Cold wave grips Delhi to Bihar, two die due to cold in Uttar Pradesh

New Delhi
The entire North India is currently in the grip of a severe cold wave. Temperatures are continuously dropping from the hilly regions to the plains. Continuous snowfall in the mountains has intensified the chill in the plains as well. Dense fog blanketed several states on Monday, including Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, and Rajasthan, causing considerable inconvenience to people. Uttar Pradesh is also experiencing the brunt of the cold wave and biting cold. There are reports of a farmer and a young man dying due to the cold in Banda. Meanwhile, road, rail, and air traffic have been severely affected due to the fog. On Monday, fog covered more than 40 districts of the state, including Kanpur, Barabanki, Ayodhya, and Lucknow. Biting cold grips Delhi. The national capital Delhi experienced a sharp drop in temperature on Monday morning. People felt the biting cold. In many places, people were seen warming themselves around bonfires on the roadside. While dense fog was not visible on Monday, the temperature is continuously dropping due to the wind.

US calls India key ally in 'China vs world'

New Delhi: The US-China trade war took a sharper turn this week, with US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent accusing Chinese President Xi Jinping's regime of making "provocative," economic moves after Beijing tightened export controls on rare earth minerals. Speaking to Fox Business on Monday, Bessent said the move was a direct challenge to the global economy. "This is China versus the rest of the world. They announced these export controls that are going to go into effect next month, and we have aggressively pushed back against them. We're not sure where this came from.

Will the Supreme Court hear the Aravalli case again?

The issue of protecting the Aravalli range has reached the Supreme Court

The case related to the alleged weakening of environmental protection measures safeguarding the Aravalli range has once again reached the Supreme Court, with environmental activists and lawyer Hitendra Gandhi writing to Chief Justice of India Surya Kant to review the "100-meter test" rule. No hill forests below 100 meters



Environmentalists concerned about Aravalli protection. A recent Supreme Court judgment has sparked a debate among environmentalists and the general public regarding the Aravalli hills. This judgment, being called

the '100-meter judgment', clarifies that hills less than 100 meters in height in the Aravalli region cannot be automatically classified as 'forests'. Vijay Benjwal and Neeraj Srivastava, experts from the 'Save Aravalli Trust', have expressed serious concerns about this judgment. They state that only two

peaks in Haryana are above 100 meters – one in Tosham (Bhiwani district) and the other in Madhopura (Mahendragarh district). The rest of the area may now be outside the purview of protection. They said that this threatens the entire ecosystem. The Aravalli range prevents dust from the Thar

Desert, recharges groundwater, and maintains biodiversity. If protection is weakened: Dust and pollution will increase (the problem is already severe in Delhi).

ple. On Monday, he said that the government has increased train fares for the second time in a year, and this increase has been made just before the Union Budget. In a post on the social media platform X, Kharge wrote that the condition of the railways has deteriorated during the Modi government's tenure. He also

emphasized that the abolition of the separate railway budget has led to a lack of accountability. The Ministry of Railways announced an increase in train ticket prices. According to the new rules, the fare has been increased by 1 paisa per kilometer for journeys exceeding 215 kilometers in the ordinary class.

The free trade deal between India-New Zealand will benefit farmers

India's trade diplomacy is currently moving at a rapid pace. On one hand, negotiations for a major trade deal with the United States are progressing quickly. On the other hand, India has successfully finalized a Free Trade Agreement with New Zealand. Union Minister of

said that this agreement will not be limited to trade figures alone, but will also have a positive impact on the lives of

ordinary people. Under this agreement, New Zealand has committed to investing approximately \$20 billion in India over the next 15 years. This investment will be made in manufacturing, infrastructure, service sectors, and innovation-related fields. Union Minister Piyush Goyal said at a press conference on

Monday that after the implementation of the India-New Zealand Free Trade Agreement, Indian exports will benefit from zero duty. This will directly benefit farmers, MSMEs, employees, artisans, women-led industries, and youth, as well as labor-intensive industries such as textiles, apparel, leather.

Retail inflation, GDP, and production figures will see changes next year

The central government has announced a change in the base year for key economic indicators. The government will release new series of retail inflation and Gross Domestic Product (GDP) data from February next year, and the Index of Industrial Production (IIP) data from May. This information will also be shared with stakeholders. The Ministry of Statistics and



Programme announced on Monday that the new series of key macroeconomic data related to retail inflation, national accounts, and the Index of Industrial Production will be released next year with a revised base year. The ministry stated

that a consultative workshop on the change in the base year for Gross Domestic Product (GDP), Consumer Price Index (CPI), and Index of Industrial Production (IIP) will be held on December 23 at Bharat Mandapam in New Delhi. A first workshop was held in Mumbai on November 26. This workshop will see the participation of eminent economists, experts from financial institutions and the banking sector.

Five accused arrested during a police encounter, solving robbery incidents under Pipri and Charwa police stations

Kaushambi: On December 16th, under the Charwa police station area, unknown persons on a two-wheeler robbed a man near Shivprayag Garden in the morning (taking Rs. 5000, a mobile phone, etc.). Also on December 16th, 2025, under the Pipri police station, two separate robbery incidents were committed by unknown persons on motorcycles. Teams were formed for the successful investigation of these incidents and the arrest of the accused. These teams collected evidence, including CCTV footage and surveillance data, and used informants to conduct raids on suspected individuals and those suspected of the robberies. Checkpoints were also set up at various sensitive locations. In this sequence, in the early hours of December 22nd, 2025, the in-charge of the Charwa outpost, who was conducting checking in Manouri town, informed the Pipri Station House Officer that five unknown persons on three motorcycles, who appeared suspicious, were speeding away from the



checkpoint towards Charwa town. Upon receiving the information, the Pipri Station House Officer and the SOG in-charge, along with their teams, proceeded towards Charwa town. The unknown persons on the three motorcycles, seeing the police, turned their motorcycles around and tried to escape. The police team pursued them, and the Charwa outpost in-charge, along with his force, also attempted to apprehend the motorcyclists from the opposite direction. Seeing themselves surrounded, they fled towards the road connecting Charwa to Charwa. The police team informed the Charwa

mobile patrol via wireless, and the Charwa Station House Officer, along with his team, also set up a cordon to apprehend the motorcyclists. Subsequently, near Gugwua Ka Bagh, the five unknown persons on the three motorcycles were surrounded by the police teams from both sides. One of the accused abandoned his motorcycle and fled, while the other four motorcyclists were apprehended by the police team. The fleeing accused was pursued by the Station House Officer of Pipri and the SOG in-charge along with their team. While fleeing, the accused fired at the police team with the intention of

killing them. The police team, while protecting themselves, asked the accused to surrender, but the accused again fired at the police team with the intention of killing them. In response, the police team fired in self-defense, and one bullet struck the leg of the fleeing criminal, causing him to fall to the ground injured. Upon questioning, the accused identified themselves as Sachin son of Ram Bahadur, resident of Ratgaha, Charwa police station; Sonu alias Abhishek Kumar son of Kamlesh Pasi, resident of Bhagalpur Mundera, Dhumanganj, Prayagraj; Sujal alias Shreyjal Bhartiya son of Kamlesh Bhartiya, resident of Chakia, Prayagraj; Ankit Pasi son of Surendra Pasi, resident of Chakia, Prayagraj (injured in the encounter); and Babu Rider alias Omi Pasi son of Jhulur Pasi, resident of Chakia, Prayagraj. Three motorcycles, 11 mobile phones, Rs. 5200 in cash, two illegal pistols, two live cartridges, and two spent cartridges were recovered from the possession of the accused.



Jeweler shot by miscreants, bag full of jewelry snatched; incident occurred near police outpost

Prayagraj: Chandan Soni, a resident of Majhua village in the Karchhana police station area, owns a jewelry shop on the Bhirpur highway. On Monday evening, after closing his shop, Chandan Soni was going home on his motorcycle when miscreants lying in wait near the Ghodedi canal bridge shot and injured him with a pistol. Chandan fell to the ground along with his motorcycle after being shot. Taking advantage of the situation, the motorcycle-borne miscreants



snatched the bag containing jewelry from Chandan Soni's vehicle and fled. According to the victim, the bag contained two kilograms of silver jewelry and some cash, which the miscreants stole.

Hearing the gunshot, a crowd of passersby gathered on the road, and the police were informed. The incident, which took place near the Bhirpur reporting outpost, left the police stunned. The police

arrived at the scene, set up roadblocks, and launched a search for the miscreants. The injured Chandan Soni has been admitted to the Karchhana Community Health Center for treatment.

16-Year-Old Girl Dies Due to Doctor's Negligence, Family Accuses Hospital Management

After paying the money, when the reports came, the doctor started treatment based on the report of another patient named 'Khushboo' instead of Anjali's. Due to the wrong treatment, Anjali's condition sud-

denly worsened and became critical. After this, the doctor suggested referring her to another hospital. Santal immediately rushed his daughter to the district hospital, where doctors declared her dead. Anjali's body has been buried at Leelapur Ghat. The deceased's father, Santal, has registered a complaint on the Chief Minister's portal regarding this matter. The police are now investigating the case and questioning the hospital management. Anjali was the youngest of her parents' two daughters and four brothers.

Ineligible Voters' Names Should Not Be Included in the Electoral Roll: District Magistrate

Prayagraj: A meeting was held on Monday at the Sangam Auditorium, chaired by District Magistrate Manish Kumar Verma, in the presence of representatives of recognized national and state political parties, regarding the special intensive revision program of the electoral rolls for the assembly constituencies. In the meeting, the District Magistrate provided detailed information to the representatives of the national and state political parties about the progress and activities of the re-verification and mapping of ASD (Absent, Shifted, or Deceased) voters under the special intensive revision. The District Magistrate said that the ASD list of voters prepared by the BLOs (Booth Level Officers) has been shared with all of you. If any person has been mistakenly included in the ASD list, their name can be removed until December 26th; otherwise, the name of the concerned voter will not be included in the draft publication list. Therefore, you are requested to ensure that your appointed BLAs work



with full dedication and cooperate with the BLOs so that no eligible voter is left out. The District Magistrate informed that the ASD list prepared by the BLOs, identifying deceased, completely shifted, duplicate/already enrolled, absent, and other voters, has been shared with the BLAs appointed by all political parties and has also been pasted at all polling booths. The list of ASD voters prepared in a polling station-wise searchable format has also been uploaded on the Prayagraj district website, where the general public can check their names in the ASD list. If a person's name has been wrongly marked in the ASD list by the BLO, they can contact the concerned BLO or ERO (Electoral Registration Officer) to get their name

removed. The District Magistrate stated in the meeting that special focus is currently being placed on finding and verifying ASD voters. He requested all voters to go to their respective polling booths and check their names in the ASD list. If their name has been mistakenly included in the ASD list, they should get it removed. He informed that the mapping work of a total of 30,31,144 (86.15 percent) voters, according to digitization, has been completed by 2:00 PM on December 22nd. In the meeting, the District Magistrate informed that the option to download the Hindi translated list of ASD category voters with complete details has been made available on the Election Commission of India's ECI Net portal.

Seven Candidates Arrested for Cheating Using Bluetooth Devices: Sent to Jail

Stuck in an Orwellian world:
Liberal Western media, illiberal global agenda

Author Umesh Upadhyay in his book, *Western Media: Narratives on India from Gandhi to Modi*, recalls "the summer of 1982", when he was in Canada. In July that year, Giani Zail Singh was elected the seventh President of India. But to his "utter surprise", there was no mention of India having a new president in the Canadian newspapers. This despite the fact that Canada had by then "a sizable Punjabi population, so much so that some signage in certain areas was in Gurmukhi. If you happened to travel by Air Canada, there were announcements in Punjabi". Yet, the appointment of the first Sikh President of India found no mention in Canadian newspapers. Incidentally, one day, Upadhyay found a news report about India in the local Canadian newspapers. It was regarding a bus accident in which some Hindu pilgrims were killed. "A bus accident in India finds a place in the international section of a Canadian newspaper, but the world's largest democracy getting a new President — that too a Sikh — doesn't. Why is that?" This question bothered Upadhyay for long, till he realised that "the Western media's coverage of developing countries like India is that it solely focuses on disasters — man-made or natural. It creates a lopsided image of such countries as crisis-ridden nations". One understands the Western media's mindset from journalist Gerald Priestland's article, 'With Nehru Around India', for the BBC in the 1950s. "There were times when I found myself writing: 'This country (India) is doomed; if it does not starve to death or perish of the plague, it will surely explode in bloody revolution.'" Nothing of the sort happened. India not just evaded such nightmarish scenarios, but also became a power to reckon with, economically as well as geostrategically. To add to it, the country has decided, especially in the past 10 years, to consciously shun its Western colonial hangovers. New India is today far more confident about itself, its cultural/civilisational identity, and of course its space in the world order. This, however, is just half the story. The other half is far more disconcerting. And this second half has two altogether different facets. One, the mainstream media in the West traditionally acts as an extended arm of the government. The Western media coverage of the Ukraine war is a classic example. One can, therefore, see an adverse media reportage or human rights coverage in the American press just before the United States is supposed to seek some economic, commercial or diplomatic concessions from India. The two act in tandem to secure larger American interests. The second development is as disconcerting for India as it is for the United States. It's the growing Qatari-Saudi-Chinese money in the American media, think tanks and academia. Millions of dollars have been poured into American institutions, especially in the past two decades, thus creating a class of people American in blood and colour, but Qatari in taste, Chinese in opinions, and Saudi in intellect. According to a 2022 study, between 2001 and 2021, US higher education institutions received \$13 billion in funding from foreign sources, of which Qatar alone contributed \$4.7 billion to dozens of American academic institutions, including Harvard. Similarly, a US Education Department record shows that Saudi Arabia contributed \$650 million to American universities between 2012 and 2018. Saudi money went to all sorts of American universities: From the elite Harvard and Yale, to public universities like Michigan and Berkeley. As for Chinese money, nearly 200 US colleges and universities held contracts with Chinese businesses, valued at \$2.32 billion, 2012 and 2024, according to a report published in The Wall Street Journal.



China racing ahead in critical technologies

There are multiple disruptions that are taking place currently. The Cold War did provide some kind of stability, though it witnessed multiple conflicts wherein warring sides were either supported by the US or by the Soviet Union or Russia. With the breakup of the Soviet Union in 1991, the US emerged as the sole superpower, and its fragile stability still continued. With China undertaking major strides in all domains, coupled with its new-found ambition of becoming the sole superpower of the world, the interna-

tional narrative of dynamic equilibrium is witnessing a major change. With Chinese incursions having entered their fifth year in eastern Ladakh, the Russia-Ukraine war continuing in the third year, and the Israel-Hamas conflict continuing in the eighth month, with no end in sight for any of these conflicts, global uncertainties continue. As this emerging geopolitical situation becomes more and more fragile with every passing day, new political alignments are emerging. Russia-China has already entered into a 'no limit' friendship, with a new alignment emerging in the form of Russia-China-North Korea-Iran. More

nations could join this alliance, including Pakistan. The balancing act expected from India on the geo-political front is an important challenge, but India has been walking a tight rope efficiently so far. India has also been managing the economic issues, including the challenges of the supply chain, reasonably well in the national interest. The biggest challenge that is most disruptive stems from technological disruption, which is more alarming as compared to geopolitical and geoeconomic disruptions. In fact, technological disruptions shape even geopolitical and geoeconomic disruptions. The Houthi attack in the

Red Sea using drones and missiles resulted in the US and some other NATO countries mobilising their resources to counter this threat. Technology to be effective need not result in high-end, sophisticated weapons, but low-end, cost-effective weapons using simple technology are also potent tools for the strategic impact that happened consequent to this attack by Houthis in the Red Sea. Another technological impact can be gauged from the fact that Ukraine, with a non-existent navy, has caused asymmetric damage to Russian vessels and has become a headache for the Russians in the Black Sea.

Pakistan: No end in sight to Army, Imran Khan confrontation

After December 16, 1971, no date is as traumatic for the Pakistan army as May 9, 2023. On the former day the pride of the men in khaki was humbled on the parade ground in Dhaka when Lt Gen AAK Niazi surrendered to Lt Gen Jagjit Singh Arora. On the latter, the supporters of former prime minister and Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leader Imran Khan rioted against the army in the streets and cantonments of the country. In the process they destroyed monuments dedicated to the army's revered martyrs, pillaged corps commander Lahore's house, which is named after the country's founder, Mohammed Ali Jinnah, and also attacked other army installations. By showing such utter disrespect the rioters outraged the army's image of itself as the final protector of the people and the country and its foundational principles. No wonder some army generals cried out in anguish that what the 'external' enemy (obviously, meaning India) had not been able to accomplish had been done by the country's internal foes. The May 9 events set the army chief, Gen Asim Munir, squarely against Imran Khan. That their relations were fractured was one aspect of the issue. The other was the inroads that Khan had succeeded in making in the army by invoking



the 'gairat' (pride) of some officers and other ranks by projecting that he was standing firm against the attempts of foreign countries, especially the United States, at interfering in Pakistan's internal affairs. The fact that some members of the armed forces had given their ear and more to Khan's song was unacceptable to the majority of the force. This is because the ethos of the army demands that all officers and men must be loyal to the army chief and no one else. Munir and his supporting generals and officers simply could not afford to overlook Khan's inroads into the army, for it would have impaired the force's discipline and professionalism. And, they could not allow a political leader, however popular, to create splits in the force. Hence, Munir acted decisively against many in its own ranks, including the corps commander, Lahore. He had

them court martialled and dismissed. He opened a second front against Khan through other political forces (the term 'other political forces' has been deliberately used for the Pakistan army is both a professional and a political force) and like-minded individuals in other institutions, including the judiciary, to ensure that Khan remained incarcerated and that the PTI was weakened. The aim was to get it defeated in the elections to the National Assembly and reduce Imran Khan's challenge to a nullity. Munir succeeded in these objectives but not fully. As Pakistan marked the anniversary of May 9, it became clear that the army and its fellow political travelers have not succeeded in entirely rooting out the Imran Khan challenge. The events of the last few days and Munir's long statement of May 9 demonstrates this fact. On May 7

Director-General of Inter Services Public Relations (ISPR) Major General Ahmed Sharif addressed an over two-hour long press conference. He vehemently, and again and again condemned those responsible for the mayhem of May 9 last year. This was a clear reference to Imran Khan and the PTI though Sharif carefully avoided naming them. During his fulminations he slipped in the 'message' that a dialogue with the PTI was only possible if they apologised "publicly" to the "nation" for their actions and pledging to abandon their anarchical approaches adopted constructive political positions. It is not surprising that the Pakistani media underlined Sharif's 'message' for Khan and the PTI. Imran Khan's response to this message was clear and direct. When asked by reporters, as he left a case hearing in a court on May 8, if he was willing to apologise for the May 9 events, Khan responded in the negative. According to media reports Khan stressed that he came to know of May 9, 2023 events only when he attended the court proceedings in the Pakistan Supreme Court on that day. He also emphasised that he had already condemned the violent incidents. PTI's Omar Ayub Khan who is the current leader of the opposition in the

Pakistan National Assembly went further to call the events of May 9 as a conspiracy against Khan. On May 8 evening Pakistan president Asif Ali Zardari said "May 9, 2023 will always be remembered as a dark day in Pakistan's history...". Media reports stated that he stressed that the events of that day had "tarnished" Pakistan and had only "served the interests" of the country's enemies. Prime minister Shehbaz Sharif told a special meeting of the cabinet on May 9 morning that the aim of the May 9, 2023 events was to end democracy in Pakistan, bury the constitution and establish an individual's dictatorship. While these reactions of the current political leaders were significant the most noteworthy statement came from army chief Asim Munir. During a visit to the Lahore Garrison on May 9, Munir said that attempts were being made through digital platforms to create divisions between the army and the people. He characterised the riots of May 9, 2023 as "criminally orchestrated violence" and that its plotters were now trying to "twist the narrative". However, he added, "there can be no compromise or deal with the planners and architects of this dark chapter in our history". He then went on to say "the real leaders.

Macron's attempts to woo Xi and Chinese 'long game'

Emmanuel Macron, along with his wife Brigitte Macron, hosted Chinese President Xi Jinping and his wife Peng Liyuan at the Pyrenees mountains, a place where the French President made regular trips to see his grandmother as a child, on Tuesday. A day before this, on Monday, the wife of the Chinese President, on invitation, visited the Orsay Museum with the first lady of France in Paris. The two-day visit of the Chinese President to France was a part of Xi's Europe tour, which includes Serbia and Hungary as well, two countries that have maintained close ties with Russia despite the Ukraine war. Xi's Europe tour will conclude on Friday. Xi's France visit saw the rolling of the red carpet for the Chinese President as he attended

the state dinner organised for him by Macron at the Elysee Palace, as the General Secretary of the Chinese Communist Party started his first trip to Europe in five years. The streets of Paris, which were the Eden of modern liberal views—remember the French Revolution—were donned with Chinese and French flags, welcoming an 'autocrat' ruling a regime no less 'Robespierrian'. Yet protesters wearing Tibetan flags on their shoulders took part in a demonstration in support of members of the Tibetan and Uighur communities, whose rights the West claims to vehemently advocate. The visit marked 60 years of diplomatic relations between Paris and Beijing, as France was the first Western country to formally recognise the People's Republic of

China on January 27, 1964. To understand the reasons behind this hospitality, Macron's recent interview to the Economist can be referred to, in which the French President called the war in Ukraine an existential threat to Europe. Otherwise as well, the President has been considered among the most 'hawkish' leaders when it comes to the security of the continent. Macron has been advocating a more 'independent' security policy for Europe moving out of the cross-Atlantic approach and favours being less reliant on the US, or NATO in terms of ensuring Europe's security. "If Russia wins in Ukraine there will be no security in Europe... Who can pretend that Russia will stop there?" asked the French President.

Swapan Dasgupta's essay on PM Modi that NYT asked for, but refused to publish

Author and columnist Swapan Dasgupta has revealed that 'The New York Times' approached him in March this year for a "thought-provoking essay on the appeal of the PM's BJP movement". Dasgupta sent his 1,500-word essay to the NYT and was first asked to incorporate "some of the criticisms of Modi", which he was fine with. The essay, which was sympathetic to Modi and had elaborated on the shift in the Indian establishment, was sent on April 22, says Dasgupta. However, after two days, he was told "it looks as though we won't move forward with this. Sorry for that." Dogmatic consistency has been the defining characteristic of the overseas India-watchers' perception of Prime Minister Narendra Modi. Ten years ago, on April 10, 2014, in a feeble bid to influence voting in the general election, a clutch of notables including writer Salman Rushdie, Harvard professor Homi Bhabha, artist Anish Kapoor and others, published a joint letter in a British newspaper charging Modi with "failure of moral character and political ethics". "Were he to be elected prime minister," they argued, "it would bode ill for India's future as a country that cherishes the ideals of inclusion and protection for all its peoples and communities." Adding its voice to the panic, The Economist suggested "it would be wrong for a man who has thrived on division to become prime minister of a country as fissile as India." The experience of 10 years at the helm and the very real possibility of voters granting him a third term doesn't appear to have tempered the disquiet of the custodians of Indian Enlightenment. With opinion polls suggesting yet

another emphatic mandate for the Bharatiya Janata Party, the critics believe the one-sidedness of the contest is due to Modi "turning democracy into electoral authoritarianism". A Chatham House this month report has drawn attention to charges of "authoritarianism by stealth through controlling key levers of power, including security services, tax authorities and the media". If the June 4 results lead to the BJP decimating the Rahul Gandhi-led Congress yet again, it is likely that Modi's overseas critics will team up with India's Opposition to question the legitimacy of the triumph. Although such a challenge will lack credence if the turnout is good, the larger objective is to sow doubts in the minds of business leaders and political decision-makers about India's success story. Modi is the real target and by tarring him with the brush of autocracy, his critics hope to envelop him in yet another murky controversy. Their hope is that the memories of an earlier saga when the United States rescinded his visa can be resurrected to damage his global standing. The twinning of the Western liberal establishment's concerns over India's "democratic backsliding" with the opposition Congress party's fighting the polls on a similar platform is significant. Since Modi assumed charge in 2014, there has been a silent revolution that has resulted in the growing marginalisation and irrelevance of the old elite that inherited the country from the British in 1947.

What is often described as the Congress ecosystem loosely comprised Westernised and cosmopolitan individuals and was influenced by progressive.


WINTER SESSION | War of words erupts over codeine cough case and 'Delhi-Lucknow' reference

'Two Models' comment triggers political storm

LUCKNOW

The Uttar Pradesh Legislative Assembly witnessed sharp political exchanges on the second day of the winter session after Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath made a remark referring to "two models" sitting in Delhi and Lucknow, triggering strong objections from the Samajwadi Party. The comment came during Question Hour while the House was discussing allegations linked to the codeine cough syrup case raised by the opposition.

Responding to SP allegations, the Chief Minister said the opposition should come prepared with facts, asserting that no deaths in Uttar Pradesh were linked to codeine cough syrup. He said licences for key wholesalers were issued during the previous SP government and added that action under the NDPS Act was underway, with multiple arrests already made. He also stated that strict action, including bulldozer action where

warranted, would be taken at the appropriate time.

During his address, the Chief Minister made a veiled reference to "two models" in Delhi and Lucknow, suggesting that no individual had been named and asked members not to attribute statements to themselves unnecessarily.

"BJP has forgotten decorum"

Samajwadi Party chief Akhilesh Yadav reacted on X, calling the Chief Minister's remark an "admission" of internal conflict. He urged those holding constitutional positions to maintain decorum and said the BJP should not bring its internal Delhi-Lucknow tussle into public political discourse.



Despite repeated appeals, SP legislators moved into the Well of the House, raised slogans, and later staged a walkout.

The confrontation unfolded amid broader discussions on the codeine cough syrup investigation, supplementary budget presentation, and a special debate marking 150 years of 'Vande Mataram'. Nine years later, life terms for five in highway Gangrape

A Special POCSO court in Bulandshahr on Monday sentenced five men to life imprisonment for the gangrape of a woman and her 14-year-old daughter on National Highway-91 in July 2016. Special Judge O.P. Verma also imposed a fine of ₹1.81 lakh on each convict, directing that half of the total amount be given to the two victims.

The horrific crime occurred on the night of July 28, 2016, when a family of six from Noida traveling to a funeral in Shahjahanpur, was waylaid near Dostpur flyover. The accused threw an iron object at their car, forced them into a field, tied up the male members, and assaulted the woman and her daughter. They also robbed the family before fleeing. The case had exposed significant lapses in

the initial police investigation, leading to action against 17 police personnel, including the then SSP. The Allahabad High Court subsequently handed over the investigation to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI).

Woman demands closure of liquor outlet

An administrative village chaupal in Farrukhabad district turned into a moment of intense public attention when a woman openly appealed to the District Magistrate to shut down the local liquor shop, saying alcohol addiction had destroyed her family's financial stability.

The incident took place on December 20 during a gram chaupal organised in Nagli Husa village under Amritpur tehsil. Addressing District Magistrate Ashutosh Kumar


Police have solved a horrifying murder case in the Chandauli area of Sambalh, where a woman, Ruby, allegedly killed her husband, Rahul, with the help of her lover, Gaurav. 

Indonesia bus crash kills 16

A passenger bus crash killed at least 16 people on Indonesia's main island of Java just after midnight Monday, officials said. The bus carrying 34 people lost control on a toll road and struck a concrete barrier before rolling onto its side, said Budiono, a search and rescue agency chief who goes by single name like many Indonesians. The bus was travelling from the capital Jakarta to the country's ancient royal city of Yogyakarta when it overturned while entering a curved exit ramp at the Krapyak toll way in Central Java's Semarang city, he said.

PIO new CTO of Starbucks

Starbucks has appointed Indian-origin technology executive Anand Varadarajan as its new executive vice president and chief technology officer (CTO), tapping a nearly 2-decade Amazon veteran to lead its global technology operations. Varadarajan will take charge on January 19, join the company's Executive Leadership Team, and report directly to Chief Executive Officer Brian Niccol. Starbucks said he succeeds Debra Hall Lefevre, who retired in September. At Amazon, Varadarajan spent close to 19 years building large-scale, customer-focused technology platforms, most recently overseeing technology and supply chain for its Worldwide Grocery Stores business. Earlier, he worked as a software engineer at Oracle and with several startups.

Russian general killed by bomb under his car

MOSCOW

A Russian general was killed on Monday morning after an explosive device detonated underneath his car in Moscow, and investigators said Ukraine could be behind the attack, the third such killing of a senior military officer in a year.

Lt Gen **Fanil Sarvarov**, head of the Operational Training Directorate of the Russian Armed Forces' General Staff, died from his injuries, said Svetlana Petrenko, the spokesperson for Russia's Investigative Committee, the nation's top criminal probe agency.

Investigators are pursuing numerous lines of enquiry regarding the murder. One of these is that the crime was orchestrated by Ukrainian intelligence services, Petrenko said. Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said President Vladimir Putin had been informed of the Sarvarov's killing. The defence ministry said Sarvarov had previously fought in Chechnya and taken part in Moscow's military campaign in Syria.

Just over a year ago, on Dec



17. 2024, Lt Gen Igor Kirillov, the chief of the military's nuclear, biological and chemical protection forces, was killed by a bomb hidden on an electric scooter outside his apartment building. Kirillov's assistant also died. Ukraine's security service claimed responsibility.

An Uzbek man was arrested and charged with killing Kirillov on behalf of the Ukrainian security service.

Putin described Kirillov's killing as a "major blunder" by Russia's security agencies, noting they should learn from it and improve their efficiency.

But in April, another senior Russian military officer, Lt Gen Yaroslav Moskalik, a deputy head of the main operational department in the General Staff, was killed by an explosive device placed in his car parked near to his apartment building just outside Moscow. A suspected perpetrator was arrested.

Moscow also has blamed Ukraine for several bombings and other attacks in Russia.

Space war: Kremlin may attack Elon Musk's Starlink

Two Nato-nation intelligence services suspect Russia is developing a new anti-satellite weapon to target Elon Musk's Starlink constellation with destructive orbiting clouds of shrapnel, to rein in Western space superiority that has helped Ukraine on the battlefield.

Intelligence findings say the so-called "zone-effect" weapon would seek to flood Starlink orbits with thousands of high-density pellets, potentially disabling multiple satellites at once but also risking catastrophic collateral damage to other orbiting systems.

Analysts say they doubt such a weapon could work without causing uncontrollable chaos in space for companies and countries, including Russia and its ally China, that rely on thousands of orbiting satellites for communications, defence and other vital needs.

DoJ restores Trump photo removed from Epstein files

Washington: The US justice department said it had restored an image it had removed a day earlier from the public release of investigative files related to Jeffrey Epstein after concluding that the photograph, which included within it a photo of Trump, posed no risk of public exposure to victims of the late convicted sex offender, 'The Guardian' reported.

The department said the image had been flagged by federal prosecutors in New York for potentially exposing victims of Epstein.

"Out of an abundance of caution, Dept of Justice temporarily removed the image for further review," the dept said. "After the review, it was determined there is no evidence any Epstein victims are depicted in the photo, and it has been restored without any alteration or redaction."

On Sunday, deputy US attorney general Todd Blanche said removing photos from Epstein files, including one of Trump, has "nothing to do" with the president – and maintained the images would likely go back up after it is determined whether they need redactions.

Blanche said the 16 removals came at the request of victim rights groups about this type of photograph, we pull it down and investigate."

AMERICA PURSUES THIRD OIL TANKER NEAR VENEZUELA

Washington: The US on Sunday began pursuing what it described as a "dark fleet" vessel in international waters near Venezuela after the ship refused to stop and continued sailing, CNN reported. The vessel, Bella I, was sailing toward Venezuela to load oil when US Coast Guard officials tried to board it. Instead of complying, the vessel continued sailing, prompting officials to launch an active pursuit.

Bella I is under American sanctions for links to Iranian oil and is viewed as part of a "shadow fleet" used to transport crude from sanctioned countries. A judicial warrant had already been issued for the vessel's seizure. In a scathing statement, the Venezuelan foreign ministry denounced the "theft and hijacking" of a private vessel that was transporting Venezuelan oil through international waters. Meanwhile, China condemned the US military's move to seize Venezuelan oil tankers in international waters, saying the "arbitrary action" constitutes a serious violation of international law.

Meanwhile, two US lawmakers have threatened legal action against US Attorney General Pam Bondi, after her deadline to release all government files was met in part.

Greenland row: Denmark says US must respect territorial integrity

Copenhagen: The Danish foreign minister said on Monday his country insists everyone, including the US, must respect "the territorial integrity of the Kingdom of Denmark" after President Trump's announcement. The appointment of a special envoy to Greenland, Louisiana

Governor Jeff Landry, who said his goal would be to make the territory part of the US.

Greenland PM said the territory is happy to cooperate with countries, including US, but emphasised "we decide our own future". Danish FM said he plans to summon the US ambassador. —AP



Arsenal striker Viktor Gyokeres is optimistic about his team's chances to win English Premier League this season. Arsenal go to Christmas at the top of the standings and are playing some fantastic football, although they've yet to convert this into a title win on the previous four occasions.

"We are all optimistic. I believe the team has a strong spirit and a positive atmosphere at the training ground. It is important to maintain that energy, keep doing the things that are working well, and continue improving together every day. Right now, we are focusing on winning the upcoming games rather than thinking too much about the end goals," Arsenal player Viktor Gyokeres said while speaking to JioStar.

There were signs he was settling in a couple of months ago but a hamstring injury halted his momentum and Gyokeres has been quiet since returning to the side. Gyokeres scored Arsenal's only goal in the 1-0 win over Everton on Saturday to ensure a top finish for December 25 with Manchester City two points behind, followed closely by Aston Villa.

New Zealand wins Test by 323 runs

Jacob Duffy takes 5-42 as hosts bowl out the West Indies for 138

MOUNT MAUNGANUI (NEW ZEALAND)



Jacob Duffy took 5-42 as New Zealand bowled out the West Indies for 138 on a deteriorating fifth-day pitch to win the third test by 323 runs Monday and take the three-match series 2-0.

Duffy surpassed Richard Hadlee's New Zealand record of 80 wickets in a calendar year and finished the series with 23 wickets at an average of 15.4, including three five-wicket hauls. He bowled more than 154 overs as the workhorse of the New Zealand attack in the three tests.

"I saw that list at lunchtime and there were some cool names on there, so to be up there on any sort of list with those sort of names was special," Duffy, who was voted Player of the Series, said of his bowling record.

Runs aplenty
New Zealand's win ended a series in which both teams had to cope with significantly depleted pace attacks and in which a slew of batting rec-

ords fell. The West Indies were without Shamar Joseph and Alzarri Joseph. Duffy became New Zealand's pace spearhead after injuries sidelined Matt Henry, Will O'Rourke, Ben Sears, Kyle Jamieson, Nathan Smith and Blair Tickner.

The third test was a feast for statisticians. Devon Conway made 227 and Tom Latham 137 in a 323-run opening stand in New Zealand's first innings of 575-8 declared. Conway then made 100 and Latham 101 in a partnership of 192 in the second innings before New Zealand declared at 306-2, leaving West Indies a target of 462 to win after being bowled out for 420 in the first innings.

Playing its first international game after a historic World Cup triumph last month, Harmanpreet Kaur's side didn't need to break much sweat in the batting and bowling departments during an eight-wicket win over the island nation.

However, the team's fielding, especially catching, left a lot to be desired despite the bowlers managing to restrict the Lankans to a paltry 121 for 6.

"We are working on our fielding. Don't know why we keep dropping catches. It is wet out here, but it is not an excuse. That is something we really need to think about in the next match, we will come about with a better approach," skipper Harmanpreet Kaur had said after the match.

Less than a year after that loss to Australia in Ahmedabad, Rohit led the Indian team to the T20 World Cup title in the Americas, but overcoming the pain of the defeat in November 2023 was extremely difficult.

"I guess when you invest so much into something and don't achieve the result, it's a very natural reaction. That's exactly what happened with me. But I also knew that life doesn't end there."


