and debate for its potential impacts on the nation's economic direction. In contrast, state budgets, which are crucial for addressing local needs and fostering regional development, do not attract a similar level of public and analytical

scrutiny. Fiscal capacity, the government's ability to generate revenue from available tax and non-tax bases, is crucial for several reasons. First, it underpins a government's ability to provide essential public goods and services. These range from healthcare and education to

infrastructure and defense, which are fundamental for the welfare of the citizenry and the smooth functioning of the economy. Without adequate fiscal capacity, governments may struggle to maintain these services at levels that meet public demand and expectations, potentially leading to social unrest or a decline in the quality of life. Second, fiscal capacity is vital for economic development and growth. Governments need resources to invest in infrastructure projects like roads, bridges, and digital networks, which are critical for enhancing productivity and competitiveness. Such investments not only improve current living standards.

How data is fast becoming an X factor in elections?



Gone are the days when the primary form of electioneering was posters and rallies. Today, while these still have their role, what decides their content, their location, and even their timing, is guided by finely honed data. This data decides what the messaging should be, where rallies should be organised for maximum impact, and what their chronological sequencing should be.

The 2014 parliamentary elections, in which Narendra Modi emphatically triumphed, saw the first widespread use of data in both the planning of an election campaign and the selection of candidates. In the last ten years, this data-driven process has become far more sophisticated, complex and

accurate. Based on scientific surveys, cross-checked against multiple factors, political parties can check the on-ground, realistic popularity of candidates, irrespective of what they claim, what 'status' they enjoy, and how many times they may have won before. This assessment is combined with changing demographics, caste considerations, local issues, grassroots party organisation, strength of possible opposing candidates, and new faces within the party that may have appeared, to create an algorithm that can zero in, if done competently, on who is the best choice for a particular constituency.

However popular some political leaders were when they first won a seat, and

often won them again, anti-incumbency against the same face can become a critical factor. Often, candidates after they win, rest on their laurels, fail to fulfil their promises to the voters, neglect the constituency, or are widely perceived to be corrupt. In the past, their earlier reputation as winning candidates was taken at face value. No more. The mood of the public is dynamic and can never be taken for granted. If a charismatic leader from the opposing side has diligently worked in a constituency, has proven his or her sincerity in addressing the needs of the people, and is physically available on the ground, when by contrast the elected incumbent, although at one time popular, is missing, the voting pattern can change dramatically. This is precisely what the role of data plays in assessing the winnability of a candidate, and the need to retain or replace him or her. Data also determines messaging for an election. What are the issues a party should focus on, both generically and at the micro level? A generic message may appear to have large popular support, but it needs to be buttressed in each constituency by due emphasis on local issues which affect people of that particular area. This too can now be accessed by a competent database and individualised briefs given to

candidates. For instance, in Bihar, a survey showed that the biggest problem for most rural citizens is that of drainage and the absence of naalis to drain water out, especially after the monsoons. In UP, to give another example, one of the biggest problems farmers have to deal with is damage to crops by bulls, who cannot be culled and are left to fend for themselves. The short point is that the nature of election planning has changed. A new symbiotic relationship has emerged combining field data and number crunching in war rooms where the ubiquitous weapon is a computer. It is for this reason that political parties, who have done their homework, can announce candidates well in time to give them a first-mover advantage. In this process, many candidates are replaced, and new faces are announced. Winnability is the key criterion. In the 2019 West Bengal Assembly elections, Prashant Kishor, on the strength of precisely this form of data, dropped dozens of sitting candidates. Many of them then joined the BJP, but their unpopularity became a liability for the BJP. The BJP is by and large, following the same script, and that is why you see so many apparently established faces in the party not figuring in the party's list of candidates.

Bharat-Armenia: A tale of resilience diplomatic imperatives

In the words of British writer Annie Besant, "Hinduism is the soil into which India's roots are stuck, and torn out of that, she will inevitably wither as a tree torn out from its place. And if Hindus do not maintain Hinduism, who shall save it? If India's own children do not cling to her faith, who shall guard it? India alone can save India, and India and Hinduism are one." Hindus and Armenians share several striking similarities. Both cultures bear the weight of ancient civilizations, enduring centuries of history on their resilient shoulders. Each has confronted existential threats from expansionist empires harbouring genocidal intentions yet has managed to persevere against the odds. Both boast revolutionary



heroes, such as the Chapekar brothers and Soghomon Tehlirian, who bravely sought retribution against the oppressors of their people. Moreover, both communities have suffered territorial losses, witnessing the creation of new nations on lands once integral to their civilisations. They have also experienced the unsettling reality of historical enemies aligning against them. In addition, both Hindus and Armenians have found themselves confronting Western indifference and ignorance, bordering on

Hinduphobia and Armeniophobia, respectively, in the contemporary world. Those who harbour animosity towards our existence exhibit striking parallels amongst themselves. Their intolerance is palpable, mirroring a worldview wherein the dominance of their community is deemed inevitable. They display a resolute unresponsiveness to peace proposals, often resorting to warmongering tactics. Furthermore, they demonstrate a preposterous tendency to distort history, selectively

Why Israel must redefine notion of victory or else it risks losing war?

Two days after Hamas launched a horrific attack on Israel, on 7 October 2023, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu in his televised address announced five goals for his government and the IDF, which included among others destruction of Hamas. Destruction of Hamas is a military task which the IDF is pursuing in conjunction with other security agencies. The task requires the IDF to capture and kill Hamas' political and military leadership and as many members as possible, destroy the group's command and control capability and degrade its logistical capability and 'Gaza Metro'. Implicit in the tasks is securing the release of hostages and restoring deterrence against any further attack on Israel. Like most other modern militaries, the IDF too has struggled to find an answer to how to deal with a terrorist organisation which has the support of its people and external agencies. Ever since Operation Accountability and Operation Grapes of Wrath against Hezbollah in the 1990s the IDF operations have followed a predictable pattern, barring few exceptions – the IDF operations commence with air force strikes killing a few terrorist



leaders followed by a ground offensive when the group is still unbalanced, largely using standoff weapon systems. However, the terrorist groups recover soon and fight back. The IDF finds it difficult to keep the pressure and a negotiated settlement is sought, with international support, to terminate the war. Thereafter, Israel enjoys a limited period of peace before the next round of violence starts. The Israeli military doctrine is heavily biased in favour of the overwhelming use of air power and precision strikes, which the terrorist groups can counter by concealing fighters and resources, minimising electronic signatures, and using the Gaza Metro. The Israeli strategy euphemistically called the 'mowing the grass' strategy could never find a permanent solution to the raids by Hamas and other terrorist groups. To counter the predictability in operations, almost a decade ago, the IDF had conceptualised a plan

involving large-scale ground manoeuvre and capturing the three largest cities in Gaza - Gaza City, Khan Younis and Rafah – in two weeks. For some reason, the plans were shelved and never implemented.

During the tenure of Gadi Eisenkot, 21st Chief of Staff of the IDF, a plan codenamed, Operation Lightning Strike was also developed to overcome some of the challenges to ground manoeuvre. This was attempted in May 2021 with partial success, hence could not be repeated after the 7 October attack.

In the wake of the 7 October attack, the IDF had no plans for operations in the depth area, once the ground offensive began and had to hurriedly make one from scratch. On 20 October 2023, Defence Minister Yoav Gallant announced IDF's three-phase plan – air and ground campaign to destroy Hamas and its infrastructure, followed by low-intensity operations to destroy pockets of resistance and finally the creation of a new security regime and withdrawal of IDF.

The IDF conducted air campaigns and standoff attacks before initiating ground operations on 27 October. By then the element of surprise was lost and the Hamas and Islamic Jihad.

PM stops razing slums, vows to build homes instead

Delhi: Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta responded to accusations that the BJP is betraying its commitments to the urban poor by saying that her administration is willing to revise Delhi's slum policy. This comes as the BJP is under pressure from both the opposition and members of its own party over the continuing destruction of slums in the capital. Slum residents are the "backbone of Delhi's working class," according to Gupta, who has ordered a stop to all demolitions unless suitable alternatives are found beforehand. Additionally, the Delhi government has stated categorically that the capital will not be removing any slums. Gupta issued a stern warning to land-owning organizations such as the Railways and the Delhi Development Authority, urging them to "immediately cease" any eviction campaigns. She also threatened that her government would resort to



Two months from now, Delhi will get its first hot air balloon rides

Delhi: Hot air balloon excursions over the nation's capital will soon be available to Delhi residents. The rides would be available at four different locations in two months: Yamuna Sports Complex, Commonwealth Games Sports Complex, Asita, and Bandera. The Delhi Development Authority said this to promote eco-tourism and recreational activities. A private agency has been con-

tracted by DDA to operate the hot air balloon trips for an initial period of three years, with the option to extend it up to nine years. Daily flying windows of up to four hours will be allowed, with the possibility of extensions depending on demand or other needs, according to a statement from DDA. The rides will operate under a revenue-sharing arrangement, and the DDA's permission. legal action if required. The slum dwellers in R K Puram, an area where Prime Minister

Narendra Modi had previously promised that "no jhuggi would be demolished

Voting for the next Vice President will take place on September 9

Delhi: Vote tallying and the vice president election are scheduled for September 9, according to the Election Commission of India (EC). On August 7, you will receive the VP poll notification, and nomination papers are due by August 21. Nominations will be reviewed on August 22, and candidates have until August 25 to withdraw their names from consideration. According to an official declaration from the EC, a poll would be held on September 9 if needed. You can cast your ballot in the first floor Vasudha room of Parliament House (Room No. F-101). Jagdeep Dhankhar's abrupt departure on July



21st created an unusual mid-term vacancy in the second highest constitutional office in the nation, forcing the election of a new vice president. On July 22, the official gazette notice was published on the vacant office. Members of the electoral college, which includes representatives from both

houses of parliament, vote for the vice president. There are 233 elected members of the Rajya Sabha (currently five seats are empty), 12 nominated members of the Rajya Sabha, and 543 elected members of the Lok Sabha making up the electoral college for this year's election.

Delhi may eliminate the necessity for MCD health trade licenses to run restaurants

Delhi: The Delhi government may soon eliminate the need for a health trade license from the civic body to build restaurants and cafés in the city to enhance the hospitality sector. At the "Expresso" Lt Governor V K Saxena announced the city's

restaurant licensing requirement is being eliminated. The Delhi government and MCD did not immediately respond to the development. Recently, the Delhi government eliminated the need for hotels, clubs, restaurants, and guest

homes to get a police 'Eating House Registration and Lodging Certificate' to serve liquor. The L-G removed the Delhi Police Commissioner's ease-of-doing-business permit for the eating house registration certificate last month.



The capital's open-deck buses will soon be available for your riding pleasure

Delhi: Tourists visiting Delhi will be pleasantly surprised by the upcoming redesign of the city's Hop-on Hop-off (HoHo) bus service. The new buses will be cheaper to travel and will have decks that are partially open. Along with this, other routes will be added and the service's ticket pricing will be around INR 200, which is less than half of the existing ride. The new service is expected to launch before the end of this year, according to recent sources.



Tourists visiting various attractions across Delhi will have access to a flexible public transit network thanks to the service's introduction of interchange stations. The Delhi Tourism and Transportation Development Corporation (DTTDC) has submitted a revised model to the government for approval; the proposal was recently authorized by the government's planning department and is now awaiting clearance from the finance department. Further, the plan states that the government will provide rides at less than half the existing fare in order to attract more riders to the redesigned buses. The new 23 low-floor semi-open buses will replace the government's HoHo bus service. The estimated cost to the state government is INR 40 crore.

650 private hospitals in Haryana have decided to withdraw from the Ayushman Scheme

Delhi: The Haryana chapter of the Indian Medical Association has said that, starting August 7, 650 private hospitals in the state will no longer accept patients through the Ayushman Bharat program if the Centre's payment of Rs 500 crore is not paid by then.

There was a "chronic breakdown" in the state's administration of the scheme, according to officials of IMA (Haryana), who had previously issued a similar warning in January of this year. According to their claims, most private hospitals have had to use their own funds or refuse



patients since March because they have only received reimbursements equal to 10-15% of their billed amounts. "Things are even worse now than they were earlier. Without prompt payments, hospitals

will be unable to keep providing free treatment under the program. The current financial situation makes system operation unfeasible, according to Dr. Mahavir Jain, president of IMA (Haryana).

A New Blood Donor App Is Coming Soon to Delhi

Delhi : Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta announced that the city will soon release an app listing blood donors who are willing to donate their blood voluntarily. A blood donation camp in the Anand Vihar area was the site of the announcement, given by Ms. Gupta. "Details of those who intend to donate blood will soon be available on a blood donor app. "Details about their blood type, when they last donated, and whether they are eligible to donate again .

Might the Rohingya be considered refugees or unauthorized immigrants?

Delhi: The Supreme Court started looking into the status of Rohingya entrants in the nation as refugees or illegal migrants after hearing a number of petitions that fought against their deportation and demanded that the government do something to help them get the basics while they're in refugee camps. "Whether they are refugees or illegal migrants is the first major issue," a bench led by Justice Surya Kant stated. What follows is mere-



ly incidental. They have legal rights to certain protections if they are refugees. In that case, the bench—which also included Justices Dipankar Datta and N Kotiswar Singh—stated that the individuals in question should be

deported to their home country because they are considered unlawful aliens. Some 22 issues regarding the deportation of foreign nationals in detention camps or claiming refugee status were taken up by the court. The bench ordered that all cases involving Rohingya migrants be filed together. It mandated the consolidation of all cases involving foreign nationals into a single batch for independent consideration.

Govt. of Delhi unveils proposed regulations for social security labor code

Delhi: A social security board for unorganised workers and career centers to help entrepreneurs and job-seekers are two proposals put up by the Delhi government in the draft regulations released under the Code on Social Security.

The establishment of a social security fund, the formalization of worker compensation in the event of an accident, and maternity benefits are all proposed in the draft guidelines. The Delhi government's labor department has issued a call for public comments and recommendations, asking that those involved identify the chapter and rule or sub-rule that would be changed and explain why. Over five years after Parliament approved four labour laws, the Delhi government has now begun



to put them into effect with the release of these proposed regulations. The four codes, which consolidate 29 central labor regulations, were enacted in 2019 and 2020 with the aim of providing support for workers in the unorganised sector and accelerating economic reforms. The Code on Social Security is one of four codes in this set; the others deal with wages, industrial relations, and health, safety, and working conditions in the workplace.

Govt allocates 12,952 crore for public transport system

The BJP government, led by Chief Minister Rekha Gupta, presented its maiden budget on Tuesday, March 25. Gupta presented 1 lakh crore budget for 2025-26, a 31.56% increase from last year. In the budget for the financial year 2025-26, the government has allocated 12,952 crore to improve Delhi's public transport system. It has allocated 1,000 crore to improve the connectivity of Delhi with the NCR region.

Govt. to clarify exemption from 15-year 'End of Life' regulation in an effort to increase electric vehicle sales

Delhi: Apparently, the government is planning to clarify that the 15-year 'End of Life' (EoL) legislation does not apply to electric vehicles (EVs) in the near future, in an effort to encourage the widespread usage of electric buses, automobiles, and trucks. Additionally, the power ministry will hasten the rollout of the Corporate Average Fuel Economy (CAFE) standards to urban freight vehicles, buses, and trucks in an effort to lower fuel consumption and carbon dioxide emissions. The restric-



tions were finalized at a recent high-level conference headed by Rajiv Gauba, a member of Niti Aayog. They were put in place in response to concerns over the poor pace of electric vehicle penetration, which was 7.6% in 2024

compared to the 30% target for 2030. According to TOI, the adoption rate of two- and three-wheelers as well as buses is higher than that of four-wheelers, while e-trucks are still in the early stages of development .

Tickets to the Delhi Zoo could be priced up by 20

Delhi: In 2021, when the zoo reopened following the COVID-19 pandemic, admission prices were last raised. Adults now pay twice as much, from 40 to 80 rupees. Prices for adults were increased from ₹20 to ₹40 in 2013, prior to that. Several states and nations throughout the globe have



average adult ticket prices that

exceed ₹100. Our suggestion is probably going to be around these prices. There was talk of a potential hike at the latest conference, which might lead to higher ticket prices. According to a zoo official, "the last revision came in 2021." They also mentioned that the government has not received

any paperwork about the matter. In 1959, when the Delhi Zoo first opened to the public, admission was 20 paise for adults, 10 paise for children aged 5 to 12, and free for children under 5. Guests could also purchase an actual zoo map for 5 paise to use as a guide while they were there.

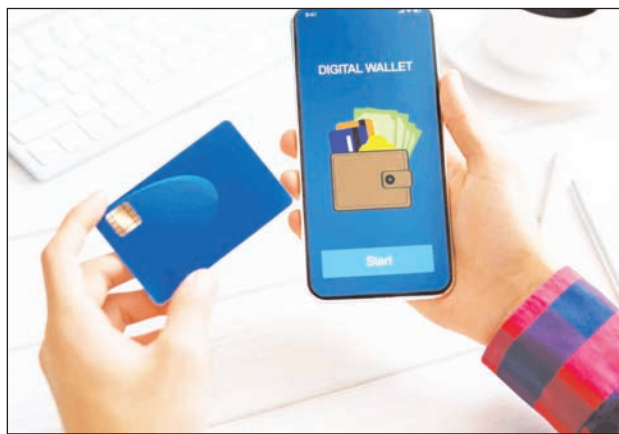

Delhi: Union agriculture minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan stated in a written reply in Lok Sabha that insurance companies still owe farmers thousands of crores in claims under the Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (PMFBY), the state's flagship crop insurance program, despite several efforts to guarantee prompt com-

pensation. Information stated in response to a query posed by Hanuman Beniwal, a member of parliament from the Rashtriya Loktantrik Party, indicates that the scheme had pending claims of ₹5405 crore spanning many seasons, which accounts for around 6% of all compensation applications, until the

harif or summer-sown season of 2024. The response notes that the unpaid claims are mostly due to disputes between state governments and insurance businesses that are part of the crop insurance program, incorrect or delayed insurance proposals from banks, and late distribution of subsidy shares by states.

Banks and NBFCs are limited by RBI to investing no more than 20% of the AIF scheme's corpus



Delhi: According to new rules released by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), Regulated Entities (REs) can only invest up to 20% of an AIF scheme's total capital. The RBI has said in a circular that no RE may put up more than 10% of an AIF scheme's total value. The maximum amount that any one RE can put into an AIF Scheme as a whole is 20% of the scheme's corpus, the document stated. Unless a RE determines an earlier date in accordance with its internal policy, these Directions will be effective as of January 1, 2026. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) stated in a circular that real estate investment funds (REFs) are required to make full provision up to the amount of their proportionate investment in the debtor company through the AIF Scheme, up to a maximum of their direct loanand/or investment exposure to the debtor company, if their contributions exceed 5% of the corpus of the AIF Scheme and the RE has downstream investment (excluding equity instruments) in the debtor company. The full investment amount must be subtracted from the RE's capital funds, specifically Tier-1 and Tier-2 capital, in proportion, if the contribution is made in the form of subordinated units.

Possibly affecting electronics exports to the US, including iPhones

Delhi: Apple and Samsung, two of the largest electronics exporters, were caught off guard by the tariffs. If the tariffs remain in place and no negotiated solution is found, "manufacturing business for the US will be lost" according to the worry. Top electronics exporters like Samsung and Apple were taken aback by the Trump administration's proposal of a 25% tax on India and an extra penalty for trade with Russia. A lack of resolution through the bilateral trade agreement that is still being negotiated with Washington has industry officials worried that "manufacturing business for the US will be lost" in the event that the rates remain unchanged. India



surpassed China as the top iPhone exporter to the US in the second quarter of 2025, with a contribution of 44%. China's stake had dropped to 25% from 61% in the same quarter previous year, according to Canalys. This shift comes days after India had surpassed China. Industry

executives have mentioned that this might change if the tariffs on India continue. They also brought up the fact that the US administration has already lowered the duties on gadgets containing chips from China, such as smartphones, from a high of roughly 20%.

YES Bank Stole Rs 2,850 Crore From Reliance MF

Delhi : Reliance Mutual Fund of Anil Ambani invested Rs 2,850 crore in YES Bank AT-1 bonds for alleged quid pro quo, Enforcement Directorate sources said. Additional Tier-1 or AT-1 bonds have no maturity date and investors never get their principal, but they do receive a higher interest rate forever. If necessary, the bank might convert them to equity or write them off. Reliance Mutual Fund's bonds were written off and the money was siphoned off, ED sources stated.

Income Tax Department's PAN 2.0 project awarded to LTIMindtree

Delhi: The Income Tax Department has awarded the contract for the PAN 2.0 project to technology consulting and digital solutions company, LTIMindtree Limited, with the project expected to go live in 18 months, officials said. The bid value of the contract is around Rs 792 crore, they said. When the PAN 2.0 Project was approved by the Union Cabinet in November 2024, the government had provisioned Rs 1,435 crore for the project. Confirming the development, an LTIMindtree spokesperson



said, "We have been awarded this prestigious PAN 2.0 project which looks to enhance the PAN issuance process and security through technology-driven innovation." There were other contenders also for the project. Earlier, in May this year, Protean eGov Technologies had stated that it had partici-

pated in the Income Tax Department's Request for Proposals (RFP) bid for the project for selection of the Managed Service Provider (MSP) for design, development, implementation, operations and maintenance of the PAN 2.0 Project but the company had not been selected.

Policybazaar fined Rs 5 cr by Irdai for infractions

Delhi: Policy bazaar was fined a record-breaking 5 crore rupees by the IRDAI for many infractions discovered during a June 2020 remote inspection. Inconsistent payments for outsourcing, incomplete mapping of telemarketing sales to authorized verifiers, premium remittance delays, and biased product advertising are all examples of the violations. The regulator found a conflict of interest and punished the company Rs 1 crore for letting its chief officer and other key managerial people retain directorships in other organizations without prior consent. Its use of third-party data to promote certain insurance policies on its website as "best" or "top" resulted in another fine of Rs 1 crore. This method, according to Irdai, was deceptive, gave some

Delhi: BluSmart, an electric cab company in India, has gone bankrupt, according to a company law tribunal order. After co-founder Anmol Jaggi was excluded from the securities market by India's market regulator, BluSmart halted operations in April. Academics fear FYUP may dilute relevance of UG in DU

Delhi : The academic community in India is concerned that the New Education Policy's (NEP) proposed four-year undergraduate program, FYUP, contains flaws that will lower the bar for higher education in the country. Professor Seema Das of Political Science at Hindu College, Delhi

University, believes that removing four required courses from the three-year bachelor's degree program would significantly water down the curriculum. "Reduction in core papers would not allow a graduating student to master the respective subject," according to Das. When picking up elec-

tives or research papers, it's likely that a select few fields will be favoured. Some classes might end up being scrapped entirely as a result of this, rendering the instructors obsolete. Rajesh Jha, a professor of political science at Rajdhani College, has stated that this might go against the NEP's principles.

Qatar joins India, confirms IOC talks for 2036 Olympics and Paralympics



Delhi : The Qatar Olympic Committee (QOC) said it was discussing the 2036 Olympic and Paralympic Games host city voting process with the IOC, Reuters reported. After Indonesia, Turkey, India, and Chile, the country is the last to bid for the 2036 Games. It hosted the 2022 World Cup and 2024 Asian Cup. Saudi Arabia and South Korea are also exploring bids. Egypt, Hungary, Italy, Germany, Denmark, and Canada are interested. "We currently have 95% of the required sports infrastructure in place to host the Games, and we have a comprehensive national plan to ensure 100% readiness of all facilities," QOC president Sheikh Joaan bin Hamad Al-Thani told Qatar News Agency.

"This plan is based on a long-term vision to create a socially, economically, and environmentally sustainable legacy." A few weeks previously, an Indian delegation met with the IOC in Lausanne, proposing Ahmedabad as the official host city. The discussion was productive. It was then revealed that the IOC's message to India was straightforward: clean up before planning the Olympics. Three sources said that the IOC raised concerns about the Indian Olympic Association (IOA)'s governance issues, the doping problem in sports, and the country's poor performance at the Olympics, finishing 71st with six medals at last year's Paris Games.

The focus of the service is on competitive examinations, including the most popular ones in India, such as engineering and medical entrance tests. CBSE loosens regulations on adding new sections

Diviya Delhi: The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) has revised its affiliation rules to permit section growth based on built-up carpet area instead of land size, in an effort to alleviate space restrictions caused by the increasing demand for school admissions. The board took this action in response to comments made by schools that are having trouble meeting the demand for new admissions despite having more sections than allowed. Chinese government workers are severely restricted in their ability to travel and study overseas

without the school's approval. A staff group chat reiterated the rule. According to the message, "teachers need to strengthen their disciplinary awareness" as per requirements from higher-ups. "At this time, we are unable to approve any trips abroad." Similar warnings are being sent around China as the government cracks down on state employees' interactions with outsiders. The government has ordered the surrender of passports held by certain individuals, including doctors, kindergarten instructors, and even contractors and workers of state-owned businesses. In order to get their passports back, pensioners in some places have to wait two years. Even for personal trips, many towns require government personnel to get approval before they can go abroad. Travel for "ordinary research, exchange and study" purposes by businesses is now illegal. Not to mention that most provinces have made it illegal to hold specific public office for people who have educated overseas. Reasons given by officials include preventing corruption, safeguarding national security.

India wants Rs 3 lakh cr in defense manufacturing

Delhi: The government wants to produce Rs 3 lakh crore in defence by 2029, strengthening India's standing as a global powerhouse. Now, 65% of defense equipment is made locally, up from 65-70% import dependency. According to the Ministry of Defence, 16 DPSUs, over 430 licensed enterprises, and 16,000 MSMEs boost indigenous production capabilities. "The private sector contributes 21% to total defence production, fostering innovation and efficiency," it said. The government wants to expand defence exports to Rs 50,000 crore by 2029, strengthening India's position as a global manufacturing hub and supporting economic growth. Defence exports rose 32.5% to Rs 21,083 crore in FY 2023-24 from Rs 15,920 crore in FY 2022-23. Indian defence exports increased 21 times from Rs 4,312 crore in



2004-14 to Rs 88,319 crore in 2014-24, demonstrating its growing involvement in the global security sector. India exports defense equipment to over 100 nations, with the US, France, and Armenia buying most in 2023-24. In 2024-25, the Ministry of Defence signed a record 193 contracts worth Rs 2,09,050 crore, nearly doubling the previous record. These include 177 contracts, 92%, awarded to the domestic industry for Rs 1,68,922 crore, 81% of the overall contract value. This emphasis on indigenous manufacture supports defence production self-reliance.

Centre will borrow 8L cr, 54% of the objective

The government plans to borrow Rs 8 lakh crore, 54% of its Rs 14.8 lakh crore FY26 borrowing, in the first half. It didn't front-load the borrowing program to avoid raising rates while the RBI pumped record liquidity into the system. Since the market reported little demand for 30-year and longer bonds, the government announced it would borrow less in FY26. Thus, front-loading of the borrowing program has been avoided due to government (fiscal consolidation without compromising quality of expenditure).

Kotak highlights the risk in the lending business strategy

Delhi: Veteran banker Uday Kotak has expressed worries about the banks business model, pointing out the shrinking gap between deposit and lending rates, ahead of an anticipated rate decrease by the RBI, despite the fact that liquidity is still limited. According to Kotak, leading banks are increasing one-year wholesale deposits by about 8%, which, when accounting for CRR, SLR, deposit insurance, and priority sector lending requirements (but not operational costs), results in a marginal deposit cost of more than 9%. The system as a whole has restrained



growth in low-cost retail deposits (CASA non-wholesale). However, banks are offering home loans at a variable rate of 8.5%. Take out a loan at 8.5% and borrow at 9%, Spread is negative by 0.5%. Additionally, repo rates are probably going to decline. Kotak warned that if the tight deposit situation continues, it may make it difficult for banks to maintain their

business model and asked how they would handle credit and operational expenses. The majority of banks are required to connect their retail floating rate loans to the repo rate. The remarks coincided with a sharp decline in bond yields as investors awaited the RBI's next liquidity injection before its monetary policy committee's decision.

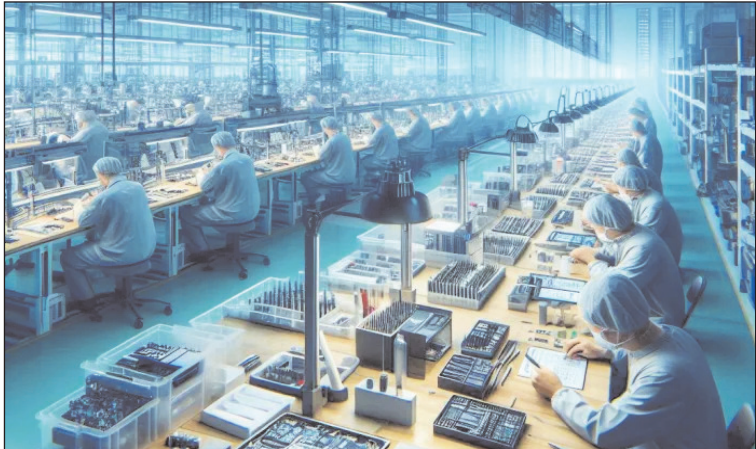

The government wants at least 91,600 direct jobs from the scheme and has tied participating firms' annual payments to job creation. Rs 4.56 lakh crore in production and Rs 59,350 crore in investment are envisaged from the scheme. The government wants to target display modules, sub assembly camera modules,



printed circuit board assemblies, lithium cell enclosures, resistors, capacitors, and ferrites.

These are utilized in cell-phones, laptops, microwave ovens, refrigerators, and toasters. "This scheme will reduce component imports. We must

abandon import substitution and promote exports. After mass production, viability follows. Union IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said electronics production is \$120 billion and hopes to reach \$500 billion in the next years.

1 in 5 Indians with over Rs 5 crore worth plans to relocate overseas



Delhi: One in five ultra-rich Indians with a net worth over Rs 25 crore plans to settle abroad for investment opportunities, tax advantages, and greater global connectivity, according to a Kotak Mahindra Bank private banking survey. The first two quarters of 2024-25 survey interviewed 150 ultra-high networth people (UHNIs) and private bankers in 12 cities. EY ordered and validated the findings with industry. For this report, those worth over Rs 25 crore were canvassed.

However, Kotak's private banking division targets individuals worth over Rs 300 crore. Many UHNIs buy abroad property for migration and permanent residency. "Ultra-HNIs are diversifying their portfolios and embracing domestic and global assets, setting the stage for a sig-

nificant increase. Alternative assets and equities are becoming more popular in domestic and international markets. Nearly a third of India's Ultra-HNIs own worldwide assets. With two in three ultra-HNIs planning structured wealth transition, succession planning is crucial.

JB Chemicals' promoter KKR will sell 10% of the company for 2,6k crore rupees

Delhi: In a series of block agreements, the promoter of JB Chemicals — Taubman Investment Holdings, a subsidiary of global private equity giant KKR — is selling around 1.6 crore shares, or 10.2% of the firm, for approximately Rs 2,575 crore (\$300 million). According to the deal's term sheet, the minimum price at which the shares can be sold is Rs 1,625—a 5%

reduction to JB Chemicals' closing price of Rs 1,709 on Wednesday on the NSE. Shareholding reports on the BSE indicate that as of December 31, 2024, KKR owned 53.7% of the pharmaceutical company situated in the city. Midway through 2020, at a share price of Rs 745, the PE giant had taken over the pharmaceutical manufacturer.
