In Haryana, 650 private hospitals have discontinued Ayushman Bharat services due to outstanding payments

Delhi : The Ayushman Bharat plan services in Haryana have been suspended by the state chapter of the Indian Medical Association (IMA) due to outstanding dues from empanelled institutions. This is despite the state government's promise to disburse the payments as soon as possible. Nearly 650 private hospitals in Haryana are represented by the IMA. These institutions are part of the Ayushman Bharat-Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB-PMJAY), a government program that offers ₹5 lakh in annual health coverage to families for secondary and tertiary care. Prior to this, the organization had issued a



warning that, beginning on August 7, private hospitals would no longer provide care under the program unless outstanding payments were settled. Sudhir Rajpal, the additional chief secretary (health) of Haryana, had pleaded with the IMA to rethink their decision after meeting with its

representatives on Wednesday. On Thursday, Dhirender K. Soni, the Haryana secretary of the Indian Medical Association (IMA), stated that the state government has not cleared the reimbursement of private hospitals. A sum of ₹490 crore is overdue.

DTC will launch e buses connecting three Delhi ISBTs with Noida

Delhi ; Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC) have announced that electric bus services will begin connecting the capital to the soon-to-be-built Noida International Airport (NIA) in Jewar. Despite the airport's probable failure to meet the May operational deadline, buses will depart from three Inter State Bus Terminals (ISBTs) in Delhi: Maharana Pratap ISBT at Kashmere Gate, Swami Vivekanand ISBT at Anand Vihar, and Veer Hakikat Rai ISBT at Sarai Kale Khan.

Kerala is now India's first digitally literate state

Delhi: Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan said that after achieving full literacy, Kerala has once again set a model by becoming the first state in India to achieve complete digital literacy. Declaring Kerala as the first fully digitally literate state in the country at a function held in Thiruvananthapuram, the chief minister said that as part of the second phase of the Digi Kerala project, every essential documents of citizens will be digitised and linked to DigiLocker. "With this, Kerala is set to become



the first state in the country to universally implement such a system," said the chief minister, addressing the gathering after the official declaration. To ensure continuity of digital literacy, the second phase of the Digi Kerala will also include training to identify and prevent cybercrimes and misuse of social

media, he said. At present, around 9,000 government services have been made available online. In addition, services are being provided through K-SMART. Citizens can now obtain documents such as birth and income certificates, and even file police complaints, without having to visit offices.

Lucknow: 6 Once again, continuous torrential rains in both the mountains and plains have caused floodwaters to rise in several districts of Uttar Pradesh. Recognizing the gravity of the situation, Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath immediately directed officials to intensify relief operations. He instructed them to ensure that no person faces hardship due to the floods, that affected families are shifted to safe locations without delay, and that all their essential needs are met. Amit Shah looks sure of ruling till 2049 but Team Modi is losing steam and imagination

Amit Shah had declared at the Bharatiya Janata Party's national executive meeting in 2018 that the party will win the 2019 Lok Sabha election and "no one can dethrone the BJP for the next 50 years"—that is, till 2069. Last month, the Union Home Minister and BJP chief strategist said in the Lok Sabha that the Opposition parties would be there (on the Opposition benches) "for the next 20 years"—that is, till 2045. Let's make it 2049 because the Lok Sabha election will have taken place in 2044. It also takes into account Prime Minister Narendra Modi's goal of making India a developed country by 2047. Modi is looking to remain at the helm till 2035, at least. In his Independence Day address, he said that "in the coming 10 years, till 2035, I want to expand this (national security shield) ...strengthen it, modernise it". "I" is key here. He will be only 85 by then. And he is much fitter than Joe Biden who demitted the US President's office at 82. Mahathir Mohamad was the Prime Minister of Malaysia till he was almost 95. You may think I can't be serious. Talks of 20 or 50 years are just rhetorical, aren't they? A former BJP MP advised me not to take PM Modi's reference to 2035 seriously. "The day a leader throws a hint that he is even thinking of a retirement plan, everybody around him starts abandoning him. You can't afford to do that in politics," he explained. Maybe. What if BJP leaders truly believe what they say? How else could you explain the Modi-led government's sudden decision to bring the Constitution (130th Amendment) Bill, envisaged to unseat the Prime Minister, chief ministers, and ministers on the 31st day of their arrest or detention in custody? The PM figures in it for effect, of course. The proposed legislation places the CMs and ministers at the mercy of mostly Central investigation agencies whose track record in impartiality is better left undiscussed. These central agencies are known to often go out of their way to please the political bosses. The CMs and ministers who are not from the ruling party/coalition at the Centre have reasons to be alarmed by the proposed legislation. It is always prone to being used against the Opposition. Former Union minister Sharad Pawar recently pointed out how during the Manmohan Singh government, it was P Chidambaram who had backed the amendment in the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) to put the onus to prove innocence on the accused. Pawar told Singh that it was dangerous. "If the government changes, we will also have to face consequences. But the advice was not heeded," disclosed Pawar. In 2019, the Enforcement Directorate (ED) arrested Chidambaram in a PMLA case. He had to spend 106 days in jail before he got bail. The proposed law—Constitution (130th Amendment) Bill—can potentially be weaponized by a ruling party at the Centre (not necessarily BJP) to destabilise governments in states ruled by rival parties (the BJP, included). So, why would Shah or the BJP want to make such a law? The most conceivable answer is that the BJP doesn't see itself sitting on the Opposition benches in the Lok Sabha ever—till 2049, at least. Look at the Centre's stand on the Supreme Court setting a timeline for the governors to act on the bills passed by state assemblies. It wants the elected governments in the states to be placed at the mercy of its nominees in the Raj Bhawans. Only a party that is confident of being in power at the Centre forever would want to take such a stand. This confidence of the BJP is reflected in so many other ways—from overturning the SC's ruling to end government's control over the appointment of the Chief Election Commissioners and ECs to the alleged use of central investigative agencies to target Opposition leaders. There are many other instances. Here is the catch,



Why Modi, BJP should worry about bad blood between CEC Gyanesh Kumar and Rahul Gandhi?

Amit Malviya must be a harried man as Rahul Gandhi set out on his 'Voter Adhikar Yatra' in Bihar on Sunday. Bharatiya Janata Party's social media department, headed by Malviya, is facing flak in the Right-wing ecosystem. The reason: its purported failure to counter the Opposition's narrative about the Election Commission's special intensive revision of electoral rolls in Bihar. Let's look at one such thread. Tushar Gupta, whose bio proclaims him to be "anti-Left", took to X to express his concern about the "fake news" being spread about the electoral process. "Absolutely zero resistance. ECI's press releases are not going to cut it..." he wrote. His argument was that the 18-24 age group in 2029 would be "reelers", not readers, and could be easily swung by Gandhi. "And this is exactly what he (Gandhi) is doing right now," he added. X users reacted to the thread, venting their ire on Malviya, with some even demanding his resignation as the BJP's IT cell chief. Dr Ratan Sharda, who has written several books on the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS), agreed with Tushar and said that Gen Z is "not clued on" to the BJP. "The communication, the enunciation, the slogans — all present a middle-aged projection of a young successful party led by the most popular PM of all times whom youth love. @BJP4India needs to reinvent its SM approach and communication," he wrote. To be fair to Malviya, headline management and narra-



tive-building aren't so easy after 11 years in power. The belligerence of the Election Commission (EC) in dealing with the Opposition isn't helping him either. "Give an oath or apologise to the nation. There is no third option," Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar said at a press conference Sunday, taking on Gandhi's 'vote theft' charge. Many Constitutional experts like former Lok Sabha Secretary General PDT Achary have rubbished the EC's demand for Gandhi's oath under Rule 20(3)(b) of the Registration of Electors Rules 1960, maintaining that it does not apply in this case. Kumar wouldn't bother. Since when has the CEC assumed the authority to instruct public representatives to apologise? Even former CEC MS Gill, who joined the Congress and went on to become a Union Minister after retirement, never demanded it from Opposition leaders as long as he helmed the EC. One may not agree with Gandhi's phraseology—from 'chowkidar chor hai (the gatekeeper is the thief)' to 'vote chori (vote theft)'. He often gets carried away, trying to bring

'earthquakes' in Indian politics. But that can't be the reason for a constitutional body to publicly berate the Leader of the Opposition. Also, it's not the first time that the EC has been accused of favouring the ruling party. After all, the fact is that the CEC was and still is essentially Prime Minister Narendra Modi's handpicked man—the ruling party's choice in that chair. After losing the South Delhi Lok Sabha seat to the Congress in the 1971 elections, Jan Sangh leader Balraj Madhok had gone to court complaining of rigging allegedly facilitated by the ruling Congress and the EC. He had alleged that the ballot papers were chemically treated and mechanically stamped to favour the Congress candidate, Shashi Bhushan. The Supreme Court dismissed his appeal. In 2002, then Gujarat Chief Minister Modi drew censure from Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee for attacking CEC JM Lyngdoh. There are myriad instances of politicians attacking the EC, but no CEC made it a personal issue until now. The body is entrusted to conduct free and fair polls, with no malice toward any party or politi-

cian. If there is bad blood and a public spat between the CEC and the Opposition leaders, it will shake the people's trust and faith in the election results. And that is the worst thing that could happen to Indian democracy. Instead of attacking Rahul Gandhi, the EC could have simply ordered an investigation into his claims of fake voters in Bengaluru's Mahadevapura—or, for that matter, the supposedly inflated number of voters in Maharashtra. It could have done a Bihar-like special intensive revision (SIR) in Mahadevapura immediately to rebut the allegations. That would have bolstered its credibility and its Bihar SIR case. BJP leader Anurag Thakur also made allegations about fake voters in the constituencies of Opposition leaders such as Gandhi, Akhilesh Yadav, and others. Thakur also accused them of 'vote theft'. Gandhi and Thakur were making the same disclosure—that voter lists across the country have issues. CEC Kumar hasn't reacted to Thakur's allegations yet. Fake voters' list is no news, anyway. The CEC could have thanked the Congress and BJP leaders for highlighting this issue again and used it to justify a countrywide SIR. What to speak of allegations of irregularities in Assembly or Lok Sabha elections, in the recent Delhi Constitution Club election (in which incumbent and former MPs are voters), Congress leader and former MP Brijendra Singh found to his dismay that his vote had already been cast. So did

another former MP from the BSP. It's plausible that Kumar—who was Secretary in Amit Shah's cooperation ministry—is extremely upset by Gandhi's diatribe against the Commission. The best way to deal with this would have been to invite Gandhi over for Kashmiri Kahwa, as he used to treat journalists with, and thrash it out. But Kumar has chosen to slug it out publicly with the Opposition. What must worry the BJP is the fact that the Opposition's diatribe against the EC seems to be resonating on the ground. As per a Lokniti-CSDS survey published in The Hindu on Sunday, 45 per cent of the respondents believe that genuine voters may get removed from the voters' list under the SIR, as against only 25 per cent who said 'no'. Only 60 per cent of respondents were very or somewhat confident of the EC's ability to ensure inclusivity. The survey was conducted in six states: Delhi, Assam, Kerala, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, and Uttar Pradesh. The Lokniti-CSDS survey, as compared to its 2019 and 2024 post-poll surveys, shows declining trust in the Commission. In Assam, the number of respondents who said they have "no trust" in the EC increased from 6 per cent in 2019 to 10 per cent in 2024 and 17 per cent in 2025. In Kerala, this increased from 10 per cent in 2019 and 2024 to 24 per cent in 2025. In Madhya Pradesh, the lack of trust in the EC rose from 6 per cent in 2019 to 22 per cent in 2024 and 2025.

After rosogolla, Odias and Bengalis fight over Mamata's Jagannath Dham

In the season of Conclave, what if a church suddenly decided to call itself Vatican — not just a tribute, but a claim to spiritual status? That's what the Mamata Banerjee government effectively did, as far as Odias are concerned, when it named the new Jagannath temple in Digha after Jagannath Dham in Puri, Odisha. For the Odias, this 'appropriation' was the last straw and has put them eyeball to eyeball with the Bengalis like never before. Why did Banerjee tread this path? If a temple was her big trip, why a Puri Jagannath lookalike and not something in the tradition of Bengal's own terracotta temples that dot Bishnupur in Bankura district? Alternatively, it could have opted for something original. Bengalis, it seems, have a peculiar fondness for replicas. During Durga Pujas, Buckingham Palaces, Golden Temples and the Pyramids pop up all over the state — pandals built with bamboo and tarpaulin to house the goddess in the festive season. But

those are temporary structures, dismantled once the pujas end. The Jagannath Temple in Digha is permanent, a silent testimony to the Bengalis' copycat gene. A few months after becoming the chief minister in 2011, Banerjee was on her way home via Newtown, parts of which today resemble Gurgaon from 50 years ago, when she suddenly halted her vehicle, got off, and stood to survey 480 acres of green dotted with waterbodies. On the spot, she declared it a park — and the next thing we know, in 2013, she was inaugurating Eco Park, a brand-new destination in Kolkata a la Victoria Memorial, or the historic Botanical Gardens with the centuries-old Banyan Tree. That wasn't the end of it. Past the tree-lined boundary came up the Pyramids of Giza, an Eiffel Tower, a Taj Mahal, a Colosseum, and even a towering Christ the Redeemer — all of them exact replicas of the originals in miniature form.

History teaching requires revision more than textbooks

What does it mean to be a historian in India? Both of us have formally studied the subject. In the years we've spent working as public historians, we've told myriad stories of India's chequered pasts through heritage walks, museum trails, cultural events, podcasts, an annual journal, book reviews, articles, and social media posts. We've pored over archives and conducted on-ground research. We've also translated scholarship into language and experiences that anyone, from an academic to a casual listener, can connect with. Yet, despite this range of work, one question almost always follows: when we explain what we do: "Okay, but what is your real job?" The question says as much about our profession as it does about how history itself is perceived in India. After all, how often do Indian households encourage history as a job? A base-level problem here is: how do you support the study of history when it isn't even clear what a historian does? In childhood, history may occasionally bask in the dreamy, cinematic glow of Indiana Jones and Night at the Museum. Or Bharat Ek Khoj, Akbar-Birbal adaptations, the delightfully

gory Horrible Histories, and Amar Chitra Katha. In adulthood, though, it either fades into collective amnesia, gets wrapped in nostalgia, or turns into a battlefield of contested claims. Where is the middle ground where we carry forward that childlike curiosity, tempered with adult discernment, to engage with the past with the depth and nuance it deserves? A polarising debate has recently been sparked after yet another round of revisions in NCERT history textbooks. But more than textbooks, history teaching requires revision. What do you remember from your history classes? For most, the answers fall into familiar buckets: rote learning of names, dates, dynasties, and wars. There was little room to explore the texture of lived experience, or to ask: how can this subject help me become a better thinker, a more reflective human? The discipline was frozen in time, and with it, many of us felt we too were trapped — learning about the past in a way that felt wholly disconnected from the present, let alone the future. This is part of the reason historical studies aren't seen as foundations for sustainable careers. But

paradoxically, history seems to dominate our headlines. It's everywhere: in TV debates, political speeches, social media threads. Everyone, it seems, has something to say about the past. That's why the current debate on revisions matters. The problem isn't with 'updating' history. Our understanding of the past evolves as our present changes. Every historian is shaped by their time, drawing not only on the materials and theoretical bases available, but also on their own perspectives and questions. So revisions themselves aren't the issue.

The real concern is how history textbooks are revised. If these changes were aimed at helping students approach the past critically, and provided them with the historian's toolkit — by introducing them to a range of sources, perspectives, and debates — then they would be fruitful. Our NCERT textbooks have been subject to regular revisions, with new theories and ideas inserted alongside scholars' evolving approaches to history. This exercise is necessary, so long as the emphasis remains on updates that accurately convey the latest reflections on continuities and changes.

GST reform is pointless if it doesn't simplify tax slabs

Over the last few days, there have been extensive discussions on the prospects of reforming India's Goods and Services Tax (GST). An important element of the proposed reform is to reduce the present 4-rate structure to a 3-rate one. There could be several objectives behind such a reform. Simplification of the tax structure is an obvious one. Revenue mobilisation could be another, as simpler tax structures are easy to administer and improve compliance. The third is to provide a stimulus to the economy, which is presently dealing with significant uncertainty. I am young enough to be excit-

ed by the prospects of tax reforms, but old enough to know better. More so, given my prior experience in trying to understand the GST. Popular perception suggests there are just four GST tax slabs: 5, 12, 18, and 28 per cent. Why so many slabs for an indirect tax? Because somehow Indian policymaking believes in the progressivity of taxes—even for consumption goods. A lesser-known reality of the GST is that it has a total of eight tax slabs, excluding the exemptions. These start at 0.25 and go all the way up to 28 per cent. Tax rates of 0.25, 1.5, 3 and 7.5 per cent apply to just 1.5 per cent of total

goods traded in India. Some sectors, such as construction services, have six different applicable tax rates ranging from 0 to 18 per cent. The sheer complexity of India's present GST, even after nine years of existence, should be reason enough for an urgent reform. A major issue with the GST's present structure is the pervasive use of end-use exemptions. That is, for certain items, a GST rate is applicable — but if the goods are used for a specific purpose, then there is no GST on the item. Therefore, the same item has two different tax slabs depending on the buyer and end-use of the item.

Moreover, it creates room for rent-seeking, as many would exploit the tax arbitrage introduced by having a 0 per cent and 18 per cent tax rate as applicable on the same goods. Administering such exemptions is excessively costly and goes against the spirit of a self-enforcing tax such as the GST. A comprehensive reform would do away with such end-use exemptions and identify a specific list of items, such as food — irrespective of whether packaged, processed, or prepared in a restaurant — to be classified as exempt. Similar exemptions could be extended to certain kinds of insurance.

Teens who are in love should- n't have to deal with Pocso

Delhi: Supreme Court emphasized the need to safeguard young romantic relationships rather than criminalize them under the Pocso Act, noting that falling in love is not a crime and that teens should not be regarded as criminals and sent to prison. A bench consisting of Justices B V Nagarathna and R Mahadevan stated that true romantic relationships should be treated differently, whereas the Centre is vehemently opposed to the concept of lowering the consent age from 18 to 16 years. The problem of young people falling in love and then running away is something we're dealing with. That much is true. It is inappropriate to use the same statute (Pocso) in these instances. In cases of true romantic relationships, do not treat the youngsters like ordinary offenders. At the hearing, the court stated, "Social reality should be kept in mind."

Delhi: A meeting of the UT-Level Coordination Committee was presided over by Parvesh Verma, the Minister of the Public Works Department (PWD) in Delhi, with the purpose of reviewing important infrastructure concerns and speeding up ongoing projects under the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI), with a focus on safety measures on UER-II. The newly opened Urban Extension Road-II (UER-II) corridor was the main topic of discussion. This road is expected to greatly improve regional con-



nectivity and alleviate traffic congestion in Delhi. Parvesh Sahib Singh ordered the Delhi Traffic Police to increase awareness of the importance of safety precautions on UER-II through the use of signage, public announcements, and awareness initiatives. To ensure a rapid

response mechanism in the event of an emergency, the Minister also ordered the deployment of patrolling vans, sufficient personnel, and surveillance cameras along the corridor, with ambulances stationed at regular intervals.

DMRC plans audio ads on pink line, later on violet line

Delhi: The Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) is set to launch audio ads on the pink line and expand them on the violet line following a nearly two-year trial run, according to an official. Seven trains on the pink line, running from Majlis Park to Jafrabad, and six trains



on the violet line, running from Kashmiri Gate to Tughlakabad, would carry audio ads. There are com-

mercials for many brands' products and services played over the audio ads. Some of these brands are KFC, McDonald's, LIC, and others. A representative from the DMRC informed that the service will be extended to additional lines based on demand.

CMs, ministers, and the prime minister could face 30 days in prison on major charges

Delhi: Home Minister Amit Shah introduce three bills that would make it mandatory for the Prime Minister, chief ministers, and ministers at the federal and state/UT levels to resign or be removed from office if they have been held for 30 days in a row on charges of crimes punishable by five years or more in prison. But once they're out of jail, the president or governor can appoint them to the same position as prime minister, chief minister, or minister. Both the timing and the consequences of the amendments took political circles by storm, coming only two days before the Monsoon session of Parliament came to a close. Anyone serving a term of two



years or more in prison is disqualified from holding public office under the Representation of the People's Act, 1951. Irrespective of the length of sentence, disqualification follows conviction for major offenses including drug trafficking and corruption.

Over 200 properties, to be auctioned off by DDA

Delhi : In order to make room for more events over the forthcoming holiday season, the Delhi Development Authority (DDA) has started an online auction for more than 200 prime sites that are available for a license fee. The properties that are being auctioned off consist of over 115 function sites, kiosks, Aarambh Cafés, Amrit Dhara Food Court, a shopping center, and about 80 locations of mobile towers. The venues are open areas that can accommodate both religious and secular gathering.

Delhi : Officials in Delhi have announced the Delhi BNSS (Service of Summons and Warrants) Rules, 2025, which will allow court summonses and warrants to be sent electronically via WhatsApp and email. They claimed this change will make the summons go out faster. Lieutenant Governor V. K. Saxena had already authorized the notification, which was issued by the home department of the Delhi Government. According to a senior government official, the police force will be



able to focus more on policing and investigations once they are no longer burdened with paperwork and clerical chores thanks to electronic delivery. These days, judges' digital seals and signatures are attached to court summonses that are prepared electronically. After that, the police will notify the

individual by WhatsApp or email. If the electronic delivery fails or the necessary details are not available, the courts have the authority to order physical delivery of the summons, as stated in the Rules. The Rules go a step further in protecting the identities of victims, particularly young girls and women by ensuring that their phone numbers and email addresses are not made public in specific types of cases, such as those involving the POCSO Act.

Former Delhi Riots Responder Satish Golcha Appointed Police Chief

Delhi: After SBK Singh's brief 21-day tenure as commissioner, senior IPS officer Satish Golcha was named the 26th commissioner of the Delhi Police. A public hearing at Rekha Gupta's office in Civil Lines was held, the day before the appointment, and she was attacked. Nonetheless, the authorities insisted that the message was unrelated to the incident. This order was issued by the Ministry of Home Affairs, formally appointing Golcha, an officer from the Arunachal Pradesh-Goa-Mizoram and Union Territories (AGMUT) cadre who was born in 1992, to the position of chief police officer. Serving as the Special



Commissioner of Police (Law and Order) during the 2020 northeast Delhi riots, olcha is renowned for his no-nonsense approach and forceful leadership. His tenure runs till April 2027. After Sanjay Arora's retirement, SBK Singh, an officer from the 1988 batch, became chief of the Delhi Police on August 1. His term was probably the shortest of any chief in the force's history. Golcha succeeded him.

The Capital Sees a Surge in Hepatitis Cases During the Monsoon Season

Delhi: On World Hepatitis Day experts warned that hospitals in the Delhi-National Capital Region (NCR) have seen an alarming increase in hepatitis A and E cases since the rainy season has begun. Children, pregnant women, and individuals with liver illness are particularly vulnerable to this seasonal rise, which doctors attribute to unclean water.

MCD councillors express dissatisfaction over operation of mechanical road sweepers

Delhi: MCD councillors expressed dissatisfaction over the operation of mechanical road sweepers engaged on the ground. They claimed that the functioning of these machines was not supervised properly. The matter was raised by deputy standing committee chairman Sunder Singh Tanwar, who argued that there are 52 MRS machines engaged through contractors for the cleaning of wide roads. "While MCD is spending an average of Rs 2 crore per month on



operating these sweepers, there are no visible changes on the ground, and there is no clarity on when these machines take a round of the area," he said. Councillors have demanded that the route maps of mechan-

ical road sweepers should be shared with them in advance. "These machines operate on roads more than 60 ft wide, and often councillors have expressed dissatisfaction with the waste or dust collected from the

Delhi : In Bengaluru, According to Uber CEO Dara Khosrowshahi, Rapido has surpassed Ola in India and is now the company's most formidable rival. Our primary rival in the past was Ola. At this point, Rapido is the more formidable rival in India. They entered the two-wheeler and three-wheeler markets with a zero-commission subscription model in a robust way. Very flimsy too. In an interview with Zerodha co-founder Nikhil Kamath that was released on Sunday, he mentioned that Ola is currently in third place. Khosrowshahi stated that Uber views India as a crucial market. With over 1.4 million drivers spanning vehicles, two-wheelers, three-wheelers, and cars, the country has surpassed all others to become the third-largest in the world according to the company's trip count. "India is a must win for Uber, not just tomorrow, but ten years



from now," stated the CEO. Khosrowshahi credited Rapido's early success to the company's subscription model, which allowed drivers to keep more of their money. However, he did mention that Rapido was "not making money" and that the company's ability to grow financially will be evaluated. "We've got a lot of respect for them and we intend to compete really hard," according to him. The CEO of Uber pondered the larger realm of fast commerce and mobility, telling entrepreneurs not to be paralyzed by concern over market size. "Successful businesses are constantly changing to stay ahead.

Delhi : The administration boasted that the fourth edition of SEMICON India 2025, which has grown double the size of last year's edition, will be inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on September 2. New Delhi's Yashobhoomi (IICC) will host the gathering from September 2-4, 2025. Singapore, Malaysia, Japan, and South Korea will all have their very own pavilions during SEMICON India. The United States, Malaysia will each host one of six country-specific roundtables. The number of states

Starting operations with iPhone 17 manufacture, Foxconn's B'luru unit

Delhi: According to individuals familiar with the matter, the Bengaluru facility of the Taiwanese electronics company Foxconn has recently started operations with small-scale manufacture of the iPhone 17. With an investment of \$2.8 billion (about Rs 25,000 crore), Foxconn was established at Devanahalli near Bengaluru, becoming the second-biggest plant outside of China and the largest assembler of iPhones.

The manufacturing of the iPhone 17 has begun at the



Foxconn Bengaluru factory. This is on top of what its Chennai unit is already producing, according to a source familiar with the matter.

Neither Apple nor Foxconn responded to an email seeking comment on the matter.

Hundreds of Chinese engineers returned suddenly, briefly halting operations. Nevertheless,

Foxconn has managed to fill the void by enlisting the help of specialists from a variety of locations, including Taiwan.

DOT Is Waiting for PMO's Decision on Vodafone Idea Relief Options

Delhi: In what could be a lifeline for the faltering telecom provider, the Department of Telecommunications (DOT) has proposed multiple relief alternatives for Vodafone Idea. This comes at a time when the firm is encountering serious financial difficulties

due to the intense competition in the Indian telecom industry. It is clear that the government is cognizant of the dire condition facing one of India's leading telecom companies, Vodafone Idea, because the DOT has taken action to propose relief measures for

them. Although the details of the potential relief options have not been revealed, it is anticipated that they will try to alleviate the financial strain on the corporation. PMO will now decide whether or not to provide Vodafone Idea any kind of help.

Expect price cuts for SUVs and sedans as a result of 40% GST cut

Delhi : With the goods and services tax (GST) set to drop from its current level of up to 50% to a suggested 40%—the slab for luxury and sin items—price reductions are likely to affect not only tiny automobiles and two-wheelers, but also large sedans and SUVs. The possibility that the GST Council would impose a new tax on luxury cars is another source of concern. In addition to the 40% tax, several states wanted a cess at the ministerial panel conference on rate rationalization. Sedans and SUVs with



engine capacities above a specific level and length exceeding four meters are currently subject to a cess of 22% and a GST of 28%. Following hints that the Centre is keen on a flat 40% levy on a handful

of sin and luxury products without a cess, the GST Council, headed by Union finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman, will make a final rate decision next month.

Another setback causes Oyo to postpone IPO plans

Delhi: Due to pushback from SoftBank and the unpredictable stock market this year, Oyo Hotels has decided to postpone its October IPO. Sources close to the situation say that SoftBank has expressed concerns about the planned timeframe and has asked Oyo to delay an IPO until its earnings are more stable. With investor appetite for risk dwindling due to Trump's trade policies, Oyo encounters a bleak market in its third attempt to go public since 2021. While Oyo founder Ritesh Agarwal indeed owns more than 30% of the company.

Delhi : The news comes after Meta CEO Mark Zuckerberg's comments in July that the company would spend hundreds of billions of dollars to build several massive AI data centers. The company raised the bottom end of its annual capital expenditures forecast by \$2 billion, to a range of \$66 billion to \$72 billion last month. Meta is seeking outside partners to help it fund the massive infrastructure needed to power AI by offloading \$2 billion



in data center assets, the company disclosed in a filing earlier this month. In June, Reuters reported that OpenAI was planning to add Alphabet's Google Cloud service to meet its growing needs for computing capacity, a surprising collaboration

between two prominent competitors in the artificial intelligence sector. Amid this flurry of deals, Google parent's cloud-computing unit delivered an almost 32% jump in second-quarter revenue in July, which surpassed expectations.

The president signs off on an online gaming bill, and regulations will soon be drafted

Delhi : An announcement states that the comprehensive prohibition on internet gambling in India was signed into law by President Droupadi Murmu after the bill passed the parliament in a record-breaking three days. Both the Lok Sabha and the Senate had already approved the Promotion and Regulation of Online Gaming Bill, 2025 and the president gave his assent to the bill, as reported on the Rashtrapati Bhavan website and by a spokesperson for the Ministry of



Electronics and Information Technology (Meity). Dream11, MPL, and PokerBaazi are among the popular apps that are banned under the new rule, which takes a two-pronged approach by restricting real-money gaming and while supporting e-Sports and online social gaming.

Online money gaming services, including their offering, operation, facilitation, advertising, and financial transactions, are prohibited. According to Minister Ashwini Vaishnav's statement in Parliament, over the past few years, these kinds of games have cost around 450 million gamers ₹20,000 crore.

Sale of IDBI Bank nears as LIC obtains Sebi approval

Delhi : Sebi has approved Life Insurance Corporation's reclassification as a public shareholder from IDBI Bank's promoter after the sale. The RBI's approval is contingent on LIC's voting rights being capped at 10%, no board representation or

Two-third drop in Indian study permits: Canada data

Delhi : In the second quarter, Indian study visa holders for Canadian universities dropped by over two-thirds. The number of Indian study permits issued between April and June 2025 was 17,885, up from 55,660 in 2024, according to IRCC data. Over 66% drop. Compared to 45% in 2024, 32% of study permits were awarded to Indians. The first six months of 2025 saw a drop in Indian students from 99,950 to 47,695. Total study permits fell by about 100,000, from 245,055 in the first half of 2024 to 149,860. The significant fall in 2025 continues a pattern that began in 2024 when Canada cut study permits. These numbers, according to IRCC, are "preliminary estimates" and subject to change, but they reflect Canada's changing acceptance of foreign students, including Indians, amid growing anti-immigrant sentiment. After the intake



exploded post-Covid under then Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, Canada's international student program was heavily criticized, becoming an election issue before the 2025 Federal election. Policy adjustments were made due to record immigration, which contributed to housing unaffordability and health and transport infrastructure strain. After leading his party back to power after the April 28 Federal election, Prime Minister Mark Carney stated that temporary residents, including students and foreign workers, will not exceed 5% of the population by 2027.

Hindu University establishes public policy institute

Delhi: Hindu College at Delhi University has set itself apart from other Indian universities by creating a public policy lab. Officials have stated that the goal is to include real-world policymaking into both undergraduate and graduate programs. With the goal of democratizing and decentralizing the process of knowledge generation, the lab is designed to serve as a hub for policy simulations, applied research, and field-based insights. This will bring

Within days of starting, schools in Delhi's CM Shri garner 50,000 applications

Delhi: The recently opened CM Shri Schools in Delhi have received an enormous amount of interest from parents in the short time that admissions have been open. The number of applications has surpassed 50,000 in less than seven days, according to data from the Department of Education.

The numbers show a spike in middle school applications across the board, with over 20,000 for Class 8, over 15,000 for Class 7, and nearly 15,000 for Class 6. The schools, which were included in the budget for the year



2025-26 by the Delhi government, are planned according to the National Education Policy 2020 and the Prime Minister Shri program at the federal level. The plan's stated goal is to raise public school standards to those of highly regarded private schools. Biometric attendance systems, robotics labs,

artificial intelligence (AI) libraries, smart classrooms, and augmented reality (AR) and virtual reality (VR) tools have been installed in every CM Shri School. The government has prioritized environmentally friendly infrastructure alongside technological advancements to encourage.

Ajay Singh Maintains His Position as President of the Boxing Federation of India

Delhi : After his panel won easily, incumbent Ajay Singh was re-elected as president of the Boxing Federation of India (BFI) for a third consecutive term. With a score of 40-26, Singh prevailed over Jasal Pradhan of the Sikkim unit. Meanwhile, Pramod Kumar of the UP

unit was chosen secretary general, defeating Digvijay Singh of the MP unit by a score of 36-30. Hemanta Kalita of Assam, who had already served two four-year terms as office-bearers and was thus unable to run for reelection, was succeeded by Kumar. Kalita will now enter the

required cooling-off period. Later in the day, the other candidate, Neeraj Jain of Delhi, rescinded his nomination. In a three-way battle for the position of treasurer, Pon Baskaran of Tamil Nadu prevailed over Anil Kumar Bohidar of Odisha and R Gopu of Pondicherry.

Jamia Millia students will pay a year for failing internals

Delhi: Jamia Millia Islamia students must pass internal examinations to take the end-semester exams, or they may lose an academic year. From 2025-26, Jamia's Executive Council will apply the sciences' 40:60 evaluation model—40% internal assessment and 60% final exam—to all undergraduate and postgraduate courses across streams. Official notification states that the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme and postgraduate programmes have been updated to comply with the NEP, 2020. Students must now score at least 40% in internal assessment and final exams independently. Theory exams are now two hours instead of three, while lab courses will remain 50:50 with a 40% pass rule. These restrictions do not apply to statutory entities like the All India Council for Technical Education, Council of Architecture, Dental Council, National Council for Teacher Education, and Bar Council of India. According to the announcement, the new examination and assessment method will apply to all university UG (Four Year UG Programme under NEP-2020) and PG programmes save those administered under regulatory council rules. This signals a major change from the previous system, where many arts and social science courses relied on end-semester exams. As per the internal assessment structure, students in these streams will be assessed through assignments, examinations, projects, presentations, and class participation.

A New NCERT Unit Assigns Partition Blame to Congress, Jinnah, and Mountbatten

Delhi : In a special module published by the National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT), which implicates the Congress, Md Ali Jinnah, and Louis Mountbatten in the Partition, the Congress has voiced its strong disapproval in New Delhi. Separate editions have been created for Classes 9-12 and Classes 6-8 to commemorate the Partition Horrors.

HC overturns CIC ruling; DU need not divulge 1978 BA records

Delhi: The Delhi high court overturned a Central Information Commission (CIC) order to disclose Prime Minister Narendra Modi's bachelor's degree on Monday. After hearing Delhi University's petition against the CIC verdict, Justice Sachin Datta delivered the reserved judgment on February 27. Neeraj brought the case with an RTI request. PM Modi graduated in 1978, and the CIC opened the records of all 1978 BA test passers in December 2016. The Delhi high court stayed the CIC order on January 23, 2017. Delhi University Solicitor General Tushar Mehta urged to cancel the CIC order during the hearing. He suggested the university



may provide the court with the records. University is fine with showing the court the record. Mehta mentioned a 1978 Bachelor of Arts degree. DU countered the CIC ruling by arguing that student records are fiduciary and that "mere curiosity" without public

interest cannot justify RTI Act publication.

However, the RTI applicants' counsel justified the CIC judgment, stating that the Right to Information law authorizes disclosure of the prime minister's educational details for the public interest.

Companies in the electronics industry are the most welcoming to LGBTQIA+ apprentices.

Delhi : A whopping 71% of businesses in the electronics sector have shown a great desire to hire LGBTQIA+ apprentices, making it one of the most welcoming sectors for this demographic. Overall, 64 percent of Indian companies are welcoming of LGBTQIA+ apprentices, so this is just one more example of a larger trend. The January-March TeamLease Degree Apprenticeship Outlook Report emphasizes this change. The majority of electronics and telecom firms (71%) are eager to hire LGBTQIA+ apprentices.

Gurukul students apply to IITs for research grants

Delhi : The Setubandha Scholar Scheme, which was established in partnership with the Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS) division of the Union education ministry to allow scholars trained at Gurukul to do research at the prestigious Indian Institute of Technology, has garnered nearly three hundred and seventy applications from students at Central Sanskrit University (CSU), New Delhi, for fifty scholarships. Selected applicants can receive doctoral and postgraduate degrees through the program even if they do not have official academic credentials. They will be provided with a monthly stipend ranging from 40,000 to 75,000, a yearly contingency grant of 1-2 lakh, the opportunity to be mentored by faculty



members at both CSU and IIT, and access to state-of-the-art research facilities and workshops. The scholars will work under the guidance of two mentors at IIT laboratories, but they will receive their degrees from CSU. The program's website boasts that it "bridges traditional Indian knowledge systems with modern academic frameworks" and helps "integrate scholars trained in traditional Gurukul systems" into mainstream academia.

DU teachers raise issues of unoccupied reserved seats

Delhi: Teachers from Delhi University brought up issues with professor recruitment in front of a Parliamentary Committee, claiming that the SC/ST populations were marginalized on a systematic level. ED unearths NRI quota admission racket in private medical colleges

Delhi : A large-scale NRI admission racket was uncovered in an investigation by the Enforcement Directorate (ED), with the help of the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) and its embassies and foreign missions. The racket involved private medical colleges offering admissions on approximately 18,000 reserved MBBS undergraduate and postgraduate seats under the quota, but applicants had to use fake documents. It has been confirmed by India's diplomatic missions abroad that the NRI credentials that were confiscated by the Enforcement Directorate (ED) from many private medical colleges and utilized to provide admissions were fraudulent. Additionally, these



admissions were accompanied by counterfeit stamps issued by US-based notaries. Over the past few months, the ED has seized vital evidence through raids at multiple medical colleges in Odisha and West Bengal. The confiscated NRI certificates were thereafter transferred to Indian missions and embassies for verification by the agency.

It was discovered that the majority of them were counterfeit. These medical

schools were paying middlemen to get false NRI paperwork made, according to the investigation. In order to take advantage of the NRI quota for student admissions, the brokers also created false family trees of NRIs, posing as students' relatives when in fact they were completely unrelated. Agents and medical schools have admitted numerous unrelated individuals using the paperwork of a single non-resident Indian (NRI).

UGC Draft Incorporates Ancient Indian Mathematics into Undergraduate Program



Delhi : University Grants Commission (UGC) has recently drafted a new curriculum that includes ancient Indian knowledge systems in undergraduate mathematics courses. These systems include Bharatiya Bijaganit (Indian algebra), Kala Ganpana (traditional timekeeping), the Puranas, and concepts from texts like the Surya Siddhanta and Aryabhataiyam. In the proposed curriculum, which is part of the Learning Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) that is in line with the National Education Policy 2020, the UGC has suggested that students study the evolution of Indian algebra and methods such as the Paravartya Yojayet Sutra, a Vedic mathematics approach that means "transpose and apply." In this math, mythology, and astronomy course, students will learn about prime meridian points, ancient observatories, and how Vedic time units (such the Ghat and Vighatis) compare to modern-day GMT and IST. In addition, it explains how to find the auspicious times for festivals and ceremonies, or mahurtas, and how to calculate the panchanga, the Indian calendar.

'Physical, technical external interference': Azerbaijan Airlines

Azerbaijan Airlines on Friday revealed that initial investigation into the crash of its aircraft in Kazakhstan that killed 38 was likely due to "external interference of a physical and technical nature", fuelling discussions about potential involvement of Russian air defence systems. The airline has also halted operations to 10 airports in Russia, stating their decision was "based on the preliminary results of the investigation into the crash of the Embraer 190 aircraft operating the Baku-Grozny flight J2-8243 of Azerbaijan Airlines due to physical and technical external interference". This comes after, Russia, earlier in the day, put the blame on Ukraine, claiming that Ukrainian drones were attacking the city of Grozny as the Azerbaijani Airlines plane attempted to land, before its subsequent crash in Kazakhstan. "Ukrainian military



drones were carrying out terrorist attacks on civilian infrastructure... at the time," Chief of Russia's civil aviation authority Dmitry Yadrov said, adding that the plane made two unsuccessful attempts to land. "The pilot was offered alternative airports. He took the decision to go to Aktau airport" in Kazakhstan, he said. Also read: 'Ukrainian military was carrying out terrorist attacks when Azerbaijani flight tried to land,' claims Russia However, Ukraine has put the blame on Russia and said, "Russia must be held responsible for the downing of the Azerbaijan Airlines .

Balaji's mother opens up on his death: 'It doesn't look normal'

Balaji, who played a key role in organising data for OpenAI's models, resigned in August, calling its practices unfair. By November, The New York Times' lawyers named him as a key figure in their copyright case against OpenAI. However, on November 26, shortly after his 26th birthday, Balaji was found dead in his San apartment. Authorities ruled his death a suicide, yet his family remains unconvinced, pushing for a deeper investigation.

Elon criticises Bezos' ex-wife Scott for \$16 billion donation

Tech mogul Elon Musk described the philanthropic efforts of MacKenzie Scott, the ex-wife of Amazon founder Jeff Bezos, as "concerning." His comment came in response to a social media post scrutinising Scott's extensive donations, alleging that her initiatives primarily fund non-profits promoting divisive ideologies rather than addressing pressing global issues. The post highlighted Scott's "trust-based philanthropy," which involves providing no-strings-attached grants to over 2,500 non-profits. It alleged that her focus on causes such as racial



equity, immigrant rights, and LGBTQ justice feeds what the post described as an "NGO/non-profit complex," creating jobs for individuals seeking to validate their expensive degrees. The post further detailed Scott's \$16 billion in donations over

five years, noting her wealth remains substantial at \$36 billion, boosted by Amazon's rising stock price. Scott, the ex-wife of Amazon founder Jeff Bezos, has become one of the most prolific philanthropists in recent years.

'Settle issues' of 1971, Yunus urges Pakistan PM, but mum on apology

Bangladesh's chief adviser, Muhammad Yunus, urged Pakistani PM Shehbaz Sharif to resolve outstanding issues from 1971 to improve bilateral relations. While Sharif highlighted the 1974 tripartite agreement, Yunus emphasized the importance of a SAARC summit. Both leaders agreed to strengthen ties through trade, cultural exchanges, and cooperation in areas like sugar industry and dengue management.

ISLAMABAD: A Pakistani minister on Wednesday defended the military trial of civilians, saying that such courts were competent to deal with the cases related to attacks on army facilities. Information minister Attaullah Tarar also urged the opposition Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) led by Imran to refrain from politicising or disputing the issue of military trials. "When an attack is carried out on a defence institution or its property is set ablaze, it becomes the responsibility of the relevant authorities to



apprehend the culprits. Just as railway police handle crimes on railway premises, military courts address offences targeting assets. So, when attacks on military assets occur, the Military Act is enforced," he said while addressing a press conference. Tarar criticised Khan's party for using military courts as a political

tool, aiming to create controversy around them. He clarified that military courts only handle cases involving attacks on defence establishments, citing incidents such as the attack on the Corps Commander's House in Lahore. The minister also criticised the PTI for changing its stance regarding trials of civilians in the military courts, recalling that during Khan's tenure, military court trials were praised. "The statements praising the military courts from PTI's leadership are still available on social media.

Rice shipment from India, first for Yunus government, to arrive today

DHAKA: Bangladesh is set to receive its first consignment of rice imported from India since the formation of the new interim govt even as it looks to be drawing closer to Pakistan than to its immediate neighbour India, which stood beside Bangladesh in 1971 through shared sacrifices. Bangladesh



had witnessed ships coming from Karachi twice in recent days. On Nov 13, for the first time since independence, a container-carrying ship sailing directly from Karachi had docked at Chhattogram (Chittagong). This time the ship "MV Tanais Dream", carrying 24,690 metric tonnes of parboiled rice imported from India under the open tender agreement, will arrive at Chaudhagram port at 5.30am on Thursday. This is also the first consignment of parboiled rice imported from India

under the Nov 11 agreement. The unloading of the rice will start soon after samples of the rice are collected and after physical examination, said a senior Bangladesh food ministry official. Talking to diplomatic correspondents in Dhaka recently, Indian high commissioner to Bangladesh Pranay Verma had said he was optimistic about Dhaka-Delhi relationship despite changes happening around. "This we look at the relationship. We have so many things to offer each other with our

Pak military court sentence 60 more civilians, including Imran's nephew

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's military courts sentenced another 60 civilians on Thursday to prison terms ranging from two to 10 years for their alleged involvement in violent attacks on military installations during the nationwide protests on May 9, 2023 following the brief arrest of jailed former prime minister Imran Khan on graft charges. The latest sentences were announced just days after the same courts handed prison terms ranging from two to 10 years to 25 civilians on similar allegations. Imran's nephew Hassan Khan Niazi, who was taken into military custody in Aug 2023, was one of two people sentenced to 10 years' rigorous imprisonment. The convictions followed a Supreme Court constitution bench order that had

conditionally allowed military courts to pronounce verdicts on 85 under-custody civilians in cases related to the May 9 riots. "The Field General Court Martial has promulgated the punishments to the following remaining 60 culprits after examining all evidence, ensuring the provision of all legal rights to the convicts, completion of due process and the

appropriate legal proceedings," Inter-Services Public Relations, the army's media wing, said. "All convicts retain the right to appeal and other legal recourses, as guaranteed by the constitution and law.

Vietnam's restrictive internet law comes into force

A new internet law in Vietnam, Decree 147, gives the government increased control over internet access and content in the name of national security and social order. It mandates tech companies to store user data, verify accounts, and remove deemed illegal content within 24 hours. Critics argue this suppresses free speech and impacts livelihoods. A new internet law that gives the Vietnamese government expanded powers over internet services and people using them is set to officially take effect Wednesday. Decree 147 expands government control over access to information on the internet for reasons of "national security" and "social order." The law requires social media platforms providing services to users in Vietnam to store user data and provide it to authorities on demand. The government issued the decree this November, and it requires organizations to take down anything the authorities consider "illegal content" within 24 hours. Decree 147 has sparked concerns, with researchers and experts tracking the country saying that the law is part of a growing crackdown on civil society. "Because the Vietnamese police treat any criticism of the Communist Party of Vietnam as a national security matter, this decree will provide them with yet another tool to suppress dissent," said Patricia Gossman, associate Asia director at Human Rights Watch. The decree requires tech giants like Facebook and TikTok among other organizations,
