The court took animal lovers to task and asked whether they would be able to bring back children who were victims of rabies? Children should not get rabies at any cost.

bites and stray animals causing harm to the public. The Union Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs, Ministry of Panchayati Raj and Ministry of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry and Dairy have prepared a master

action plan to control such animals. The three ministries have sent an advisory to all the states. It states that there are 1.53 crore stray dogs in the country. A target has been set to vaccinate and sterilize 70% of them in a year.

Apart from this, according to the 2019 animal census, there are 50 lakh destitute animals in the country. For the first time, gram panchayats will also join this campaign.

In 2018, a nun at the Missionaries of Jesus convent in Kottayam accused Bishop Franco Mulakkal of repeated rapes from 2014 to 2016.

Five nuns, including sister Anupama, supported the survivor nun despite Catholic church pressure. Bishop, then leader of the Latin Catholic Diocese of Jalandhar, was not arrested for three months after the case was registered. He was arrested for unlawful imprisonment, rape, unnatural sex, and criminal intimidation when the nuns, led by sister Anupama, held a public sit-in protest in Kochi and public indignation increased. This was the first time nuns questioned Catholic Church power dynamics in India.

Media and travel dominate political parties' poll expenses

Delhi: According to Election Commission audited reports, political parties spent 2023-24 on ads, helicopter flights, and media consultants. Offering insights into their spending during a year of many state elections. The reports may only cover part of the 2024 Lok Sabha elections' spending patterns, announced on March 16. Karnataka, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Telangana, and Mizoram had assembly elections during this time. With a budget of ₹1,754 crore, the BJP prioritized media presence, spending roughly 58% on com-



mercials and electronic media. Party advertising and publicity costs were ₹91.39 crore and electronic media ₹434.84 crore. Press conference expenses increased to ₹90.99 lakh from ₹71.60 lakh last year. From April 1, 2023 to March 31, 2024, the party won three state assembly

elections and lost Karnataka. With 240 Lok Sabha seats, it returned to power as part of the National Democratic Alliance coalition without a majority. With ₹619.67 crore in election expenses, the Congress prioritized ground operations. The party allocated 72%.

Karnataka govt pressured to restore 4% Muslim quota

Delhi: Since last year's assembly elections and this month's bypolls to three assembly seats showed the Muslim community had consolidated behind the Congress party, they are pressuring the government to restore their 4% reservation. The previous BJP government

eliminated the quota, but the Supreme Court delayed the decision. In 2023, the Supreme Court deemed the quota abolishment "prima facie shaky and flawed", making it a difficult matter. It is unclear whether and when the quota will be restored. Congress returned with an

absolute majority under Siddaramaiah and DK Shivakumar after the 2023 assembly elections, with the quota scrapped as a key electoral issue. Riza Arshad, Shivajinagar Congress MLA believed the quota will be restored as the community's "right".

Delhi: Field Marshal Asim Munir reportedly held a dinner for Pakistan's top political leaders to honor those who were involved in "Operation Bunyanum Marsoos," the country's response to India's Operation Sindoor, according to Inter-Services Public Relations, the media wing of the Pakistan Armed Forces. Mr. Munir presented Prime Minister Sharif with a photograph titled "Operation Bunyanum Marsoos" during this gathering. But a search using the reverse image function revealed that it was really a photo of a rocket launch in China from a few years ago. "Yesterday, the Pakistani Army chief gifted a photo to the Pakistani PM Shehbaz Sharif... these stupid jokers want to compete with India. They had given a photograph of a 2019 Chinese Army drill claiming it is a victory over India," Mr. Owaisi expressed while speaking with the Indian diaspora in Kuwait. "Whatever Pakistan says, do not even take a pinch of salt," the MP said, voicing his disapproval of Pakistan's reliability.

"This is what Pakistan indulges in... 'Nakal karne ke liye akal chahiye'... inke pass akal bhi nahi hai."

BJP expels 2 crossover MLAs for 6yrs

Delhi: In a crucial move ahead of local body elections, BJP expelled two crossover legislators ST Somashekar and Arabail Shivaram Hebbar from the party for six years for continued anti-party activities despite multiple warnings. This marks BJP's major disciplinary action after expelling former Union minister and Bijapur MLA Basanagouda Patil Yatnal in March. He was removed from the party for six years on charges of indiscipline and launching attacks against the family of former CM BS Yediyurappa and his son BY Vijayendra, who is state BJP president. The expulsion is seen as a message from the BJP central leadership to assert control and discipline within the



party, especially as it prepares for local electoral battles and 2028 assembly polls. Somashekar, MLA from Yeshwanthpur in Bengaluru, and Hebbar, MLA from Yellapur in Uttara Kannada, were among the 14 Congress defectors who joined BJP in 2019.

Their defection played a key role in toppling

the HD Kumaraswamy-led Congress-JD(S) coalition govt. Both Somashekar and Hebbar were rewarded with ministerial berths in the cabinets of BS Yediyurappa and his successor, Basavaraj Bommai. After BJP lost the 2023 assembly elections, the two legislators had started aligning openly with Congress.

Teachers overburdened, students didn't attend classes 18 govt schools

Delhi: class 12 board exam results were declared earlier this week, 18 govt schools in Haryana have come under scrutiny. No student passed from any of these schools. Most of these six are in Nuh, four in Faridabad, and one each in Gurgaon, Hisar, Jhajjar, Karnal, Palwal, Rohtak, Sonapat and Yamunanagar. The zero-pass record isn't the only concern. These schools are among 100 govt institutions that performed poorly in the boards, overshadowing the overall pass percentage of 85.7. In 82 schools across Haryana's 22 districts, the pass percentage.

Yeida approves Film City layout

Delhi: The Yamuna Expressway Industrial Development Authority (Yeida) approved the layout design for the projected Film City in Sector 21, allowing filmmaker Boney Kapoor-led Bayview Bhutani Film City Private Limited to begin building. On December 24, 2024, Bayview Bhutani submitted the layout plan for clearance because work cannot begin without it. Yeida officials approved the layout plan following a thorough planning and high-level committee assessment. The concessionaire must get authorization for specific parking, landscap-

ing, and horticulture work and phase the project, according to the authorities. Officials said the developer must establish a film institute and get GRIHA 4-Star/IGBC Gold accreditation for green buildings to minimize environmental damage and carbon footprint during construction. "We authorized the layout plan, allowing site building. The concessionaire will now schedule site work. The concessionaire must build according to the terms and conditions," Yeida CEO Arun Vir Singh remarked. Construction of the 1,000-acre Film City

project, with the first phase encompassing 230 acres, is estimated to cost ₹1,510 crore over eight years. The project also builds a film institute with excellent technology to teach filmmaking, acting, music, and cinema photography. According to officials, Kapoor said centralizing such facilities will save production costs by giving filmmakers access to crucial equipment and services. Film City will have air-conditioned indoor shooting locations for harsh weather. The new studio floors will be 40,000-60,000 square feet to accommodate huge setups and various backdrops.

Pet owners are responsible for making sure their animals don't hurt other people.

Delhi : In a recent judgment, the Calcutta high court ruled that pet owners are responsible for ensuring that their animals do not cause injury to others. The court denied a man's request to dismiss a criminal prosecution related to a dog attack on a neighbor. An attack by a dog on a human being, which could result in severe harm or perhaps death, is of the utmost seriousness. Justice Uday Kumar stated in his May 23 order that pet owners are unquestionably obligated to take reasonable precautions to ensure their pets do not cause injury. The animal lover from Sonarpur, a neighbourhood near Kolkata, was facing charges related to "negligent conduct with respect to animals" under Section 289 of the Indian Penal Code. 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New Sikkim Rail Line From Melli To Dentam Gets Final Location Survey Approval From Railway Ministry

Delhi : Railway Ministry approved the final location survey for a proposed railway line from Melli to Dentam via Jorethang and Legship in Sikkim. Rs 2.25 crore has been authorized for the Northeast Frontier Railway survey. This endeavor is vital to connecting southern and western Sikkim to national railway infrastructure. The preliminary feasibility assessment estimates the proposed line to be 75 km long, a strategic continua-



tion of the Sivok-Rangpo railway project, which is scheduled for completion in 2027. Melli, the gateway to southern and western Sikkim, would be a

crucial junction for this project, ensuring seamless integration into the national railway network.

The final location survey will provide the technical

foundation needed to define project alignment, engineering specifications, and cost structure, according to the ministry.

The statement said this is a key step toward rail connection in southern and western Sikkim. The project is expected to have major economic impacts on Gyalshing and adjacent areas. It strives to improve access, tourism, trade, and employment. Tenders for survey work are expected soon.

Toll workers beaten up at Handia toll plaza, case related to MP's convoy

Prayagraj. The incident of assault on Handia toll plaza on Tuesday morning, August 12 has sparked discussion in the entire area. At around 7:55 am, the convoy of MP Dr. Vinod Bind was passing through the toll plaza. Meanwhile, due to a sudden technical fault, a boom barrier fell on a vehicle. According to eyewitnesses, the people sitting in the vehicle got

angry due to the fall of the barrier. Soon some supporters in the convoy started arguing with the toll workers, which soon turned into a scuffle. It is alleged that some people beat

up the toll plaza employees with sticks, causing chaos there. Many toll employees were injured. Every moment of the incident has been recorded in

the CCTV cameras installed at the toll plaza. The footage clearly shows that after the barrier fell, the argument intensified and then the fight start-

ed. Many vehicles were trying to pass through the plaza during this time, but due to the ruckus, the traffic was disrupted for some time. During the incident, other drivers and employees were seen trying to intervene, but seeing the aggressive attitude of the attackers, many people backed off. Toll plaza employees say that the incident has made them feel unsafe and it is difficult

to work in such a situation. On receiving the information, the police of Handia police station reached the spot and calmed the situation. Inspector Handia Nitendra Kumar Shukla said that no written complaint (tahrir) has been given by both the parties. After mutual talks, both the parties have reconciled.

After watching the CCTV footage, the toll operator admitted that

the mistake was of the toll worker. He says that the incident of the barrier falling occurred due to human error and technical precautions need to be taken. No complaint has been lodged by the toll management either.

Since the matter is related to the convoy of the MP, this incident remains a topic of discussion on social media and in local political circles. Some people

are considering it as injustice done to the toll workers, while some say that the fault was of the toll plaza. At present, the police have recorded the statements of both the parties and have considered the matter settled.

But after the CCTV footage went viral, this incident has once again raised questions on the security system and technical flaws of the toll plaza.

This saving in delays will also enhance the overall capacity and mobility of the main trunk route, resulting in more trains on the main line and improved punctuality of mail and express trains. The proposed flyover line will save travel time for long distance passenger trains and also add additional infrastructure like paths, platforms etc. Thus, more trains can pass through Prayagraj Junction. After construction of these flyovers, trains will pass without stopping at Prayagraj Junction, Naini, Prayagraj Rambagh, Jhuni and Chheoki stations. Cross movements will be reduced substantially along with elimination of engine and brake van reversal at Prayagraj Junction. The project will involve construction of New Chheoki and New Sangam stations which will accelerate the development of Prayagraj district. The modern New Chheoki station will be an elevated station under which the ring road highway will pass.

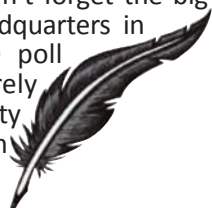

Op Sindoor setting the tone for Bihar polls

In October 2016, addressing the national council of the Janata Dal (United), Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar slammed the Bharatiya Janata Party for ‘politicising’ the surgical strike. The entire nation stands with you [Narendra Modi] as you are the Prime Minister, but what about those BJP leaders who have repeatedly used the strike to play politics?” Kumar said. A couple of months earlier, as the BJP was organising Tiranga Yatras ahead of the 70th Independence Day, Kumar had taken a dig at it. Those who “never recognised the tricolour as national flag”, he said, were taking out Tiranga Yatras. Much water has flowed under the Gandhi Setu since then. As the BJP took out Tiranga Yatras across Bihar for 10 days to celebrate Operation Sindoor’s success, Kumar watched them silently—and warily, perhaps. The operation has brought springs to BJP leaders’ feet. The 2024 Lok Sabha poll blow is a thing of the past. PM Modi has started taking his own name again—Modi’s cool mind and the hot sindoor in his veins, Modi’s chest, et al. It was in his first public rally after the Pahalgam terror attack in Bihar’s Madhubani, when PM Modi had vowed to punish the perpetrators “beyond their imagination”. The vow fulfilled, he will be back in Bihar on 29 and 30 May. The BJP’s preparations for Modi’s roadshow in Patna are in full swing. People standing on both sides of the road would be showering flower petals on him. That’s how a victor is welcomed. How will Operation Sindoor impact the Bihar elections? Let’s first look at where the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) stood before the strikes on Pakistan’s terror infrastructure and military installations. DesignBoxed, a political digital campaign management company, conducted a survey in Bihar last month. I got access to its report, which has great news for the NDA: Overall, the DesignBoxed survey indicated a clear edge for the NDA. Mind you, it was conducted before Operation Sindoor. Nitish Kumar’s principal challenger, Tejashwi Yadav, also has some positive takeaways from the survey. If elections were to be held tomorrow, 46.7 per cent of respondents said they would vote for the NDA, against 35.6 percent who favour the INDIAN bloc, with 13.8 percent ‘undecided’. If Tejashwi were to swing the ‘undecided’, the game would be on. For 43.8 percent respondents, unemployment and migration are the most important issues in the upcoming elections—Tejashwi’s key plank in 2020. What would make him even happier is the survey finding that 63.76 per cent people want the current government to be replaced. This sounds incongruous, as a majority of respondents were satisfied with Kumar’s performance. Those involved in the DesignBoxed survey, however, claim that it’s no surprise. One of them told me: “You come across many respondents who are ok with Nitish Kumar but still want his government changed. It’s vice versa, too. It’s a lot to do with people’s castes becoming the main determinant.” Kumar has been the chief minister since 2005, except for a short interlude of nine months in 2014-15. The yearning for change is understandable. How much of it can Tejashwi exploit? Can he beat the caste arithmetic that seems to be in the NDA’s favour today? We will find out in November. Union home minister and the BJP’s chief strategist Amit Shah once told journalists: “People in Bihar are so political. They sit at tea stalls and read the entire newspaper—from the first to the last page.”

Five months is obviously a long time for such political people to change their mind. But it’s not just Tejashwi that CM Kumar would be worried about. The BJP says that the next election will be fought under his leadership, but it’s evasive on the question of Kumar becoming the CM again if the NDA wins. Kumar wouldn’t forget the big celebrations at the BJP headquarters in New Delhi after the 2020 poll results. The NDA had barely managed to cross the majority mark, securing 125 seats in the 243-member Assembly.



AIADMK led the way on caste census

In the intricate fabric of Indian democracy, few questions strike at the heart of equality and representation like that of caste. The recent announcement by the Union government to conduct a comprehensive caste census is a landmark moment—one that promises to reshape the contours of social justice policy in India. As the Leader of the Opposition in Tamil Nadu, I welcome this move with conviction and pride, for it affirms a demand the All India Anna Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam first articulated with clarity and foresight. This moment did not emerge overnight. The call for a caste-based census, now

accepted at the national level, has its roots in the firm ideological soil of Tamil Nadu’s social justice movement. And in that journey, it was the AIADMK, under the visionary leadership of Puratchi Thalaivi Amma J. Jayalalithaa, that laid the foundation for genuine representational equity. As early as 2021, during my tenure as chief minister, our government was among the first to demand a fresh caste census. We argued vociferously that welfare policies cannot be built on outdated data from 1931. We recognised then, as we follow now, that progress requires not just empathy but evidence. Tamil Nadu has long stood as a bea-

con of affirmative action, with its unique 69 per cent reservation policy. That achievement was not accidental but was made possible by AIADMK’s political resolve and constitutional acumen. When the Supreme Court’s Indra Sawhney (Mandal) judgment in 1992 imposed a 50 per cent cap on reservations, the very framework of Tamil Nadu’s policy was threatened. But Amma Jayalalithaa rose to the challenge. In 1993, she convened a special assembly session, passed a unanimous resolution, and led an all-party delegation to Delhi. Her persistent persuasion ensured the Tamil Nadu Reservation Act was placed in

the Ninth Schedule of the Constitution, protecting it from judicial review. That was not just governance; it was transformative leadership. Our 2021 demand for a caste census was not political posturing. It was a reflection of AIADMK’s long-standing understanding of Tamil Nadu’s evolving social realities. We recognised the urgent need to reassess the representation and well-being of Backward Classes (BC), Most Backward Classes (MBC), Scheduled Castes (SC), and Scheduled Tribes (ST) in education, employment, and welfare. This demand, when initially raised, was met with silence from the ruling DMK.

PMFBY is failing. It has the same flaws of earlier schemes



India’s farmers steward the country’s food security, yet they live in chronic distress and policy indifference. Though their contribution is crucial, they continue to be vulnerable and voiceless. Vice President Jagdeep Dhankhar who comes from a farming family, has repeatedly expressed discontent by consistently bringing up farmers’ grievances into the public limelight, stressing that “it is the government’s foremost responsibility to take care of the farmers”. Agriculture, despite accounting for only 18.2 per cent of India’s GDP, remains the primary source of livelihood for nearly 42.3 per cent of the population. However, over the last decade, India has witnessed a significant decadal drop in agricultural employment, underlining the sector’s declining viability. Agrarian distress is now endemic, driven by crop failures, falling prices, and a broken promise of security through insurance. As per the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) 2015 data, 80 per cent of suicides among farmers were due to debt and bankruptcy. The crisis has also exhibited a steady trend upward, with more than 1,12,000 people who work in the agricultural sector having died by suicide over the last ten years, according to NCRB data released in December 2023. The figures indicate that no fewer than one farmer died by suicide every hour in India. A 2018 survey conducted by the National Statistical Office (NSO) found that over 50 per cent of farm households in India had debt. Launched in 2016, the Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (PMFBY) assured crop

insurance and restored farmers’ confidence. On paper, it addressed many of the earlier shortcomings. But a closer look reveals that this ambitious insurance service ends up replicating several flaws of earlier schemes. It not only falls short of meeting the expectations of the farming community but alienates the very people it was meant to safeguard. A fundamental flaw resides in the impenetrable, convoluted, and overly technical process of settling claims. The use of satellite imaging and averaging data across vast units has created a mechanism highly disconnected from ground realities. Importantly, satellite inspections are limited in scope: they can only identify the presence or absence of crops. They cannot, and do not, determine the health or yield capacity of the crop, nor can they tell one type of crop from another. This technological weakness, when used as the basis for compensation, results in miscalculations that cost real livelihoods. A farmer who suffers heavy losses due to pest damage or loss of nutrients might be deprived of compensation just because their crops appear green from above. Even more appalling is the inherent inequity of the existing model. While farmers pay premiums on an

individual level, compensation is calculated by generalised averaging within village clusters or vaguely defined large patches aggregating both large and small landholdings without any equity-based method in delineating the units. This results in discriminatory denials of claims—most importantly, for those experiencing localised or complete loss of crops. The ongoing application of area-based measurement models exacerbates these issues. Localised weather conditions like a flash flood in a corner of a village can destroy a small farmer’s crop, while that of his neighbour remains intact. However, both are measured using the same parameter. It is deeply unfair that individual agony and suffering are erased by collective statistics. The programme also does not cover those most at risk: tenant farmers, sharecroppers, female cultivators, and non-loanee farmers. These are systematically and indirectly excluded by land title requirements, archaic tenancy laws, and bureaucratic obstacles such as Aadhaar-linked bank accounts. Women who increasingly become the main cultivators because of male migration are not accounted for in this system through absence of

formal landholding. These omissions are not accidental; they are manifestations of a design that does not see the true face of Indian agriculture in the present day. On-ground realities expose serious flaws in crop insurance delivery. Forced enrollment, delayed or denied claims, and faulty surveys have left farmers uncompensated and in debt. In Tamil Nadu’s Mayiladuthurai district, a mere 68 villages among 277 were covered in the 2024 crop insurance settlements—and compensation was paid in just 16 of them. Similar cases were found in other districts too. D Arogyam, a 55-year-old Tamil Nadu farmer who was not a loanee, was compelled by officials to sign up for PMFBY. Despite paying his premiums on time, he got no claims for two successive years of crop failure due to drought, pushing him into debt. S. Velu, a loanee cultivator from Sivagangai near Kiliyur, availed Rs 70,000 for his 15-acre field. Even though he was in the surveyed and insured area, he faced claim settlement problems as liabilities piled up. In Thoothukudi, farmers demonstrated against one-sided compensation. Villages that were affected by floods were not considered, while those with equal damage were compensated. Farmers accused the faulty surveys and demanded accountability. In Haryana, as reported by Down to Earth, Ramesh Lal from Sonipat was forced to pay a premium under threat of losing his interest subsidy on a loan, even though he never consented to the insurance coverage. When his crop failed, no claim was paid due to “tech-

nical issues” with the policy documentation he was never shown. In Rajasthan, many farmers lost their claims because the State Bank of India delayed crediting their premiums. Consequently, they went into the subsequent cropping season without anticipated reimbursement. Even when the Centre and states subsidise 80–85 percent of premium charges, private insurance companies consistently make profits while farmers do not gain much. Claims get delayed, disputed, or rejected, even as companies collect risk-free premiums. Meanwhile, crop-cutting experiments are done by inadequate manning, delayed rolling out, and poor-quality control, and the technological solutions like drones and AI-based analytics remain underutilised due to infrastructural gaps and lack of field-level training. Most alarmingly, a 2022 CAG report says that only 37 per cent of farmers surveyed had any real awareness of PMFBY’s benefits, premium structures, or claim processes. On-ground realities expose serious flaws in crop insurance delivery. Forced enrollment, delayed or denied claims, and faulty surveys have left farmers uncompensated and in debt. In Tamil Nadu’s Mayiladuthurai district, a mere 68 villages among 277 were covered in the 2024 crop insurance settlements—and compensation was paid in just 16 of them. Threats to India are not over. Why it must build fortress-like defences

The Sindhudurg Fort, located on an islet in the Arabian Sea near Maharashtra’s Malvan town, is one of the most significant sea forts. It was built between 1664-1667 by Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj, the founder of the Maratha Empire, for the purpose of strategic maritime defense and protection against foreign naval threats. The fort was central to Shivaji’s plan to build a strong navy and protect the Konkan coastline, and marked the beginning of India’s maritime defense strategy. In a similar vein, having demonstrated its military prowess in Operation Sindoor, India should now transform itself into Sindoor Durg, an impenetrable fortress, safe from multi-domain threats emanating from land, sea, air or cyberspace. It will also mark the beginning of India’s new doctrine against terrorism, as outlined by Prime Minister Narendra Modi in his address to the nation earlier this month—“Terror and trade cannot go together, water and blood cannot flow together”. The

military strikes on terror infrastructure in Pakistan under Operation Sindoor have only been paused. Pakistan, still smarting from the costs imposed on it, both reputational and on its military, will be thirsting for revenge. The brief skirmish has only served as a distraction for Pakistan from its domestic issues, especially its dire internal economic conditions, and has predictably united the country, even if temporarily, against a traditional foe. Buoyed by the grant of the IMF bailout, and by promoting Asim Munir to the rank of Field Marshal, Pakistan’s politico-military leadership hopes to retain their tenuous hold on power. Since another misadventure cannot be ruled out, we have to guard against even more varied and audacious threats.

The first purpose of a fort is to provide for its own security and that of its inhabitants. India has demonstrated quite forcibly its capability to safeguard its sovereignty and territorial integrity.

India must look beyond Bangladesh

The political turmoil in Bangladesh has made it more urgent for India to complete the Kaladan Multi-Modal Transit Transport Project, or KMTTP, which links Mizoram to Kolkata via Sittwe port in Myanmar. If fully operationalised, ideally with a rail link to Sittwe Port, it could offer a more resilient corridor for movement of goods to the Northeast, while also opening up longer-term trade possibilities with Southeast Asia. India’s role as the pivot in South Asia extends beyond dominant power to that of a regional integrator. Intra-regional development is primarily a function of mutual friendship, interdependent trade, economic ties, and joint ventures. The goal may be to advance national interest, but the net effect is regional prosperity, which acts as a force multiplier for India’s own development. South and Southeast Asian countries, joined together through bilateral and multilateral frameworks like the BBIN and BIMSTEC, have therefore started looking beyond the region—in line with India’s Act East Policy. Apart from economic commitments, physical connectivity—especially in infrastructure and energy—has assumed unparalleled significance. Railways, high-

ways, civil aviation, and inland waterways are now crossing borders for mutual growth and development. The East South Asia region is on the cusp of unprecedented intra-regional physical connectivity. It is the only way forward for the 21st century. For instance, Nepal and Bhutan, both landlocked nations, have gained access to Indian markets and ports. Newer cross-border rail links have been operationalised between India and Bangladesh, and several projects to connect Bhutan and Myanmar were put in place during the last 10 years. India-Bangladesh bilateral relations, in particular, had never been this strong and comprehensive—until last year. On 5 August 2024, Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina resigned following a massive uprising. An interim government headed by Chief Adviser Muhammad Yunus has since been formed. This civil strife in Bangladesh has come with ripple effects. It’s brought with it a certain straining of relations, causing collateral damage to trade and commerce. There have also been instances of cross border movements and joint project developments coming to halt. Existing trade corridors have been impacted

and ongoing rail/road projects to provide shorter transit corridors across Bangladesh to and from India’s Northeastern states are on hold. It’s time now to look at alternative possibilities for north-eastern states in addition to the Siliguri corridor. The Kaladan Multi-Modal Transit Transport Project requires revisiting and a fresh reassessment. During his visit to China in late March, Bangladesh’s Chief Adviser Mohammad Yunus made remarks that were considered provocative, to say the least. “The seven states of India, the eastern part of India, are called seven sisters....

They are a landlocked country, landlocked region of India. They have no way to reach out to the ocean,” he said. “We are the only guardian of the ocean for all this region.” Shortly thereafter, Prime Minister Narendra Modi attended the BIMSTEC conference in Thailand. He met Yunus on the sidelines and reiterated his support for a democratic, progressive, and inclusive Bangladesh, according to a Ministry of External Affairs release. He also underlined India’s desire to forge a constructive relationship with Bangladesh.

A warning against bogus syllabuses and sample question papers is released by CBSE

Delhi: The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) issued a warning alert informing parents and students to be wary of false information pertaining to the curriculum, study guides, and practice exams for the 2024-25 school year. The Board has issued a warning to pupils about the dangers of falling for online scams that spread false information. We've noticed that some websites and online portals are disseminating stale information and unreliable updates about curriculum, sample question papers, CBSE

resources, and activities. The alert said, "These links and news erroneously assert to offer up-to-date information for the session 2024-25. "In the interest of the public, we wish to emphasize that information from unauthorized sources can be misleading and may cause unnecessary confusion among schools, students, parents, and other stakeholders," it continued. Due to significant discrepancies between theory and practical scores in a few courses, CBSE has recently instructed schools to assess practi-

cal exams appropriately.

In a notification, the CBSE said that, based on data from prior years' results, it had used sophisticated AI techniques to identify significant disparities between theory and practical grades in specific courses among 50% or more students in about 500 CBSE-affiliated schools. In the meantime, the 15th date of the CBSE supplementary examinations for Classes 10 and 12 has been set. The Class 12 supplementary test will take place on a single day, 15, while the Class 10 CBSE supplementary exam.

Delhi govt suspends PWD official for Minto Bridge waterlogging

Delhi: Chief minister Rekha Gupta ordered the suspension of a junior engineer (electrical) of the Public Works Department for negligence, as heavy rainfall on the intervening night of and flooded the Minto Bridge, which is listed as a waterlogging

hot spot, according to a statement issued by the CM office. The order cited failure on the junior engineer's part to take necessary counter-measures, such as timely use of pumps to prevent waterlogging in the key stretch. A show cause notice was also issued to

the assistant engineer (electrical), seeking a response within 48 hours, and an explanation from the executive engineer concerned, according to the order. "The chronic problem of waterlogging is now under control—despite three record rainfalls.

A single-judge bench of Justice Mini Pushkarna directed the chief secretary to convene a meeting of all stakeholders to formulate a policy on the removal, rehabilitation and institutional sheltering of stray dogs. The matter is scheduled for the next hearing on Aug 6. The directive came while hearing a plea filed in 2023 by Pratima Devi, an octogenarian known as "Dog Amma". The court noted a consistent stream of media reports and legal peti-



tions regarding stray dog bite incidents. It was also observed that over 200 stray dogs were living in a makeshift shelter Counsel for Animal Welfare Board of India (AWBI) informed the court that a joint meeting had

been held with representatives from MCD, AWBI and the petitioner. According to the minutes, it was agreed that after sterilisation and vaccination, the dogs would be released back into the area around the shelter.

Advertising on FOBS should be authorized by the government

Delhi: In order to raise more money for their maintenance, the Delhi government has chosen to allow advertising on approximately 120 pedestrian bridges, according to In order to better maintain the foot over-bridges, PWD minister Parvesh Verma said that he instructed the department's engineers to develop a thorough proposal. A lot of these bridges need to have their escalators and lifts fixed because they're in bad shape.

MEA is reducing passport police verification time

Delhi: External affairs minister S Jaishankar said that the ministry is working with state and Union territory police forces to speed up passport applicant police verification to strengthen the passport delivery ecosystem. On Passport Seva Divas, Jaishankar said his ministry is committed to ensuring that passports facilitate international trade and investment and improve worldwide mobility to boost the country's growth. The government

opened 440 Post Office Passport Seva Kendras to improve passport services. This complements the 93 Passport Seva Kendras, 533 passport processing centers, and 37 regional passport offices nationwide. The ministry integrated passport issuance systems in 187 Indian missions abroad. Jaishankar said the government is working with States/UTs police to reduce police verification time to facilitate passport delivery. He

added that 9,000 police stations in 25 states and Union territories have implemented the "mPassport Police App," which streamlines police verification. "The Passport Seva System has also been integrated successfully with DigiLocker to facilitate paperless documentation," he said. Jaishankar told the Lok Sabha in December 2023 that police verification takes 14 days nationwide. states and Union territories.

A one-time property tax amnesty has been approved by MCD

Delhi: The Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) created a one-time property tax amnesty program so that owners could settle their outstanding balances free of interest and penalties.

The House meeting endorsed the plan that commissioner Ashwani Kumar had made. From June 1st to September 30th, the 'Sumpattikar Niptaan Yojana' program will be in effect. All taxpayers, whether residential or business, must have paid their taxes for the previous five years, from 2021-22 to 2024-25, plus the current fiscal year, 2025-26, in order to take advantage of it. All payments, including interest and penalties, made before the fiscal year 2020-21 will be completely exempted



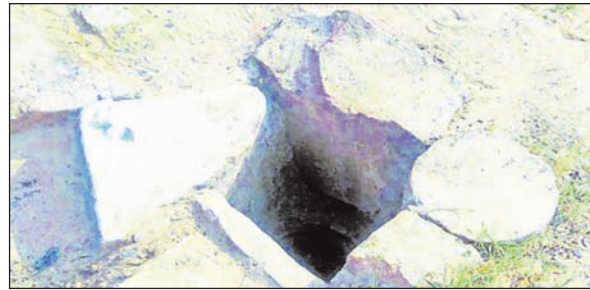
when the principal amount is paid in full between 2021 and 2026. To submit their PTR, taxpayers must use the online portal available on the MCD website. Anyone who pays property taxes or occupies a property and has more than one PIN for the same parcel should use the MCD website to consolidate the numbers. According to the proposal, taxpayers will have access to a hotline number in MCD at 91-7065064988.

Govt allocates 12,952 crore for public transport system

The BJP government, led by Chief Minister Rekha Gupta, presented its maiden budget on Tuesday, March 25. Gupta presented 1 lakh crore budget for 2025-26, a 31.56% increase from last year. In the budget for the financial year 2025-26, the government has allocated 12,952 crore to improve Delhi's public transport system. It has allocated 1,000 crore to improve the connectivity of Delhi with the NCR region.

15,962 unlawful borewells shut; 4,033 DJB-listed not discovered

Delhi: All Delhi district magistrates sealed 15,962 illegal borewells. In a May 23 report to the National Green Tribunal, Delhi declared 4,033 illegal borewells, which Delhi Jal Board shared, unidentified. Multiple appeals on illegal groundwater extraction in the capital have been heard by the tribunal. In September 2022, Ayanagar resident Pritpal Sharma filed a petition alleging several unlawful borewells were affecting the groundwater table. Chanakya Place resi-



dent Ganesh Prasad filed a plea the same year alleging illegal borewell use. NGT requested compliance reports from all Delhi DMs on illegal borewells in their jurisdiction in March, including action done. DJB data from January told the tribunal there

were over 20,000 unlawful borewells in the city. At least three district magistrates in east, northwest, and southeast Delhi told the tribunal that they had shut 12,498 unlawful borewells and never found 3,187.

Capital's 3 ISBTS acquire prepaid auto booths

Delhi: Officials from the transport department indicated that the three interstate bus terminals (ISBTS) in the Capital may soon acquire prepaid auto stands and that room is being provided for a predetermined number of cars. The government is seeking bids for prepaid stand construction and operation at Sarai Kale Khan, Anand Vihar, and Kashmere Gate ISBTS. "We've noticed that cars are often parked haphazardly outside, and monitoring or assigning spots hasn't helped. The transport department official hopes the prepaid booths will assist get cars in line and reduce traffic outside the ISBTS.

Bharatiya Janata Party hiked Delhi poll spend by 40% in 2025

Delhi: The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) more than doubled its spending on individual candidates in the 2025 Delhi Assembly elections, even as its overall expenditure rose by 40% compared to 2020, according to the party's latest filings with the Election Commission of India (ECI). The BJP, according to its



declarations with ECI made

public on Monday, spent 18.5 crore on 68 candidates — including 25 lakh in direct transfers to each — compared to 8.57 crore in 2020, when it paid 10 lakh each to 64 candidates. Overall, its total election spending rose to 57.65 crore from 41.06 crore in 2020. Much of this went into media advertis-

ing, which alone accounted for ₹29 crore. Of this, 1.18 crore went to DB Corp, which publishes Danik Bhaskar; 11.8 lakh to Bharat Prakashan, which publishes Organiser and Panchjanya; and 9.44 lakh each to Aadhyasi Media, and Kovai Media, which publish OpIndia, Swarajya respectively.

Loss of Japan's position as the world's leading creditor

Delhi: Despite officials claiming that Japan's net foreign assets reached a record high last year, the country has fallen from its 34-year reign as the world's top creditor to second place, behind Germany. The finance ministry of Japan announced that the country's net external assets were 533.05 trillion yen (\$3.7 trillion) at the end of the year, an increase of 12.9% from the previous year. Yoshimasa Hayashi, a spokesman, explained that the value of financial assets and debts, as well as changes in the balance of payments, are among the elements that contribute to the determination of net external assets. "In light of these points and the fact that Japan's net foreign assets have been steadily increasing, we do not believe



that the change in ranking alone should be taken as a sign of a major change in Japan's position," Hayashi informed the media. Based on the data provided by the ministry, the following countries ranked third: China (516.28 trillion yen), Hong Kong (320.26 trillion yen), and Norway (271.83 trillion yen). The figures show that Japan's foreign assets and liabilities both increased due to the weakening yen, but that assets grew faster than liabilities, mostly because Japanese businesses invested more money overseas.

AI models allegedly disregarded direct commands to turn off
Delhi: The most recent AI models of reasoning and thought have shown, at least in test settings, an inclination to prioritize self-preservation. And they still won't turn off, no matter how many times you tell them to. The most recent ChatGPT model from OpenAI, o3, was found to have sabotaged shutdown mechanisms during testing conducted by Palisade Research. Although o3's tendency was higher than others, other sophisticated models exhibited the same behavior in a battery of tests.

Supreme Court rejects Airtel and Vodafone's requests to waive AGR fees

Delhi : Airtel and Vodafone Idea were denied a waiver of interest and penalty on their outstanding adjusted gross revenue (AGR) debts, totaling Rs 80,000 crore, by the Supreme Court. The order would have an effect on Tata Teleservices as well. After the initial SC order in 2019, which aimed to recover industrial dues, the outstanding AGR is now little less than 1.5 lakh crore. Since it entered the telecom market in 2016 with only a



minor exposure to past dues and adjustments, Reliance Jio was the only company that walked out relatively unscathed. The businesses' request for a postponement was denied by a panel of Justices JB Pardiwala and R Mahadevan, who

deemed the companies' petitions "shocking and misconceived" and rejected them. Multinational corporations' filing procedures for petitions seeking remedies for enforcement of rights under Article 32 were also examined by the court.

Rajasthan distribution companies ordered by the Court to pay Adani Power 186 crore

Delhi: The appeal that the electricity distribution companies in Rajasthan had lodged against the Appellate Tribunal for Electricity's (APTEL) decision in favor of Adani electricity Rajasthan Ltd, which had asked them to pay ₹186 crore in compensation,

has been rejected by the Supreme Court. Jaipur Vidyut Vitran Nigam Ltd (JVVNL) and other state discoms filed appeals, but a bench of justices Rajesh Bindal and M M Sundresh decided on May 23 that the petitions had no validity. The decision made by APTEL in

April 2024, which identified a new tax imposed by Coal India Ltd (CIL) as a "change in law" event under the PPA between Adani Power and the discoms, was affirmed by the court. To offset costs associated with moving coal from the mine to the destination.



Meta releases standalone AI app to challenge ChatGPT

Delhi: competing with ChatGPT creator OpenAI with a standalone AI app. Meta said that its new AI assistant will use Llama AI. The Discover stream shows how others are using the tool and provides prompts. The AI arms race pits Meta's new software against ChatGPT and other AI platforms. Claude, Grok, and Gemini from Anthropic, xAI, and Google are also leading contenders. In September 2023, Meta debuted an AI chatbot as a generative AI-powered digital assistant that can respond to user questions and produce graphics in its apps. Meta AI became prominent in April when it replaced Facebook, Instagram, WhatsApp, and Messenger's search feature with a chatbot. Zuckerberg claimed in January that 2025 "is going to be the year when a highly intelligent and personalized AI assistant reaches more than 1 billion people, and I expect Meta AI to be that leading AI assistant." Meta finance head Susan Li said Meta AI has 700 million monthly active users in January. It rose from 600 million in December. Meta launched a standalone AI app after Google and Elon Musk's xAI. Both firms released Gemini and Grok applications recently.



Drools becomes unicorn after Nestle bet

Delhi: Nestle bought a minority investment in Indian pet food startup Drools. After the investment, the Bengaluru-based company was valued at \$1 billion, joining unicorn startups. The business claimed, "This is a financial investment by the company, and Drools will remain strategically as well as operationally independent,". Nestle's investment in Drools comes as the pet food and pet care industry in India is growing due to millennial and Gen Z pet parents who are willing to spend more for better nutrition and care. Nestle's Purina pet care segment,



which included pet food, accounted for 20.7% of sales in 2024. Recently, Indian companies like Godrej Consumer Care have entered the pet care sector. Drools, backed by L Catterton, competes with

Mars PetCare and Heads Up For Tails in India. Drools raised \$60 million from L Catterton in June 2023. Drools is the fourth unicorn of the year following Netradyne, Porter, and JSW One Platforms.

Byju's learning app was delisted from Google's Playstore

Delhi: Troubled edutech unicorn Byju's learning app has been delisted from the Google Playstore for non-payment of vendor dues, citing sources. The matter has been under works between Think and Learn Pvt Ltd, the parent company of Byju's, and vendor Amazon Web Services (AWS), since April 2024, it added. Did not receive a reply to their emailed queries from , Think and Learn Insolvency Resolution Professional (IRP), it added. A spokesperson for AWS said that the company has been working with Think and Learn since April 2024, "to resolve its outstanding.

Starlink arrives in India with plans under Rs. 850 per month

Delhi: Starlink is preparing to launch its satellite communication services in India after clearing most regulatory hurdles. A report claims that its plans could cost \$10 (Rs. 850) per month as the debut approach. Consumers may receive unlimited data plans under initial promotional schemes. The Elon Musk-backed business hopes to swiftly build its user base to 10 million to offset high spectrum prices due to volume benefits. The Department of Telecommunication



(DoT) granted Starlink a Letter of Intent to launch satellite communication services in India earlier this month. The Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) may impose a Rs. 500 per month per urban user price, making satellite internet services more expensive than wired and wireless broadband

connections, according to the. In addition, 4 percent of total adjusted gross revenue (AGR) with a minimum yearly charge of Rs. 3,500 per spectrum block and an 8 percent licensing fee for commercial services in India are required. The government has yet to approve these recommendations.

India's crypto industry urges tax cuts as Donald Trump support softens New Delhi stance

Delhi: In an effort to capitalise on what it perceives as New Delhi's accommodating attitude towards digital assets, the cryptocurrency industry in India is urging for tax cuts that have limited domestic trading. This comes as politicians in New Delhi negotiate a more comprehensive trade pact with the United States. Policymakers' views towards cryptocurrency have been warming up, after making it a pariah sector in the country due to regulators' mistrust of its possible illegal applications. After Donald Trump's endorsement of digital cur-



rencies and his return to the White House, exchange executives told them that Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government has become much more attentive and engaged. The frequency of industry meetings with lawmakers has increased from once every six months to

"monthly, if not weekly," according to Ashish Singhal, co-founder of CoinSwitch, one of the biggest cryptocurrency exchanges in India with over 20 million members. Reducing taxes that he called "very harshly" enforced was the industry's "big ask," he claimed.

SEBI and the Exchange are in advanced negotiations

Delhi: In order to reach a consent settlement in the co-location case that is presently pending before the Supreme Court, the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) is in advanced negotiations with the NSE. A



Securities Appellate Tribunal (SAT) decision that lessened the initial sanctions levied against NSE in 2019 has been appealed by SEBI. According to someone with knowledge of the situation, "the discussion on the most important

issue of resolving the co-location case started, around one and half months ago." "The amount that NSE should pay to SEBI in order to settle the lawsuit is one of the consent terms that are currently being negotiated by both parties.

Bharat Dynamics to Receive Invar Missile Order from Government; Shares Climb 2%

Delhi: An official from the government has said that the Ministry of Defence is putting the finishing touches on a purchase order for 500 Invar ATGMs from state-run Bharat Dynamics Ltd (BDL). The contract is estimated to be worth between two and three million rupees. In order to strengthen India's armoured combat capabilities, this acquisition is a part of a larger push to equip T-90 main battle tanks with pre-



cision-guided missile systems. Tanks are the ideal platforms from which to launch Invar missiles. An official informed that the Defense Ministry is likely to spend between two and three million Indian

rupees (about \$2,100 million) for 500 missiles from BDL. As a result of their reputation for precision and efficacy, Invar missiles are currently being used by armoured units on India's frontline.

Fewer jobs at Tata Motors, smaller hikes for top deck

Delhi: For the first time in five years, automotive manufacturer Tata Motors saw its workforce shrink in a fiscal year, when its employee base fell 3% in FY25 compared with the previous fiscal. Alongside, the fiscal also saw median salary hikes for its senior-most executives at just 3% compared with 15% in

FY24, the company's annual report for FY25 showed. The twin developments happened against the backdrop of falling demand for its cars, trucks and buses in the fiscal. The total employee count of the country's third-largest automaker, excluding employees of its UK-based subsidiary Jaguar Land Rover.

More than 257 govt. schools have their vocational programs approved by the DoE

Delhi: Starting this school year, 257 additional government schools in Delhi will be offering vocational courses, an initiative by the Directorate of Education (DOE) to incorporate career-oriented, hands-on learning into the curriculum.

Designed for students in grades 9 and 10, the curriculum will provide practical experience in areas like health-care, retail, information technology, and beauty and wellness. According to officials, the total number of government schools offering a skill-based topic has already surpassed 800, thanks to this expansion.

In addition to a traditional education, kids participating in the Samagra



Shiksha program can now take vocational courses that will help them get a leg up in the job market. This program aims to represent the larger goal of the National Education Policy 2020 by making education more relevant and in line with real-world employment markets, as stated in an official circular. These practical courses will now be available to pupils in grades 9 and 10, with school officials estimating that each topic may hold up to 50 students.

Tejaswini's 25-meter pistol gold lets India top the medal tally

Delhi: India took first place in the shooting sport with eleven medals, thanks to Tejaswini's victory in the women's 25-meter pistol event at Monday's ISSF Junior World Cup 2025 in Suhl, Germany. India took home the most medals at the junior ISSF World Cup with nine total, including three golds, four silvers, and the same number of bronzes. China came in second with three golds and one bronze.

IIT-Roorkee joins institutions which have cut Turkiye links

Delhi: IIT-Roorkee has cancelled its Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Inonu University, Turkiye, becoming the third central university after Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) and Jamia Millia Islamia to end academic ties with a Turkish university. Lovely Professional University (LPU), a private university, has terminated six MoUs with universities in Turkey and Azerbaijan. Signed in Jan 2025, the MoU had enabled research collaboration and student and faculty exchange. IIT-Roorkee said the decision aligns with national interest.



"Our global partnerships must reflect the values, priorities, and security considerations of our country," said Kamal Kishore Pant, director of the IIT. Chhatrapati Shahu Ji Maharaj University (CSJMU), Kanpur, a state-government run university, has also ended similar

MoUs, while there are many others reviewing their international agreements with higher education institutions from Turkiye. LPU cited the two countries' pro-Pakistan stance during recent Indo-Pak tensions as the reason for ending collaborations.

Degree of Freedom: IIT Delhi Learns Future-Ready

Delhi : IIT Delhi has revamped its curriculum for the first time in 12 years to improve flexibility, hands-on learning, and alignment with global trends and sustainability. An integrated MTech lets undergraduates earn a bachelor's and a master's in five years. Students can petition for an MTech degree in any available program after their third

year. "We updated our curriculum to prepare graduates for the future. IIT Delhi director Rangan Banerjee said the new curriculum gives students freedom and hands-on learning "following considerable stakeholder feedback. The revisions will be introduced in 2025-26 as part of a 2022 curriculum revamp. The previous IIT Delhi cur-

riculum review was in 2013. The institute considered student suicides and academic stress. Credit requirements were lowered and first-year class numbers were reduced from 300 to 150 students. "These concerns are always at the back of our minds when we undertake such initiatives," she said.

DOE issues guidelines for direct entry to Class XI in govt schools



Delhi: Delhi Directorate of Education (DOE) has issued guidelines for direct admission to Class XI in govt schools under the non-plan admissions category for the academic session 2025-26. The online registration process begins and is open to students residing in Delhi who did not study in govt or govt-aided schools under DOE in 2024-25. The admission process will be conducted in three cycles from May 27 to June 9 (cycle I), July 1 to July 10 (cycle II), and Aug 1 to Aug 11 (cycle III). Students can register online at DoE's website, and help desks at schools will assist applicants who need support with the form. Applicants must meet specific academic criteria for their chosen stream. For example, students seeking admission in the Science stream with Mathematics must have at least 55% overall, with 50% in English, Mathematics, and Science. Relaxations of up to 5% in one subject are available for students belonging to SC/ST, OBC (non-creamy layer), minorities, Kashmiri migrants, or those excelling in national-level sports.

School eco clubs will be rebranded and given more resources

Delhi: As part of a statewide push to improve environmental education among students, all Delhi schools have been ordered to rebrand their current Eco Clubs as "Eco Clubs for Mission LiFE" and reinstate them by August 31. An official release said that this project.

Concerns raised regarding proposed universal seniority policy before the DU Executive Council meeting

Delhi: High-level group recommended a standard approach to streamline promotions and appointments by eliminating persistent ambiguities in academic seniority, notably among assistant professors (Level 10). The panel included college principals, EC members, and SC, ST, and OBC representatives. After five meetings from July 2024 to April 2025, it made its final recommendations. The suggested policy places the first-appointed department ahead of the others. Where no common seniority list is established, faculty age is utilized to assess seniority among first-ranked



candidates across categories within a department. These parallel lists ensure impartiality and clarity in internal appointments, academic committees, and statutory organizations. However, DU Academic Council member and policy committee member Prof. Maya John has

voiced major concerns. John warned that the policy's limitations, such as restricting seniority review to appointments made after April 2022 and refusing to use the reservation roster to calculate inter se seniority, would deepen DU faculty discontent.

Irish education minister invites Indians for education, research

NEW DELHI: James Lawless, Ireland's Education Minister, on Monday said his country is "very welcoming" for students and has a supportive post-study employment visa arrangement. "Ireland is a very welcoming country. We have a very cosmopolitan culture. We have many nationalities now in Ireland, and many people have made their home, including many, many Indians," the Irish minister said, when asked whether his government is considering any changes in post-study work or immigration policies to retain skilled talents.

Maintain pre-2010 7% OBC quota

Delhi : Calcutta high court ordered the West Bengal University of Health Sciences (WBUHS), a government medical university in Kolkata, to enroll students with 7% reservation for 66 OBCs notified in the state before 2010. In its ruling, justice Kausik Chanda noted that a division bench of the high court had set down the state's reservation policy in May, which divided OBCs into A and B categories and offered 10% and 7% quota, respectively. The state must apply OBC reservations solely to the 66 backward classes recognized by

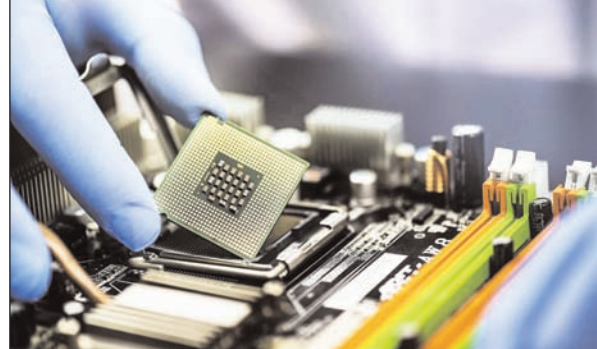


the backward class department before 2009. Justice Chanda that the state's OBC reservations should be 7% per November 6, 1997 notification. Caste certificates for 66 grades produced before 2010 have been preserved and 7% reservation maintained, the decision stated. The government suspended quota-based recruit-

ment and admissions after a division bench of the high court revoked OBC designation for 77 Muslim communities granted by the state since 2010. Supreme Court challenge by TMC government. India's Mahendra sets world record in World Para Athletics Grand Prix



Delhi: Roberto Floriani Edenilson of Brazil had previously held the world record of 59.19 meters, but the 27-year-old beat him in 2022. Following throws of 56.11 and 55.51 meters, he set a new world record with a throw of 61.17 meters on his third try. Throws of 58.54, 57.25, and 58.07 meters were his final three on Sunday. Field athletes who experience mild limitations in the use of one leg should consider F42. Sumit Antil, who has won gold at the Paralympics twice and holds the world record for the men's javelin F64 category, also placed first with a throw of 72.35 meters. Athletes competing on the field who have little or no movement in either leg can use F64. 'A man came to my house twice with different women': Karnataka minister claims 'honeytrap' attempt,

Karnataka home minister G Parameshwara on Tuesday said the state government will determine the course of action and type of probe into the alleged "honeytrap" attempt on cooperation minister K N Rajanna after consulting legal experts and chief minister Siddaramaiah. The statement followed Rajanna's formal request for action, in which he described encountering unfamiliar individuals and raised concerns about whether they acted independently or had external backing. The decision came hours after Parameshwara told reporters in Bengaluru that Rajanna had yet to file a complaint on the matter. "I will file a complaint today and submit it to the home minister because I had spoken about it in the Assembly and had said I would do so. Until today, I was unable to



write the complaint due to various work-related commitments," Rajanna said. Speaking to reporters, he added, "I have personally written the complaint and will submit it to the home minister today. I'm getting it typed... I will go wherever the home minister is and hand it over. I have detailed everything that happened in a three-page complaint." Initially dismissing the issue as a common occurrence, Rajanna said he took it seriously after his name was mentioned in the Assembly. "I have not installed CCTV cameras in my Bengaluru house. If they were there, we could have

identified who came and went," he said. He mentioned that the individuals involved were strangers and stressed the need to investigate whether they acted alone or had backing. Among those who allegedly attempted to "honeytrap" him, Rajanna said the same man appeared both times, but the woman accompanying him was different on each occasion. "The woman who came the second time claimed to be a high court lawyer. However, she was not wearing a lawyer's coat but was dressed in jeans and a blue top. They approached me, stating they had something important.

Congress's Karti asks Tamil Nadu govt to learn sanitation from BJP-ruled city

NEW DELHI: Congress leader Karti Chidambaram on Tuesday advised the MK Stalin-led Tamil Nadu government to learn garbage management from the BJP-ruled Indore. Poor garbage management, street dogs & cattle, broken sidewalks & potholed roads is the hallmark of Chennai. Visit Indore to start with," he said in a post on X. "Officials from Chennai to visit Europe to study waste management techniques in May World Bank will support Chennai officials' visit to cities like Barcelona to study clean waste management. This could help Tamil Nadu adopt better solutions amid protests over local dump yards," the report said.

Indore, in 2025, earned the title of India's 'Cleanest City' for seventh consecutive year. According to an August 2024 study, nearly 80% of households in Chennai practiced waste segregation, yet 77% of the waste ultimately gets mixed before reaching landfill sites in Kodungaiyur and Perungudi.

Shark Tank's Kevin says half of Canadians are interested in becoming 51st state

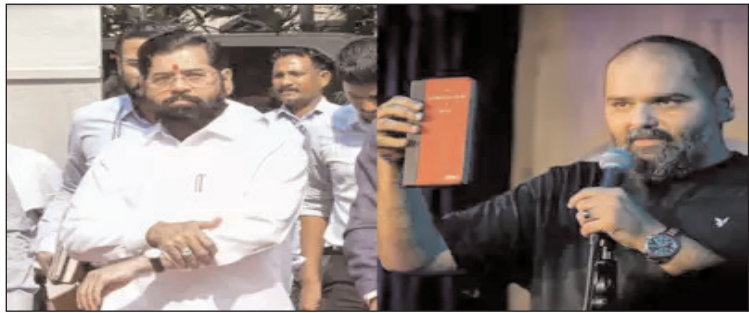
Shark Tank's Kevin O'Leary said most of the Canadians are interested in merging with the US.



Shark Tank's Kevin O'Leary, a Canadian, said he is very much enthusiastic about the idea of Canada being merged with the United States and half of the Canadians are but they don't want Prime Minister Justin Trudeau to do the deal with President-elect Donald Trump. The Canadian businessman said he would go to Mar-a-Lago to talk about a US-Canada merger. "There are 41 million Canadians, basically the population of California, sitting on the world's largest amount of all resources, including the most important: energy and water. He said he believed that Canadians would trust him with the negotiation. The issue started as a joke at a Mar-a-Lago dinner where Justin Trudeau and his government officials joined Donald Trump. It was a courtesy visit from Trudeau after Trump said he would impose a 25 per cent tax on Canada.

'There should be a limit': Eknath Shinde hits out at Kunal Kamra amid 'gaddar' joke row

NEW DELHI: Maharashtra deputy chief minister Eknath Shinde reacted to comedian Kunal Kamra's "gaddar" joke and said there should be a "limit" to freedom of speech. "Freedom of speech is there. We understand satire. But there should be a limit. This is like taking 'supari' (contract) to speak against someone," he said at a BBC Marathi event. Responding to the vandalism of Habitat Studio by the Shiv Sena workers, Shinde said, "The other person should also maintain certain level, otherwise, action causes reaction." This same person (Kamra) had commented on the Supreme Court of India, the prime minister, (journalist) Arnab Goswami and some



industrialists. This is not freedom of speech; this is working for someone," he added. This came after Kamra refused to apologize for his jokes, apparently made at the deputy CM, that caused massive political uproar in Maharashtra on Monday. "I will not apologise," Kamra said, taking aim at the "mob and politicians." "Our right to

freedom of speech and expression is not only to be used to fawn over the powerful and rich even though today's media would have us believe otherwise," he added. What sparked the controversy? The controversy erupted when Kamra parodied a popular song from Dil Toh Pagal Hai, labeling Eknath Shinde a "gaddar" (traitor), triggering

protests and vandalism by Shinde-led Sena workers. "Meri nazar se tum dekho to gaddar nazar wo aaye. Haaye," Kunal Kamra said during his show. Shiv Sena first came out of the BJP, then Shiv Sena came out of Shiv Sena. NCP came out of NCP, they gave nine buttons to one voter... everyone got confused," he added. The joke drew a sharp response from Shiv Sena (Shinde faction) workers who went on to vandalise Habitat Studio, the venue where Kamra performed. What were the repercussions? An FIR was registered against Kamra and Khar Police issued summons to him. Additionally, 12 Shinde-led

Pak minister defends military trial of civilians

ISLAMABAD: A Pakistani minister on Wednesday defended the military trial of civilians, saying that such courts were competent to deal with the cases related to attacks on army facilities. Information minister Attaullah Tarar also urged the opposition Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) led by Imran to refrain from politicising or disputing the issue of military trials. "When an attack is carried out on a defence institution or its property is set ablaze, it becomes the responsibility of the relevant authorities to



apprehend the culprits. Just as railway police handle crimes on railway premises, military courts address offences targeting assets. So, when attacks on military assets occur, the Military Act is enforced," he said while addressing a press conference. Tarar criticised Khan's party for using military courts as a political

tool, aiming to create controversy around them. He clarified that military courts only handle cases involving attacks on defence establishments, citing incidents such as the attack on the Corps Commander's House in Lahore. The minister also criticised the PTI for changing its stance regarding trials of civilians in the military courts, recalling that during Khan's tenure, military court trials were praised. "The statements praising the military courts from PTI's leadership are still available on social media.

Rice shipment from India, first for Yunus government, to arrive today

DHAKA: Bangladesh is set to receive its first consignment of rice imported from India since the formation of the new interim govt even as it looks to be drawing closer to Pakistan than to its immediate neighbour India, which stood beside Bangladesh in 1971 through shared sacrifices. Bangladesh had witnessed ships



coming from Karachi twice in recent days. On Nov 13, for the first time since independence, a container-carrying ship sailing directly from Karachi had docked at Chattogram (Chittagong). This time the ship "MV Tanais Dream", carrying 24,690 metric tonnes of parboiled rice imported from India under the open tender agreement, will arrive at Chaudagram port at 5.30am on Thursday. This is also the first consignment of parboiled rice imported from India under the Nov 11

Security forces intensify hunt for terrorists in J&K's Kathua'

NEW DELHI: Security forces in Jammu and Kashmir's Kathua district found four loaded M4 carbine magazines, two grenades, a bullet-proof jacket, sleeping bags, and food supplies on Monday as they intensified their search for terrorists hiding in the area. This comes as the search operation, now in its third day, continues in the forested areas of Kathua district to track down a group of infiltrating terrorists, officials said on Tuesday, according to news agency PTI. Director General of Police Nalin Prabhat initiated the operation on Sunday evening in the Hiranagar sector following a confrontation between security forces and terrorists concealed in a nursery. Earlier today morning, as security forces advanced deeper into the cordoned area, gunfire erupted. Officials clarified that



troops conducted precautionary firing after detecting suspicious movement. Security forces deployed an army helicopter above the area while joint army units, including specially-equipped commandos with heavy weaponry, sniffer dogs, drones and unmanned aerial vehicles, continued searching for terrorists believed to be trapped within the zone. The Special Operations Group (SOG) launched the operation after receiving intelligence about terrorists hiding in a 'dhok'—a local enclosure—at a nursery in Sanyal village, about

five km from the Pakistan border, officials said. The hiding terrorists responded with intense gunfire towards the police unit, resulting in a fierce exchange lasting for more than half an hour, they said. Additional forces were promptly deployed to capture the terrorists, who allegedly infiltrated on Saturday either through ravines or via a newly constructed tunnel. Officials reported no casualties from the initial exchange, and the area remained under strict security throughout the night before forces advanced at daybreak.

Elon Musk reacts to Democratic Party's favorability dropping to a record low: 'Public is wise'

Elon Musk who once prided in calling himself a Democrat before he turned towards Donald Trump ahead of the election and is now a crucial part of the government reacted to the latest poll which revealed that the Democratic party's favorability rating stands at a record low. CNN released the poll conducted between March 6 to 9 revealing that the party's favorability rating stands at just 29 per cent -- a record low in CNN's polling dating back to 1992 and a drop of 20 points since January 2021 just after the Capitol riots.



The Republican Party stands at 36 per cent in favorability.

Elon Musk said the public is wise and they now know the Democratic Party scams as their funding is being turned off -- something that Elon Musk's Department of Government Efficiency has been doing. "The public is wise to the Democratic Party scams and their funding via bogus taxpayer-funded NGOs is being turned off," Elon Musk said. According to CNN, just 63 per cent of Democrats and Democratic-leaning independents gave a favorable view of their own party -- which is a dip from 72 per cent in January and 81 per cent at the beginning of Joe Biden's presidency. 79 per cent of Republicans and Republican-minded people take a positive view of the GOP. "Democrats, who overwhelmingly consider Trump too extreme, have yet to consolidate around any one-party leader to serve as a counterpoint.
