tors. Modi and the Ministry of External


Affairs do not follow this rule. This is their

Railways has provided 5.08 lakh jobs in the last 11 years

Good news for young people seeking jobs in the Railways. The Railway Ministry informed Parliament that the recruitment process is underway for a total of 120,579 positions in 2024 and 2025. Additionally, the Railways has created 5.08 lakh jobs in the last 11 years, a record in itself. The Railway Minister explained to Parliament what the government's roadmap is for railway recruitment. In a written reply to Parliament on Wednesday, the Railway Minister informed that the Indian Railways has a vast network. Regular operations, the intro-

duction of new technologies, mechanization, and retirements create a constant need for manpower, which is filled through periodic recruitment through recruitment agencies. The Indian Railways has initiated the recruitment process for a total of 120,579 vacancies in 2024 and 2025. He also presented a comparison of data from the last 11 years. From 2014-15 to 2024-25, the Railways employed 5.08 lakh people, compared to 4.11 lakh jobs created by the UPA government from 2004-05 to 2013-14. The Railway Minister stated that recruitment within the Railways is a continuous process, dependent on operational.

Current toll system to end in a year: Nitin Gadkari

New Delhi

Union Road Transport and Highways Minister Nitin Gadkari announced in the Lok Sabha on Thursday that the current toll collection system in the country will be abolished within a year. It will be replaced by a new elec-

tronic toll collection model, providing a completely seamless and improved travel experience for highway users. During Question Hour in the Lok Sabha, Gadkari stated that this new system has been piloted at 10 locations and will be expanded across the country with-

in the next year. He said, "This toll system will end. No one will stop you in the name of toll. Electronic toll collection will be implemented across the country within a year." The minister said that currently, more than 4,500 highway projects worth 10 lakh crore are underway

across the country. He also clarified that in the future, the need to stop at toll plazas will be completely eliminated. Gadkari explained that under the new system, only the entry of road users will be recorded. The number plate will be automatically identified through a photo.

India and Canada discuss roadmap for negotiating trade deal

Fitch raises India's GDP growth forecast to 7.4 percent

Global rating agency Fitch Ratings has raised its forecast for India's gross domestic product (GDP) growth rate for the current financial year 2025-26 from 6.9 percent to 7.4 percent. The agency cited increased consumer spending and an improved economic environment due to GST reforms as the main reasons behind this. In its Global Economic Outlook report for December, released on



Thursday, Fitch Ratings said that India's GDP growth rate for the financial year 2025-26 is projected to be 7.4 percent. Previously, the rating agency had projected economic growth at 6.9 percent. The agency said that increased consumer spending,

improved business environment, and the economic growth boosted by Goods and Services Tax (GST) reforms are the main reasons for this rapid growth. In its Global Economic Outlook report for December, Fitch said, "Growth will remain subdued for the remainder of the current fiscal year 2025-26 (to the end of March), but we have raised our full-year growth forecast to 7.4 percent from 6.9 percent in September."

3,258 Indians deported by US in 2025, says EAM

NEW DELHI

As many as 18,822 Indian nationals have been deported by the United States since 2009, including 3,258 since January 2025, the government informed the Rajya Sabha on Thursday.

Responding to supplementaries in the Rajya Sabha, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said state governments and the National Investigation Agency (NIA) have also investigated cases of human trafficking, in which Punjab has the maximum number of cases.

"Since 2009, a total of 18,822 Indian nationals have been deported to India," the minister informed the Rajya Sabha in a written reply to a question.

He said 617 Indians had been deported in 2023, and as many as 1,368 were deported in 2024.

"Since January 2025, a total of 3,258 Indian nationals have been deported by the United States to India. Of these, 2,032 individuals (approximately 62.3 per cent) were deported on regular commercial flights, while the remaining 1,226 (37.6 per cent) arrived on US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) or US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) operated charter flights.

Jaishankar said the Ministry of External Affairs

'AI reported 3 tech glitches on Boeing 787 since July'

New Delhi: Air India has reported three technical glitches, since July this year, related to Boeing 787 aircraft in its fleet, Parliament was informed on Thursday. In a written reply to a question in the Lok Sabha, Minister of State for Civil Aviation, Murlidhar Mohol, said that after the accident of the Boeing 787 aircraft on June 12, 2025 in Ahmedabad, the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) issued directions to Air India to carry out enhanced safety inspections on its fleet of Boeing-787 aircraft. All Boeing aircraft were checked and found satisfactory by the airline.

■ According to data presented by Nitin Gadkari in Lok Sabha on Thursday, 1.77 lakh people died in road accidents in 2024, an increase of 2.31 per cent from 2023, when 1.73 lakh fatalities were recorded in 4.80 lakh road accidents.

■ Nearly 20% cashless treatment requests raised by road accident victims under Cashless Treatment of Road Accident Victims Scheme since March 2024 has been rejected by the police, Gadkari informed Parliament on Thursday.

TURBULENCE DECODED

■ As per DGCA data, IndiGo cancelled 1,232 flights in November, with 755 linked to crew shortages and new Flight Duty Time Limitation (FDTL) rules.



■ The revised FDTL norms, implemented in July and tightened further from November 1 by capping night landings have increased staffing needs and added to operational challenges.

■ The airline's punctuality also dropped sharply to 67.7 per cent in November from 84.1 per cent in October.

DELAY PERCENTAGE

IndiGo's on-time performance (OTP), meanwhile, plunged to 19.7%. This means that four out of five IndiGo flights were delayed. By comparison, 65% of IndiGo's 2,200 flights were delayed on Tuesday and around 50% of its flights were delayed on Monday. In contrast, the airline's punctuality was at 84.1% in October and 67.7% in November.

SKYROCKETING PRICES

Fares on certain routes across India have witnessed a massive jump as IndiGo continues to struggle. A seat from Delhi to Kolkata cost as much as Rs 59,500. A non-stop SpiceJet flight from Kolkata to Delhi cost Rs 36,500. A non-stop late evening SpiceJet flight going from Bengaluru to Mumbai cost Rs 31,100. An Air India flight on the same route cost Rs 32,000. These are increases of between four and ten times compared to the usual price.

Kids dying, old people finding it difficult: Sonia on Delhi air

NEW DELHI

Congress leader Sonia Gandhi on Thursday led a protest against the government's lack of adequate action to curb air pollution in Delhi and surrounding states saying "children are dying" and even the elderly like her were finding it difficult.

The protest, held outside the main Parliament building witnessed the participation of a large number of INDIA bloc party MPs including Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge and general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra as also Kanimozhi and TR Baulu

from the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam.

Sonia Gandhi, along with Kharge and Priyanka and several other MPs wore anti-pollution masks, to convey the gravity of the situation. As the protest was taking place, the overall Air Quality Index in the area was in the "poor" category.

Gandhi, who has a history of pulmonary disorders, urged the government to take immediate actions to contain the problem which affects crores of people living in or travelling to the region. "It is the government's responsibility to do something, as children are dying.

Old people like me are also finding it difficult," she said.

After intel report, Assam govt bans jihadi literature

GUWAHATI

The Assam government has issued a wide-ranging order banning the publication, circulation, possession and digital sharing of extremist and jihadi literature linked to outlawed groups such as Jamaat-ul-Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB), Ansarullah Bangla Team (ABT), Ansar-Al-Islam/pro-AQIS and other similar organisations. The move follows recommendations from the Assistant Inspector General of Police (Law & Order) and supporting observations from the Judicial Department.

Intelligence reports and investigations by the Assam Police and its Special Task Force (STF) found that radical material continued to spread through print publications as well as digital platforms. Officials said this content glorified violent jihad, promoted radicalisation and offered guidance for ideological indoctrination and recruitment.

With immediate effect, the state has prohibited any form of engagement with these materials, including publishing, printing, selling, exhibiting, possessing or storing them, whether in physical or digital form.

People shifted after gas leak in Dhanbad

Dhanbad: Jharkhand's Dhanbad district administration on Thursday ordered a probe into the incident of a "poisonous gas leak" from underground mines, which also prompted the Bharat Coking Coal Limited (BCL) to shift around 1000 residents to safer locations, officials said. A woman allegedly died, while 12 people fell sick after "carbon monoxide" leaked from such mines in different places of Kenduadih Basti on Wednesday, they said.

The exact cause of the woman's death, however, is yet to be ascertained, and would only be confirmed after the postmortem. —PTI

Panic at Ajmer Dargah due to bomb 'threat'

JAIPUR

The Ajmer Dargah and Kudankulam Nuclear Power Plant collectorate received a bomb threat on Thursday afternoon, raising security concerns ahead of the 814th Urs of Khwaja Moinuddin Chishti. An email sent to the Collector's official ID claimed, "Four RDX IEDs have been planted at the Ajmer Collector's office and the Garib Nawaz Dargah. They will explode as soon as Putin arrives".

Superintendent of Police Vandita Rana said all concerned departments were

alerted immediately. The Collectorate and Dargah premises were evacuated, and extensive searches were conducted using metal detectors and dog squads. Entry to the Dargah was closed around 1:00 pm and reopened after about two and a half hours when nothing suspicious was found.

Additional Superintendent of Police Deepak Sharma said every corner of both locations was thoroughly checked.

Authorities have termed the threat serious due to the upcoming Urs, when thousands of pilgrims from India, Pakistan, and abroad are expected.

Mizoram ex-Guv Swaraj Kaushal passes away

New Delhi: Former Mizoram governor and senior advocate Swaraj Kaushal, the husband of late BJP veteran Sushma Swaraj, passed away on Thursday afternoon. He was 73.

He was taken to AIIMS by his daughter, BJP MP Bansuri Swaraj, and other family members, following a chest pain complaint. However, doctors at the hospital declared him dead, the Delhi BJP said in a statement.

"His daughter Bansuri Swaraj lit the pyre before sunset and completed the last rites, following Sanatan traditions," the statement said.

TMC suspends MLA for 'Babri-style' mosque plan

BAHARAMPUR

The TMC on Thursday suspended Bharatpur MLA Humayun Kabir for what it termed "communal politics" amidst a flashpoint over his plan to lay the foundation of a Babri Masjid-style mosque in West Bengal's Murshidabad on December 6, the Babri demolition anniversary.

A defiant Kabir retaliated almost instantly, announcing he would resign as MLA, launch his own party later this month, and press ahead with the programme even if it meant getting "arrested or killed."

Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee launched a sharp attack on Kabir without naming him, calling him a "Mirzafar-gaddar (traitor)", who has taken money from

the BJP to stoke communal tensions.

Senior minister Firhad Hakim declared the suspension in Kolkata saying the decision had been approved by the CM.

TMC STAND

"Kabir was involved in communal politics, which the TMC is strictly against. He will have no relation with the party from this moment."

Hakim said, stressing that the ruling party "does not believe in communal provocation" at a time it is working to maintain peace before next year's Assembly polls.

Hakim, himself a mutawalli (trustee) of a Kolkata mosque, underlined the party's discomfort with Kabir's rhetoric. "Anyone can build a mosque. But there must be no communal provocation."



Chill shield for Ayodhya and Mathura idols

AYODHYA

As the North Indian winter tightens its grip, temples in Ayodhya and Mathura have shifted into full seasonal mode. Woollen clothing, hot water baths and heating arrangements have become part of the daily routine for Ram Lalla and Krishna to guard them from the cold.

In Ayodhya, Ram Lalla is revered in the form of a young child. The temple staff is taking no chances with dipping tem-

peratures. Warm water is now used for his morning bath and soft velvet and woollen clothes have become his regular winter attire. Priests monitor the sanctum closely, switching on blowers when the cold intensifies.

Santosh Tiwari, who has served Ram Lalla for 34 years, said the care offered to the deity mirrors that of a real child. "We make sure he stays warm at all times. His bhog also changes with the season. Jaggery, sesame and desi ghee halwa help keep the body



warm in winter," he explained. With the cold wave setting in, Ram Lalla's schedule has been adjusted.

He now wakes up half an hour later than in summer. After his bath and adornment, devotees can have darshan from 7 am. Darshan continues

until 11:30 am before noon bhog. By night, he is wrapped in a silk quilt after the final aarti.

Winter protocols are also visible across Ayodhya's major temples including Kanak Bhawan, Ram Vallabh Kunj and Dashrath Mahal where priests have introduced quilts, shawls and heaters to protect the deities.

In Mathura, Krishna temples have taken similar steps. At Radha Vallabh Lal Mandir, the child form of Krishna has been given

woolen gloves for his hands and warm socks for his feet. An angeethi has been placed in the sanctum to ensure constant warmth. His meals now include saffron and dry-fruits to generate internal heat.

Flower garlands have been temporarily replaced with cloth garlands to avoid the chill of fresh blooms, priest Mohit Maral Goswami said.

At the famous Banke Bihari Temple, priests have also altered the daily menu to suit the season. Offerings like jaggery sweets, sesame prepara-

tions and warm rice dishes are served. The darshan schedule has been shifted later in the morning, and the idol is covered with a velvet quilt every night. A heater will be added if the cold becomes harsher, temple staff confirmed.

The updated winter care routines reflect a simple belief across these temple towns: when gods are worshipped in their child forms, no effort can be spared to ensure they stay healthy and warm through the winter.

Married woman dies under suspicious circumstances, parents suspect murder

Family of former block chief flees, leaving daughter-in-law's body behind; married a month ago

Prayagraj. The daughter-in-law of a former Apna Dal block chief died under suspicious circumstances on Thursday morning. Her husband is the district vice president of Apna Dal in Fatehpur. The couple had married a month earlier. When her parents arrived, they found the woman's body abandoned in an ambulance. It is alleged that her in-laws had fled, abandoning the body. The ambulance driver stated that the girl's in-laws had sent the

body. The deceased's father said that the in-laws had been misleading them since morning and were not providing accurate information. Four hours later, they called and said the body was in front of the Swarup Rani police station. The police have conducted a post-mortem to determine the cause of death. Married on November 2, Dharmendra Singh, a farmer from Sandwa Vidav village in Kaushambi, is a resident of the village. He married his daughter, Rashmi Singh (23), with great pomp and



Fundamental hypocrisy in global climate politics

In , the UN Climate Action Summit in New York, leaders from industrialised nations delivered impassioned speeches about the urgency of addressing climate change. Yet, behind closed doors, they continued to approve new fossil fuel projects and delay meaningful climate finance commitments. This dichotomy highlights a fundamental hypocrisy in global climate politics: The West often preaches sustainability but falls short in practice, prioritising economic interests over environmental imperatives. As the countdown to the COP29 climate summit in Azerbaijan this continues, the Bonn Climate Change Conference in Germany concluded in a stalemate last week. Nations disagreed on the size and scope of loss and damage financing, representing a significant setback in global climate negotiations. The Bonn talks did not achieve meaningful progress on climate financing, underscoring a persistent issue: industrialised nations, which bear the greatest responsibility for the current climate crisis, resisted calls from Global South countries to compensate those who suffer the most but have contributed the least to greenhouse gas emissions. Over a decade ago, developed nations pledged to mobilise \$100 billion annually by 2020 to support climate action in developing countries. This commitment, formalised under the Copenhagen Accord in 2009 and reiterated in the Paris Agreement, has not been met. The Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) reported that climate finance reached only \$79.6 billion in 2019. It was only in 2022 that developed countries provided and mobilised \$115.9 billion in climate finance for developing countries. By the end of COP29, all parties must agree on a “new collective quantified goal” (NCQG) to guide the provision of climate finance, intended to replace the \$100 billion target after 2025. Progress on negotiating the NCQG has been slow. Disagreements persist on almost every aspect of the new target, including the amount of money to be provided, the sources of these funds, the recipients, and the specific forms of financial assistance. Current climate finance is grossly inadequate for the scale of action required. The \$100 billion target for climate finance is laughably insufficient. The United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) Adaptation Gap Report 2021 estimates that the costs of adapting to climate change in developing countries could reach \$140-300 billion per year by 2030, escalating to \$280-500 billion per year by 2050. Furthermore, the Climate Policy Initiative (CPI) Global Landscape of Climate Finance 2021 report highlights that global climate finance flows reached a record \$632 billion in 2019/2020. Despite this record, the funding falls significantly short of the \$4.13 trillion annual investment required by 2030 to meet the Paris Agreement targets, as estimated by the International Energy Agency (IEA) in its Net Zero by 2050 report. Now even these estimates are seen as low. As highlighted by the Independent High-Level Expert Group on Climate Finance in their 2022 report, emerging markets and developing countries (excluding China) are staring at a financial chasm. These nations must mobilise approximately \$1 trillion annually by 2025, amounting to 4.1 per cent of their GDP—double the 2.2 per cent spent in 2019. Fast forward to 2030, and the figure balloons to a staggering \$2.4 trillion per year, or 6.5 per cent of GDP. This glaring disparity underscores the urgent need to recalibrate climate finance targets. if we are to meet the colossal demands of climate adaptation .

Threat from ballistic hypersonic missiles

Space is emerging as the forerunner in the era of technology-driven warfare. A country like India, with significant geopolitical heft and the potential to emerge as a power of relevance, would sooner or later face a threat from space—a threat that cannot be defended by conventional means. It is therefore important to analyse if India needs to build a space force that is capable of fighting, not so distant, space wars. The Gulf War I is technically considered to be the first space war where the US relied on space satellite intelligence for aerial and ground operations inside Kuwait and Iraq. The satellite navigation systems played a significant role in the navigation of the US Air Force fighter jets. Currently, space prowess is clearly ruling the Russian-Ukraine and Hamas battlespaces. Taiwan is incrementally coming under the space lens of competing powers. The space satellites started playing their crucial role even before the start of the war. India raised the Defence Space Agency in 2019 as a scaled-down version of the space command. The Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) also raised DSP to provide technical and Research and Development (R&D) support. In the last



five years, outer space has emerged as a source of concern, primarily the threat from long-range ballistic and hypersonic missiles. Many Direct Ascent Anti-Satellites (ASAT) experimental missile strikes have been tested, including by India (mission Shakti). Counter-missions are being developed for both offensive and defensive forms of space warfare. Even though the Outer Space Treaty debars nations from weaponising space, the writing on the wall makes it clear that a threat from space is lurking. All the major powers, such as the US, Russia, China, India, France, the European Union, and Japan, are building space military organisations. The US Space Force organises, trains, and equips personnel in order to protect US and allied interests in space and to provide space capabilities to the joint forces. The US Space Force, headquartered

at the Pentagon, employs 8,600 military personnel and 77 spacecraft. The Russian space forces are mandated to inform the higher political leaders and military commanders of missile attacks as soon as possible, ballistic missile defence, and the creation, deployment, maintenance, and control of in-orbit space vehicles, like the Persona reconnaissance satellite. These forces operate the GLONASS global positioning system. The Russian Space Forces include the third Missile Space Defence Army and a Division for Warning of Missile Attacks. The Chinese People's Liberation Army Strategic Support Force (PLA-SSF) existed from 2015 to 2024 with the army's ability to fight “informatised conflicts”. In April of this year, the Strategic Support Force was dissolved and split into three independent arms: the PLA Aerospace Force,

the PLA Cyberspace Force, and the PLA Information Support Force. Like China, Russia views space as a warfighting domain, and they base their warfighting doctrine around the idea that achieving space supremacy is a precondition for winning a conflict. Russia has fielded a suite of non-kinetic options to create reversible effects on satellite systems in space, including ground-based systems to counter GPS navigation signals, tactical communications, satellite communications, and radars. On the non-kinetic side of this threat continuum, China has operational ground-based jamming systems that are capable of disrupting satellite communications, GPS navigation signals, synthetic aperture radars, missile warning systems, and other satellite systems. Jamming can prevent users from using satellite communication networks, degrade or prevent transmissions of vital missile warning data from space-based sensors to war fighters, and disrupt uplinks and downlinks needed to command and control spacecraft. While analysing the space wars, it is important to study the space-based wars of the past, when the intensity was nominal but gains were asymmetrical. During the two Gulf Wars, the Coalition

bombers and fighters dropped more than 5,000 GPS-guided Joint Direct Attack Munitions during the day and night, in all weather, with shattering effectiveness. Satellites also made it possible to direct Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) attacks such as Predator and Global Hawk. US imaging satellites gave commanders an unprecedented view of targets and battlespace. At least seven different types of military satellite systems were used during the Gulf War I. GPS receivers were affixed to tanks, trucks, and aircraft across the theatre. Tank commanders wanted to know the moisture content of the soil in some areas. Tomahawk precision attacks have multiple space based use cases, such as intelligence preparation, target location, command, and control, weather assessment, launch, route navigation, and damage assessment. Space and cyber domains are the major components of ‘stand-off’ wars, which is the new way of war fighting. Elements contributing to stand-off conflicts are also moving into the hands of private space operators. While ‘space force’ would have a mandate to provide space support to conventional forces, it would largely engage.

Women in Indian Politics: A story that has changed little over the years

India's progress vis-à-vis women's representation in leadership positions has remained rather slow and rarely linear, often pushing them to the margins of politics. Image: UN Women/Ruhani Kaur. India recently concluded its 2024 general elections, which took place in seven phases—from April 19 to June 1—to elect all 543 members of the Lok Sabha (lower house). While the results have taken many by surprise, what has been even more astonishing is the fact that for a country that has rigorously been trying to establish a more progressive front on women's rights and gender equality over the past few years, the

new Indian parliament has failed to showcase a notable uptick in the representation of women after the latest elections. Making just 13.63 per cent of the elected strength, the 18th Lok Sabha will comprise only 74 women compared to 469 men. This share is not only abysmally skewed but also lower than the 14.4 per cent share of female representation during the 2019 election, where 78 women were elected as MPs. The irony here is that just last year, India—during its G20 presidency—brought about a paradigm shift in gender-based policymaking by challenging the status quo and with the innovative idea of women-led development in order to ensure women's

inclusion and representation at all levels of decision-making. Even at the domestic level, India—after many deliberations—finally passed the historic Women's Reservation Bill in , which seeks to reserve one-third of the seats in the Lok Sabha and state legislative assemblies for women. While it is true that the bill has not yet come into effect, the journey from 13.63 per cent to 33 per cent (for the next elections) still seems rather long, especially given that, despite being the central agents of the 2024 elections and forming an important core of party manifestos as well as campaign speeches, only a handful of them were able to achieve the final victory.

The region of Apulia, throughout its history, has been inhabited by Greeks, Romans, Byzantines, Normans, and Spanish. The region has also served as a bridge between the West and the East, thanks to its geography. Apulia's rich history as a cultural crossroads underscores the significance of this year's G7 summit, which brings together diverse global leaders. In this summit, along with the G7 countries, the other invitees were India, the African Union, Brazil, the UAE, Argentina, and others, making the location and the purpose of the summit significant. India took centre stage during the summit, and the family photograph taken post-summit is a testament to it.

Two years ago, India was invited to the 48th G7 summit in 2022, after the Russian invasion of Ukraine. The primary narrative at that time was to punish India for keeping the ties intact with Moscow.

The Western ‘experts’, who are habituated to see things in binary, refused to believe that India can have ties with the G7 without harming relations with Russia.

As per the Financial Times, the reason behind the invitation to India at the summit was “to woo New Delhi away from its longstanding alliance with Russia”. Two years down the line, India's relations are not majorly harmed, neither with Russia nor with the G7 countries! Freshly re-elected, PM Modi's attendance at the G7 summit signals a robust continuation of his administration's foreign policy initiatives, particularly his advocacy for the Global South. In , New Delhi organised the two Voice of Global South Summits, first in January and next in November, to understand the concerns of the developing countries. The words and advocacy of Modi in Apulia should be taken as a continuation of this. Modi exploited the opportunities provided to put forward these concerns. “India has considered it its responsibility to place the priorities and concerns of the countries of the Global South on the world stage,” he said. At the same time, while putting forward his vision of a

developed India in 2047, he emphasised that “no section of society should be left behind in the country's development journey,” followed by applying this “in the context of international relations. The countries of the Global South are bearing the brunt of global uncertainties and tensions”. Then, Modi put forward the concern of ending monopolies in technology, one of the points of action at the end of the second Voice of the Global South Summit. On the sidelines of the G7 meeting, PM Modi also met Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky. However, Modi skipped the Ukraine Peace Summit, organised just after the G7 meeting, by sending a secretary-level delegation. The Indian delegation visited the summit but didn't sign the Joint Communiqué. This reflects a nuanced stance on the conflict, aligning with the broader Global South's cautious approach. India's significant presence at the G7 summit.

coupled with PM Modi's diplomacy, marks a pivotal moment in its global engagement. By advocating for the Global South in the G7, India continued efforts to emerge as a leader of developing nations in a China-fearing world.

Promise made for assistance in the space sector

Russian President Vladimir Putin's visit to North Korea (18-19 June) has attracted global attention. Today, both of these states are keen to cooperate to overcome the sanctions put on them by the US. This is Putin's only second-ever visit to Pyongyang, with the first taking place way back in 2000. Obviously, a lot has changed during the last two decades or so. North Korea's other good friend, China, has welcomed this visit. Russia has always been important to North Korea. However, during the last few years, not much has happened towards any notewor-

thy engagement. During the 2018-19 period, the North Korean leader Kim Jong Un was found engaging China proactively, and between the period of March 2018 and January 2019, he visited China four times. Also, around the same period, he met US President Donald Trump. Actually, Trump became the first sitting US president to visit North Korea in 2019. Unfortunately, no efforts to engage North Korea have proved successful so far, and the only major countries that have cordial relations with North Korea remain its neighbours, namely Russia

and China. The recent increased bonhomie between Russia and North Korea could be said to have started with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un visiting Russia in September . Today, both of these states need each other much more than in the past. Moscow has some dependence on Pyongyang for supplies of arms and ammunition for fighting the war in Ukraine. While North Korea has a dependence on food and energy assistance. , interestingly, it is also depending on Russia for assistance in its space surveillance programme.

When Kim Jong Un visited Russia in September , he was assured by Putin of his assistance in the space domain. During the year , North Korea made three attempts to launch a spy satellite in space. The attempts during May and August had failed, while the attempt during was a success, with North Korea putting its first spy satellite, the Malligyong-1, on the back of its own

Chollima-1 launch vehicle in space. Since during Kim Jong Un's September visit to Russia, there was a promise made for assistance.

The delegation included the block president, general secretary, and a district executive member.

High Alert in Kanpur Zone for Dec. 6

VERIFICATION | Government intensifies action against illegal foreign nationals

Verification drive targets illegal entrants across urban zones

LUCKNOW

The UP government has initiated an extensive verification and action drive targeting illegal foreign nationals identified as Rohingya and Bangladeshi entrants living within urban local bodies. Following directives issued by the CM, municipal bodies have been asked to prepare immediate lists of suspected foreign nationals engaged in local work. These lists are being forwarded to divisional commissioners and police officials for further scrutiny.

Administrative teams across districts have begun identifying vacant government buildings, community centres, police lines, and other secure locations where such individuals can be temporarily housed. Under the standard operating procedure sent by the Union Home Ministry, foreign nationals kept in detention centres will undergo verification

tion before repatriation through FRRO channels. Those confirmed as Bangladeshi or Rohingya nationals will be sent back through border routes in West Bengal and Assam with the support of the BSF.

Parallel to this statewide process, a field inspection led by the mayor in Lucknow drew attention to clusters of make-

shift settlements linked to suspected illegal entrants. At a site in Gudamba police station limits, officials found nearly 80 hutments erected on a plot owned by a local representative. Several connections, including electricity supply, refrigerators, coolers, and household setups, were reported. Most male occupants

Mayor takes action

The mayor conducted an on-site inspection in Lucknow, identifying 80 hutments with unauthorised utilities and incomplete documentation. Accompanied by municipal and power department teams, she ordered disconnection of illegal connections, seized handcarts, and issued a 15-day notice for removal, citing state directives on verifying suspected illegal occupants.



fled before inspection; women present did not produce documents. Local residents claimed that the settlement had caused sanitation issues, accumulation of waste, and security concerns. Municipal teams seized around 50 handcarts and assorted garbage from the location. Electricity department officials were asked to disconnect unauthorised power supply lines. The mayor issued a notice allowing 15 days for the removal of the hutments, stating that failure to comply would lead to further action.

Contradictory claims also surfaced as the landowner

asserted that the residents were citizens from Assam who collected household waste for a living and were not illegal entrants. Some residents alleged that personal belongings were taken during the operation, and they displayed identity documents while denying any foreign links.

The municipal corporation reiterated that garbage collection within city limits is solely the responsibility of the corporation and that private collection using handcarts is not permitted. Officials indicated that action would continue under state guidelines.

Maneka Soni Elected Redmond Councillor



LUCKNOW

Maneka Soni, originally from Lucknow, has become the first Indian-American woman elected to the Redmond City Council in Washington state. She took her oath holding a copy of the Bhagavad Gita while wearing traditional Indian embroidered attire. The oath was administered by Judge Russell, and the event was attended by local officials, community members, and Indian-origin residents.

Redmond, known globally as the home of Microsoft's headquarters and a major technology hub, witnessed a significant moment as Soni defeated an opponent who had held office for eight years. After assuming office, she was also felicitated by the Consul General of India in Seattle, Prakash Gupta.

Lucknow born leader takes oath while holding Gita

Born in Agra and raised in Lucknow, Soni completed her graduation from Lucknow University and spent nearly 20 years in the city before moving ahead in her career. She has over three decades of experience in global corporate roles, including positions at Microsoft, Starbucks, General Motors, and T-Mobile.

Soni has been involved in several social initiatives linked to women's empowerment, domestic violence awareness, youth development, and community welfare. She is the founder and president of AmPowering, a non-profit organization that has supported over 500,000 people.

SIR being used to silence citizens: Akhilesh Yadav

LUCKNOW

In Lucknow, Samajwadi Party President and former Chief Minister Akhilesh Yadav levelled serious allegations against the BJP government over the ongoing Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls. He claimed that the ruling government is using the SIR process to hide its failures by enabling large-scale voter deletions. Yadav appealed to the public to ensure their voter registrations are updated, warning that losing the right to vote could jeopardise reservation and other constitutional protections.

He accused the Election Commission of acting under government pressure, stating that in Bihar, thousands

reportedly lost voting rights during the SIR process. He questioned the urgency in Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal despite no elections scheduled this year.

Yadav further alleged that instead of providing employment, the government is trapping individuals in false cases. Citing the examples of

Mohammad Azam Khan, Gayatri Prajapati, and Ramakant Yadav, he said the opposition and PDA families are being targeted unfairly. He also claimed increasing custodial deaths, fraudulent encounters, and rising crimes against women under the current administration.

Raising privacy concerns, Yadav criticised the "Sanchar Saathi" app, alleging it enables government surveillance and violates citizens' privacy. He said freedom of expression has already weakened and now private conversations are at risk. SP State President Shyam Lal Pal submitted a memorandum to the Chief Electoral Officer, alleging that experienced Yadav and Muslim computer operators involved in SIR duties are being dismissed on caste grounds.

Rapid rise in wildlife across protected areas across UP



Over ₹161 crore spent on eco tourism facilities across key forest regions since 2022

Uttar Pradesh is witnessing a rapid rise in eco-tourism popularity, driven by improved wildlife habitats, conservation efforts, and expanded visitor facilities across major forest regions. According to official updates, the state has recorded a significant increase in populations of key species such as leopards, rhinos, tigers, and gharials. Leopard numbers, which stood at 92 in 2022, have increased to 275 in 2025, reflecting successful habitat protection across Dudhwa, Katarniaghat, Pilibhit, Sohagibarwa, and Amargarh forest zones.

The Eco-Tourism Development Board has spent over ₹161 crore in the last three years on infrastructure aimed at nature-based tourism. These

Wildlife census findings indicate increased animal presence across protected areas. Dudhwa Tiger Reserve now records over 13,000 wild animals, while Katarniaghat hosts over 17,000, and buffer zones report more than 15,000. Rhino numbers have grown from 49 to 66 between 2022 and 2025. Officials attribute the growth to improved monitoring, water availability, and habitat management.

The state has also expanded training for nature guides and encouraged local communities, including the Tharu tribe, to participate in homestay and cultural tourism initiatives. Efforts are underway to promote low-impact tourism, maintain plastic-free forest zones, and integrate wetland and wildlife corridors into long-term eco-tourism planning.

Lucknow Court jails woman for false SC/ST case

LUCKNOW

A special SC/ST court in Lucknow has sentenced a woman, Shakuntala Devi, to three years of imprisonment for filing a false case under the SC/ST Act in connection with a land dispute. The case was registered at Wazirganj Police Station, where she had accused Ahmed and several others of illegal possession of her property.

According to the judgment delivered by Special Judge (SC/ST Act) Vivekanand Sharan Tripathi, the allegations made by the woman were found to be fabricated and entirely baseless. The court noted that misusing an important social-protection law for personal vendetta not only causes unnecessary harassment to innocent individuals but also undermines the

credibility of the legislation.


The investigation was conducted by ACP Chowk Rajkumar Singh, who confirmed during the inquiry that the woman's claims were false. His report stated that there was no illegal possession and that the narrative presented by the complainant was fictional.

Overworked and overlooked: BLOs buckle under SIR pressure

JHANSI

The ongoing Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of the voter list in Uttar Pradesh has highlighted serious operational stress on Booth Level Officers (BLOs). The discovery of actor Amitabh Bachchan's name—with his father's name listed as Harivansh Rai Bachchan—in Jhansi's voter roll exposed data inconsistencies that many BLOs say stem from unrealistic workload and limited verification time. Residents confirmed that the actor has never lived in the locality, raising questions about how such entries went unnoticed earlier.

In Meerut, the pressure took a dangerous turn when BLO Mohit Chaudhary consumed poison after allegedly facing repeated threats of suspension from his supervisor. His family

said he had been working nearly 17 hours a day for the past two weeks. His wife reported that she, too, had been helping him finish field duties, describing the last 15 days as

completely "life-altering". Meanwhile, in Badaun, another BLO was seen travelling through villages making public announcements urging residents to complete SIR formalities, fearing that failure to do so might result in names being cut from the voter list. Officials have reportedly demanded 100% completion within strict deadlines, increasing the burden on BLOs who manage hundreds of voters per booth. While some officers manage the pressure with support from colleagues, many admit that round-the-clock field visits, verification checks, and documentation requirements have made the process overwhelming. The ongoing revision exercise has intensified the debate on whether BLOs are being over-pushed without adequate manpower or mental-health safeguards.

SC halts demolition of SP leader's marriage hall

BAREILLY

The Supreme Court has temporarily halted the demolition of Samajwadi Party (SP) leader Sarfaraz Wali's marriage hall in Bareilly, where the Bareilly Development Authority (BDA) had already razed nearly 40% of the structure. The Court granted a one-week window for the SP leader to present his case before the High Court and ordered that no further action be taken until then. Following the stay order, the demolition team and deployed police force withdrew from the site.

The halted action came a day after another SP leader, Mohammad Rashid, saw his Good Marriage Hall completely demolished during a two-day operation. The repeated bulldozer drives have triggered accusations that opposition-linked properties

are being selectively targeted under the guise of action on alleged illegal construction.

Families living on the upper floors of the buildings reported distress, with several women breaking down as the demolitions began, claiming they were being displaced without proper hearing or arrangements.

Lost parental data cause delays for couple's verification in SIR

VARANASI

The SIR verification process underway in Varanasi has created significant challenges for couples who married through love marriages, especially those whose parental voter details are unavailable or outdated. Several families report that essential information from the 2003 voter lists—such as part number, serial number, and constituency details—cannot be traced, leading to forms being returned by Booth Level Officers (BLOs).

Many BLOs have been relying on old voter lists, cross-dis-

trict electoral records, and partial data to complete verifications. However, gaps in archived lists and mismatched information continue to delay the process. In some villages, husbands and wives appear in different village hamlet lists, complicating retrieval of accurate voter information.

UP tops in rural job generation under MGNREGA

LUCKNOW

Uttar Pradesh has reported the highest person-day generation under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) in the country for the financial year 2025-26, according to data from the state's Rural Development Department. Against an annual physical target of 2,000 lakh person-days, the state has already created 1,768.81 lakh person-days, placing it at the national top. The state has also spent ₹6,598.89 crore under

the scheme so far in this financial year, providing employment to 47.76 lakh families.

Officials said the performance reflects an expanded work footprint across districts, with a significant portion of MGNREGA activities linked to rural infrastructure, water conservation, and land development. The department has been instructed to strengthen MGNREGA convergence, particularly with line departments involved in agriculture, water resources, panchayati raj, and rural engineering. Field-level coordination has been described as essential for



improving progress under convergence-based works.

Authorities have also been directed to ensure that eligible labourers who have completed 90 days of work under

Over 47.7 Lakh rural families received employment under ongoing MGNREGA works

MGNREGA are registered with the Building and Other Construction Workers (BOCW) Board so they can access welfare schemes administered by the Labour Department. This includes benefits such as insurance, skill development, and social security support.

In a review meeting with

district officials, the Rural Development Commissioner G.S. Priyadarshi emphasised the need to maintain consistent person-day creation. He stated that preventing migration remains a central objective of the scheme, which can be achieved only when sustained employment is available within villages. District administrations were warned that any decline in person-day generation would be taken seriously.

Officials also reviewed labour availability, worksite monitoring, and delays in administrative approvals.

First Indian elected

Mamta Singh became the first Indian American elected to Jersey City Council At-Large, marking a historic milestone for the city's large Indian diaspora. Singh, founder of JCFamilies and Indians In Jersey City, ran on the Team Solomon slate, focusing on youth programs, working families, and cultural preservation. Authorities restored electricity by Wednesday afternoon but warned of ongoing deficits.

WASHINGTON DC

US lawmakers urge action

Forty-two US lawmakers, led by Pramila Jayapal and Greg Casar, urged Secretary of State Marco Rubio to address human rights violations in Pakistan. They called for visa bans and asset freezes against military officials accused of transnational repression, targeting political opponents, journalists, and minority communities.

AUCKLAND

Man swallows Faberge egg

In Auckland, New Zealand, a 32-year-old man stole a \$20,000 diamond-encrusted Fabergé egg from a jewellery store and swallowed it. Police arrested him on the spot and are monitoring him while awaiting natural recovery of the rare, James Bond-inspired locket, which remains unrecovered.

WASHINGTON DC

A 25-year-old Pakistani-origin man has been arrested in the United States for allegedly plotting a mass shooting on a university campus, prompting a major counter-terrorism and weapons investigation by federal agencies.

The suspect, Luqmaan Khan, a University of Delaware student, was taken into custody on November 24 after police intercepted him at a park in Newark, Delaware, during late-night patrols. Officers noticed Khan inside his pickup truck well past authorised hours, raising suspicion. A vehicle search led to the recovery of multiple firearms, ammunition, tactical gear, and what authorities described as a handwritten attack manifesto.

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, the cache found inside the truck included a .357-calibre Glock Model 31 handgun fitted into a



micro-plastic carbine conversion brace, loaded with 27 rounds. Three additional 27-round magazines were also recovered—one inserted into the conversion slot to enable rifle-style firing—along with a 9mm Glock magazine, an armoured ballistic plate, and a marble composition notebook containing violent plans and operational notes.

Investigators stated that the notebook outlined the use of additional weapons, potential attack methods, and techniques to evade law-enforce-

ment detection. The handwritten notes reportedly referenced an officer from the University of Delaware Police Department, and included a sketched map labelled "UD Police Station," highlighting building entry-exit points, security weaknesses, and movement strategy.

Authorities described the content as "premeditated assault plans" incorporating "warfare tactics" and buildings reconnaissance, suggesting targeted planning rather than random impulse.

Rubio flags radical Islam threat

U.S. Department of State Secretary Marco Rubio has warned of an "imminent global threat" from radical Islam, stating that extremist groups seek to "control more territories and people" beyond regional strongholds. In an interview with Fox News, he described the ideology as "revolutionary," expansionist, and openly targeting the West, particularly the United States and Europe. He cautioned that radical Islamists are "prepared to conduct terrorism, assassinations, and murders" to dominate societies and cultures. Rubio also announced new visa restrictions for individuals and officials who "direct, authorise, fund, or support violence against Christians".

Bessent trashes NYT credibility

WASHINGTON DC

US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent has declared that The New York Times is "no longer a credible newspaper," accusing it of publishing biased and "100% fake" reports about President Donald Trump's mental health.

Speaking at a live event hosted by the outlet, he described the newspaper as a "fever swamp" and blamed it for covering up former President Joe Biden's cognitive decline, calling it "one of the greatest scandals of all time."

In an interview-style rebuttal, Bessent said he no longer reads the paper and predicted it would lose its "paper of record" status over coming decades. He dismissed a recent article claiming Trump shows signs of fatigue and appears drowsy during meetings, joking that the president phoned him "twice at 2 AM last week instead of three times," implying Trump remains highly active.

Putin wants to end war: Trump after US-Russia talks

WASHINGTON

US President Donald Trump on Thursday said a high-level American delegation that met Russian President Vladimir Putin left with the "impression" that the Kremlin leader "would like to end the war" in Ukraine.

The delegation, headed by US Special Envoy Steve Witkoff and Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner, held five hours of discussions in Moscow on Wednesday. Trump's son-in-law and his close advisor Steve Witkoff reportedly engaged in a five-hour, closed-door dialogue with Putin, marking one of the longest direct exchanges between officials from both sides since the conflict began in February 2022.

Speaking to reporters in the Oval Office, Trump described the talks as "very good" and said they went

positively, but stressed that he could not reveal details yet. "It does take two to tango," he said, adding, "Their impression was that he (Putin) would like to end the war."

However, senior Kremlin adviser Yuri Ushakov clarified that despite the lengthy discussions, "no compromise" was reached, particularly on territorial disputes involving Ukrainian land. He acknowledged that both sides reviewed possible diplomatic paths toward peace but said that major disagreements remain. "We are no closer to resolving the crisis, and much work remains," Ushakov stated, confirming that the talks continued late into the night with involvement from top Russian officials, including envoy Kirill Dmitriev.

Ushakov also confirmed that Putin sent "important political signals" for Trump through Witkoff and that both governments plan more communication ahead.

Texas troopers find 23 immigrants hidden inside truck sleeper

TEXAS

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) troopers discovered 23 undocumented immigrants hidden inside the sleeping compartment of a semi-truck during a traffic stop on Interstate 35, authorities reported.

The incident occurred on Friday, November 28, 2025, in La Salle County as part of Operation Lone Star.

A DPS trooper pulled over a white Freightliner truck for driving on an improved

shoulder and discovered that the driver did not hold a commercial driver's license. During the inspection, troopers, assisted by a Border Patrol K-9 unit, found 23 people cramped inside the vehicle's sleeper area.

The driver, 24-year-old John David Amaya of Laredo, was arrested and charged with 23 counts of smuggling of persons, a state jail felony.

The individuals, from Nicaragua, Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, and Mexico, were referred to U.S. Border Patrol



for processing.

Under Texas law, passed by Gov. Greg Abbott in 2023, those convicted of human smuggling face a mandatory minimum prison sentence of 10 years.

Zia critical, shifts to London

DHAKA

Former Bangladesh PM Khleda Zia is in critical condition and preparations are underway to shift her to London for advanced treatment, reports said Thursday.

The 80-year-old leader of the Bangladesh Nationalist Party was hospitalised on November 23 after a chest infection affected her heart and lungs. Qatar has offered an air ambulance, while landing trials were conducted at Evercare Hospital where she remains in intensive care.

A joint medical board including specialists from China and the UK is reviewing treatment plans.

Donbass to be fully Liberated: says Russian Prez Putin

MOSCOW

Russian President Vladimir Putin has reiterated that Donbass will be fully liberated and Ukrainian forces will be pushed out of the territories Moscow now claims as its new regions, either by military means or through negotiations.

His remarks came during an interview with India Today on Thursday, ahead of his upcoming state visit to India. The comments followed extensive diplomatic talks held at the Kremlin on December 2 with US envoy Steve Witkoff, focus-



ing on an American-drafted 28-point peace roadmap for the Ukraine war. The plan, portions of which leaked last week, reportedly calls for Kyiv to surrender remaining land it controls in the two breakaway territories of Donetsk and Lugansk, renounce NATO ambitions, and reduce its army size—terms rejected by Ukraine.

Imran seeks medical access

ISLAMABAD

Former Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan has moved the Islamabad High Court seeking urgent permission to undergo medical tests at the Shaukat Khanum Memorial Cancer Hospital & Research Centre within three days.

The petition, filed via Ali Amin Gandapur, also requests monthly health check-ups, access to specialised medical teams, and that copies of reports be shared with his family and the court. Khan's party, Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf, claims he is suffering medical complications aggravated during detention, alleging political victimisation.

'I'll come to New York', asserts Netanyahu

NEW YORK

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has asserted he will visit New York despite arrest threats by mayor-elect Zohran Mamdani over an International Criminal Court warrant. Speaking at the NYT DealBook Forum, Netanyahu said, "Yes, I'll come to New York," dismissing calls for intimidation to shape his travel plans.

When asked about dialogue with Mamdani, Netanyahu responded that a conversation would only



make sense if Mamdani recognises Israel's "right to exist," adding, "That would be a good opening."

Mamdani, 34, a democratic socialist and one of New York's first Muslim and South Asian leaders elected to office, has criticised Israel's Gaza operations, calling them genocide and promising to direct the New York Police Department to act on the ICC order should

Netanyahu arrive.

Israel has strongly rejected genocide or apartheid accusations and maintains its campaign in Gaza is a security response to the October 7, 2023 attack by Hamas.

Legal experts say arrest remains unlikely, as mayoral authority cannot override federal or diplomatic protections.

The US government is not party to the ICC, and President Donald Trump's administration—an outspoken ally of Israel—has sanctioned ICC officials and backed Netanyahu's security prerogatives, limiting any local enforcement scope.

Thunderbird jet crashes in training



CALIFORNIA

A F-16C Fighting Falcon from the elite U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds crashed during a training mission in the Mojave Desert near Trona, California, erupting into flames on ground impact. The pilot survived after ejecting safely mid-air and sustained non-life-threatening injuries.

The aircraft, operating over controlled airspace, went down at about 10:45 AM on Wednesday, according to the United States Air Force. A widely circulated social-media video showed the pilot ejecting in time as the jet slowly descended and burst into flames after striking the ground. Authorities confirmed that the ejection occurred at 10:45 AM.

Emergency units from the San Bernardino County Fire

Department responded to the incident at approximately 10:45 AM near Trona, roughly 180 miles (290 km) north of Los Angeles. Fire crews classified the response as an "aircraft emergency" in the surrounding desert region. The Air Force stated that the crash is under investigation, and additional details will be released by the 57th Wing Public Affairs Office. Early local assessments were supported by county fire officials who aided site containment, surveillance, and initial safety operations.

The F-16C was assigned to the Thunderbirds, which are formally based at Nellis Air Force Base. The team, formed in 1953, is known for flying precise aerobatic formations at air shows, training seasonally out of Nellis near Las Vegas to perform tight maneuvers with aircraft flying within inches of each other.

EU to launch antitrust probe

BRUSSELS

The European Commission was set to open the probe into how the Silicon Valley company integrated its Meta AI system within its popular messaging service earlier this year, the report said.

Brussels is planning a new antitrust investigation into Meta Platforms over the rollout of artificial intelligence features within WhatsApp, the Financial Times reported on Thursday.

Reuters could not immediately verify the report. Meta did not immediately respond to a Reuters request for comment outside normal business hours.

A Meta spokesperson declined to comment on the upcoming EU probe to the FT.

Belgium rejects EU proposal for channeling frozen Russian assets

BELGIUM

Belgium has firmly rejected a renewed proposal by the European Commission to channel frozen Russian central bank assets into a €90-billion military aid and reconstruction loan for Ukraine.

Foreign Minister Maxime Prevot warned that the plan, pushed by Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen, could bring "disastrous consequences" for Belgium, which hosts the majority of the frozen assets via the Euroclear depository.

Von der Leyen recently outlined two financing paths for Ukraine: EU-level borrowing backed by the bloc's collective budget, or the "reparations loan" model, under which financial institutions holding immobilised Russian funds would transfer the assets into

a new loan instrument for Kyiv. Belgium, citing legal exposure, economic instability, and liquidity risks to Euroclear, described the reparations route as the "worst option" for aiding Ukraine without additional EU guarantees.

Prevot criticised the Commission for minimising Belgium's concerns, stressing that the country would shoulder the heaviest burden of any Russian legal retaliation.

Canadian border officer sues Indian govt, seeks \$9 million in damages

ONTARIO

A veteran Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) superintendent has filed a \$9 million lawsuit against the Indian government, alleging he was targeted in a state-backed disinformation campaign that ruined his career and personal life.

Sandeep Singh "Sunny" Sidhu claims Indian officials orchestrated false media reports branding him a "terrorist" to paint Canada as supporting Khalistani extremists.

The Ontario Superior Court lawsuit, filed with the help of Toronto lawyer Jeffrey Kroeker, says Sidhu became a target due to his Sikh surname and visible security role. Last October, Indian news outlets broadcast sensational claims accusing him of promoting banned groups, violent acts, and being

a fugitive. Headlines such as "Trudeau's tax-funded terrorist" fueled online harassment, including death threats, doxing, and calls for his extradition.

Sidhu, who has limited public exposure aside from brief TV appearances, went into hiding and later sought treatment for psychological distress and alcohol dependency at Vancouver's St. Pauls Hospital. The lawsuit also names CBSA, alleging the agency dismissed threats, conducted invasive background checks, and breached its duty of care despite eventually clearing and reinstating him.

Sidhu argues he became the "patsy" in a broader foreign interference campaign aimed at embarrassing Ottawa. India has denied involvement, and an initial hearing is scheduled for early 2026.

Russia not rejoining G7

MOSCOW

Russian President Vladimir Putin has confirmed that Russia has no intention of rejoining the Western-led G7 group, describing its global influence as steadily declining. In an interview with India Today ahead of his state visit to India, Putin highlighted that many G7 economies now lag behind emerging nations in purchasing-power parity terms, and the bloc's share in the global economy has been shrinking.

Putin recalled that Russia had stopped attending G7 meetings even before the Ukraine conflict escalated in 2014 and was later excluded following Crimea's secession and vote to join Russia.

He emphasized that while the G7 remains "an important platform" for discussion, Moscow is prioritizing other international forums, particularly BRICS.

Sperm bank to safeguard Cheetah

NAMIBIA

A sperm bank in Namibia is preserving the genetic material of cheetahs, aiming to prevent the extinction of the world's fastest land animal. Founded by American zoologist Laurie Marker in 1990 at the Cheetah Conservation Fund near Otjiwarongo, the facility now holds samples from around 400 cheetahs stored in liquid nitrogen.

Cheetah populations have

plummeted by 80% over the last 50 years, with fewer than 7,000 remaining in the wild across 33 fragmented populations. Loss of habitat, human-wildlife conflict, and illegal trade have further isolated these groups, shrinking the species' gene pool and affecting reproduction rates.

Marker collects sperm opportunistically from injured,



captured, or deceased cheetahs, ensuring the bank represents as much genetic diversity as possible. The bank serves as a last-resort backup, similar to efforts to save northern white rhinos, which rely on stored sperm for artificial reproduction.

While natural reproduction remains

the priority, Marker warns that cheetahs' low fertility and high rates of abnormal sperm may make artificial reproduction necessary in the future.

"Every cheetah is a unique mix of a very small number of genes... without this, we're not going to have much of a chance," she said.


The sperm bank underscores the growing role of reproductive science in wildlife conservation worldwide.

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ASHES | England finish on 325/9 to take honours on first day

JOE ROOT'S MAIDEN TON DOWN UNDER OUTSHINES STARC'S 6

BRISBANE

Joe Root posted a long-awaited first Ashes century in Australia to give England the honours on Day 1 of the second cricket test despite Mitchell Starc's six wickets.

Starc removed Ben Duckett and Ollie Pope to have England reeling at 5-2 in the third over Thursday.

That's when Root went to the crease and set about restoring the England innings, and confidence, following the series-opening eight-wicket loss in Perth.

His unbeaten 135 took England to 325-9 at stumps, with No. 11 Jofra Archer at a career-best 32 in an unbroken 61-run last-wicket stand.

Starc returned to dismiss Harry Brook in the middle session giving him his 415th career wicket, surpassing Pakistan great Wasim Akram (414 from 104 tests) as the most successful left-arm fast bowler in test cricket.

It was a jolt England could have done without. Brook was caught at slip slashing outside off stump and falling for 31 from 33 balls to end a 54-run fourth-wicket partnership with Root just as the sun was going down.

Root shared a 117-run stand with Zac Crawley (76) to lift England to 122-3 and partnered Brook in another innings-reviving stand that set England on course for a decent total.

Root's highest test score in 15 previous Ashes tests in Australia was 89.

Playing his 160th test, Root was 88 not out at the drinks break midway through the night session. He moved into the 90s for the first time in Australia and finally hundred.

Momentum swings

Starc then removed Will Jacks, Gus Atkinson and Brydon Carse to reduce England to 264-9.

No Nathan Lyon

The most contentious selection of the series so far was Australia's choice to recall Michael Neser in a five-man pace attack at the expense of spinner Nathan Lyon, who missed out for only the second time on home soil since his debut in 2011. The selection committee later described it as a one off because of the conditions expected at the Gabba.

Hundred finally

Joe Root has finally scored a hundred in an Ashes test for England in Australia. Test cricket's No. 1-ranked batter ended a 15-test century drought Down Under dating to 2013 when he reached triple figures on Thursday in the first night session of the second test at the Gabba.

Arshdeep Singh needs consistent ODI outings

Statement spells from the pacer against SA proves it

VISAKHAPATNAM

By his own admission, Arshdeep Singh's favourite pastime is to watch YouTube compilations of Wasim Akram and Zaheer Khan to learn about the nuances of yorker and reverse swing.

Arshdeep has put those learnings to use quite frequently in T20Is, and it's not for nothing that he became the first Indian bowler to take more than 100 wickets in that format.

But his spells against South Africa in the recent Ranchi and Raipur ODIs have underlined the need to give the left-arm pacer a consistent run in the 50-over version, something he has been deprived thus far.

In isolation, his figures of 2 for 64 and 2 for 54 in those matches look modest. But they offer a different picture when placed alongside Proteas' totals of 332 and 362 for six.

In both the games, Arshdeep had to bowl during SA's chase under lights with a heavy dew setting in wintry conditions.

But he never let the batters dominate him in either of the matches, register-

ing the best economy among the pacers - 6.4 at Ranchi and 5.4 at Raipur.

At Raipur, Harshit Rana gave away seven runs an over and Prasidh Krishna was carted around for 10.20.

It may be argued that Arshdeep largely bowled when the ball was relatively drier in the first Power Play and when the ball was changed after the 44th over in the second ODI.

But even then to contain or dismiss batters like Quinton de Kock and Marco Jansen on a firm pitch, a bowler needs optimum tactical awareness and the ability to bowl to the set field.

"That is one area where he has improved a lot in recent times. He knows the conditions well, he then adjusts the lengths well and he has now learned the

importance of mixing up his deliveries to avoid being predictable.

"It is very important in white ball cricket in which batsmen keep looking for runs. He has really matured now as a bowler and is mentally tough," tells Jaswant Rai, his childhood coach.

Rai's words ring true if one glances back at Arshdeep's third spell in the first ODI which India won by 17 runs.

The 26-year-old returned to bowl in the last power play, conceding just 16 runs in that three-over spell, and also dismissed Nandre Burger to make a critical difference in a close match.

In fact, the 47th over, in which he ousted Burger, was a wicket maiden, as he used the left-hander's angles and a well-concealed short-pitched balls to perfection.

No dew in Vizag

Arshdeep will be eager to bowl in the series-deciding third ODI here on Sunday because the high humidity in this coastal city -- often as high as 70 per cent in the night -- might cut down the effect of dew in the eventuality of India bowling second. It will certainly make his and colleagues' job that much easier here, but his overall statistics in the last two years beginning from 2023 December also testify to his improvement and consistency. Arshdeep has grabbed 16 wickets in 10 matches in this period.

Asif takes five wickets against defending champions to star in win

A five-wicket haul by pacer KM Asif, who is having his best domestic season, helped underdogs Kerala earn a shock 15-run victory against defending champions Mumbai in a Syed Mushtaq Ali Trophy Group A match here on Thursday.

Mumbai, who suffered their first defeat in five games in the T20 tournament, though continue to lead the group with 16 points, while Kerala moved to third spot with 12 points -- the same as Andhra who are in second place -- following their third win in the five-team pool.

Kerala are marginally behind Andhra on net run rate.

The star-studded Mumbai side, led by India pacer Shardul Thakur and having the likes of national T20 skipper Suryakumar Yadav and Shivam Dube in their ranks, crumbled to 163 all out in 19.4 overs while chasing 179.

Kerala made 178 for five.

'Opening or batting at No. 4, process remains same'

Ruturaj Gaikwad, who hit his maiden ODI century in 2nd ODI, feels after few hits everything falls in place

RAIPUR

A specialist opener in white-ball cricket, Ruturaj Gaikwad failed to click in his maiden outing at the coveted No. 4 spot but came good in his second match with a hundred here and he said he did not find it too difficult to adjust to his new role.

India have been served well by Shreyas Iyer in ODIs at No. 4 but with the Mumbai batter unavailable due to injury, the team management entrusted Gaikwad with the job to build the innings and he did it with aplomb, hitting his maiden century in the second ODI against South Africa on Wednesday.

"I feel it's a privilege to have that kind of confidence from the management towards an opener who can bat at No 4 as well. I took it that way," Gaikwad told the media after India lost the high-scoring contest by four wickets.

"It was just matter of how I can play my first 10-15 balls and after that, the process remains the same," he added.

The right-handed batter scored a quickfire 83-ball 105 in a 195-run third wicket stand with Virat Kohli (102) to help take India to 358 for 5.

For Gaikwad, it was imperative to channelise his experience of long hauls in 50-over cricket as he looked the perfect foil to Kohli during their 195-run stand, at times matching the batting great in strokes that he played and with immaculate running

between wickets.

"In one-day format, even when I was opening, I have always tried to make sure I am able to bat till the 45th over and capitalise after that," he said.

"Somehow, I knew how to play in between (overs) 11 to 40, how to rotate strike (and) what are the boundary options. I was pretty much confident about how I can go through."

RAIPUR

Architect of South Africa's series-levelling win in the second ODI against India here, Aiden Markram says scoring runs matters only when the team wins and he felt responsible for the visitors' defeat in the first ODI by a small margin. Markram, whose 110 on Wednesday set the stage for South Africa's four-wicket win in a chase of 359, fell cheaply in the first ODI at Ranchi where India clinched the high-scoring game by 17 runs.

"Runs only matter if you win games, to be fair, or at least for me. If we'd lost today, I'd be as miserable as I would have been in the previous game. Getting the result is something that makes me really happy," Markram told the media here after the match on Wednesday.

"Being three (wickets) down early in the first game, a lot of that is the difference in the results I feel. From a personal point of view I felt quite responsible for that," he added referring to the open-

ing game. On Wednesday though, Markram's ton was followed by a rapid 34-ball 54 from Dewald Brevis and a measured 68 by Matthew Breetzke, which helped the Proteas overhaul the target.

"It felt like we were living the first game out again today," he said as South Africa stuttered but crossed the line.

Markram said there wasn't much discussion in the mid-innings break. "There wasn't much to be honest. You kind of know how to chase 350 (or) 360, you have to take the game on a bit and manage that with setting the game up and being smart in between as well."

World Cup Draw

FIFA hopes for bigger and better spectacle this time

NEW YORK

A record 64 nations will be in Friday's World Cup draw, more than 30% of FIFA's members, as soccer's leaders insist a bigger tournament is better.

FIFA expanded the field from 32 teams to 48, and just 42 spots have been determined going into the convoluted ceremony in which balls representing nations are plucked from bowls and assigned to groups per rules

that restrict who goes where. Twenty-two teams in Friday's draw are headed to playoffs that determine the final six berths on March 31.

There will be 104 games instead of 64 in the World Cup running from June 11 through July 19 at 16 venues throughout North America. Seventy-eight games will be at 11 NFL stadiums, including all from the quarterfinals on, and 13 each in Mexico and Canada. The final is at MetLife Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey,

where there will be a half-time show for the first time.

In addition to 12 group winners and second-place nations, eight third-place teams advance to a new round of 32. The World Cup winner will play eight games.

"I've always thought that what FIFA should do is do it like the Final Four and do 64 teams with no groups, just a knockout," said Alan Rothenberg, the head organizer of the 1994 World Cup in the U.S., comparing soccer with the NCAA basketball

tournament.

Led by captain Lionel Messi, who turns 39 during the tournament, Argentina seeks to become the first nation to win consecutive World Cups since Brazil in 1958 and 1962. Messi and Portugal's 40-year-old Cristiano Ronaldo are expected to play in a record sixth World Cup.

At least four countries have qualified for the first time. Cape Verde (ranked No. 68), Curaçao (82), Jordan (66) and Uzbekistan (50) have

qualified for the first time and four playoff teams could become debutantes: Albania (63), Kosovo (80), New Caledonia (149) and Suriname (123).

FIFA has set record initial prices of up to \$6,730 for a ticket along with as much as \$175 for a parking place and \$73,200 for a hospitality package - up from \$25 to \$475 for the 1994 tournament in the U.S. Almost 2 million tickets among what is expected to be more than 6 million have been sold.
