'Mann foreign visit blocked by Centre'

The Union government has denied political clearance to the Punjab chief minister Bhagwant Mann to visit the UK and Israel in February to attract investments, ruling Aam Aadmi Party said here on Wednesday. Mann was to be accompanied by Industries minister Sanjeev Arora along with some senior officials on his visit to the UK and Israel for about 10 days, next month, though the Centre has denied the political clearance to Mann and his delegation. The senior officials who were to accompany Mann were said to be chief secretary KAP Sinha, principal secretary to CM, Ravi Bhagat, besides others from the industries department.

2 more nurses show Nipah symptoms

Two more nurses were on Wednesday admitted to the Beliaghata ID Hospital here after they showed symptoms of the Nipah virus infection, a health department official said. The two were engaged in the treatment of a health worker who tested positive for the Nipah virus at Burdwan Medical College and Hospital. One of the duo was brought to city hospital late Jan 13 night, while the other, a house staff member, was shifted from the Bardhaman facility on early Wednesday.

Bomb threat at Ludhiana district court

Security agencies across Punjab were put on alert mode on Wednesday after bomb threats were received by Ludhiana district court and a school in Moga district on their respective official email addresses. While the court proceedings were disrupted as the same remained suspended during the police search operation, the Moga school was also suspended and the students sent home ahead of the police search operation. It is the second time in less than a week that a bomb threat was received by a district court, earlier being on January 8, last, when such threats were received by district courts of Ropar, Anandpur Sahib, Ferozepur, Mansa and Moga, which had turned out to be hoax.

Lit fest discussion on book about Babur cancelled, writer protests

Architect-turned-writer Aabhas Maldahiyar on Wednesday took to X to lament the cancellation of a discussion on his book about Mughal Emperor Babur at the Bhopal Literature and Art Festival (BLF).

Police apprehended that right-wing organisations would oppose the event and there would be vandalism, claimed the organisers of the festival which was held from January 9 to 11.

Posting on X an open letter

addressed to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Maldahiyar said a session on his book "Babur: The Quest for Hindustan" was cancelled after a newspaper wrongly accused him of trying to glorify Babur.

"On the basis of these baseless accusations, some so-called Hindu organisations issued serious threats, which included threats to burn my book and damage bookstores," he said.

Maldahiyar told PTI over phone from Bengaluru that it was unfortunate that without reading the book, 'Swadesh'

newspaper published a story, which led to the cancellation of the event.

The newspaper, however, claimed that they were not against the writer or the book, but considered Babur to be "irrelevant".

According to Maldahiyar, he sent a clarification to the newspaper which was not published. Subsequently, the organisers arranged a session on 'Ancient Architecture', he said.

Swadesh editor Atul Tare told PTI that they had no objection to the book or the author.

Lokpal bins graft plaint against BJP MP Dubey

NEW DELHI

Anti-corruption ombudsman Lokpal has dismissed a graft complaint against BJP MP Nishikant Dubey and termed the allegations as "frivolous" and "vexatious".

In its 134-page order, the Lokpal said the complainant -- ex-IPS officer Amitabh Thakur -- has failed to make out any case to persuade it to proceed against Dubey regarding the allegation of acquisition of disproportionate assets than the known sources of his income.

"The allegations made against RPS (Respondent Public Servant) are frivolous and vexatious, including complainant indulging in what-aboutry," said the order issued on Tuesday by a Lokpal bench, headed by its chairperson Justice AM Khanwilkar.

Lokpal-based Thakur, who is also the national president of Azad Adhikar Sena party, had in May last year filed a complaint against Dubey alleging acquisition of disproportionate assets by him.

RJD will merge with my party, says Tej Pratap after hosting dad Lalu at feast

RJD president Lalu Prasad on Wednesday participated at 'dahi-chuda' party hosted by his elder son Tej Pratap Yadav on the occasion of Makar Sankranti at his residence, nearly eight months after expelling him from the party as well as also from the family.

Lalu, who is in his late 70s and keeps indoors because of multiple health complications, turned up at Tej Pratap's house. Significantly, when a reporter asked Lalu whether he was unhappy with Tej Pratap, he replied in the negative.

Besides Lalu, Bihar governor Arif Mohammad Khan,

deputy chief minister Vijay Kumar Sinha and other dignitaries also attended the feast. Tej Pratap's mother and former chief minister Rabri Devi, and his younger brother and leader of opposition in state assembly Tejashwi Yadav skipped the feast. Tej Pratap had floated his own political outfit, Janshakti Janata Dal (JJD), after his expulsion from RJD and also unsuccessfully contested the last assembly election from Mahua. He was expelled from RJD by Lalu over his "irresponsible behaviour" and "violation of family values" after a Facebook post featured him with a woman. He claimed that his Facebook account was hacked and also deleted the post.

Drainage in the new city area remains. The biggest problem is sewer overflow in the old wards. The sewer has completely collapsed in many localities on the banks of the Ganga Ghats. Due to this, sewer overflow has become a permanent problem. In view of this, Mayor Ashok Kumar Tiwari has decided to lay new pipelines in 18 old wards in the first phase. In this sequence, the government has given the green signal to lay 200 kilometers of new sewer lines in 13 old wards at a cost of Rs 527 crore. Municipal Commissioner Himanshu Nagpal said that new sewer



lines will be laid in the remaining five wards. 200 kilometers of submarine line has been given the green signal. Municipal Commissioner Himanshu Nagpal said that the proposal to lay new sewer lines in the remaining five wards is likely to receive cabinet approval this week. In this regard, Hukoolganj, New

Basti. Over four lakh people from around 100 localities in the Prahlad Ghat, Kritivasheshwar, Shivpurwa, Tulsipur, Birdpur, Kazipura, Shivala, Nagwan, Baghada, Jangambadi and Bengali Tola wards will benefit. It has been decided to lay the pipeline using the trans-less method. Under this, pits will be

dug at the corners of the street and new pipelines will be laid in the entire street. The city is still dependent on the nearly 200-year-old drainage and sewerage system (Shahi Nala) for water drainage. The Municipal Corporation has no alternative to the Shahi Nala for drainage and sewerage. The Shahi Nala and the brick drain built during the British era are considered the backbone of Banaras. Due to the sewer pipelines of the British era in the old localities, the problem of blockage and overflow persists. Especially in the localities along the banks of the Ganga Ghats, the sewer is often blocked. In view of this, the Municipal Corporation has decided to replace the sewer pipelines in 18 wards.





The festival of Makar Sankranti will be celebrated on Thursday, January 15th. This will mark the beginning of auspicious events. Wedding ceremonies will begin from February 2nd. Traders and those involved in the wedding industry have been eagerly awaiting the end of Kharmas (an inauspicious period). This year, there are a total of 63 auspicious wedding dates from February to December. This has created considerable excitement in the market regarding weddings. According to Pandit Omkar Tiwari, the sun will enter Capricorn at 9:39 PM on January 14th. According to scriptures, if Sankranti falls at night, its auspicious effects are felt the next day, therefore Makar Sankranti will be celebrated on January 15th. Bathing, charity and performing good deeds are of special importance on this day. People will take a dip in the Ganges and donate khichdi (a rice and lentil dish). Auspicious ceremonies such as head shaving, housewarming, initiation of education and first feeding of solid food will begin from January 15th. The month of February has the most auspicious dates for weddings, with 21 dates available. Under the Protection of the Administration, JCB Operators Turned the Pond into a Death Trap

Four Children Drown in Pond, All Four Die, Family Devastated

Wave of grief sweeps through the family and the entire region after the death of four children

Prayagraj: Four children from Husainpur hamlet of Ahmadpur Pawan village in Puramuti police station area of the district had gone to the fields to eat chickpea greens on the evening of January 13th, around 3:00 PM. After eating the greens, the four children went towards a pond, but then they disappeared and could not be found. When the children did not return home, their families started searching for them. On the morning of January 14th, the bodies of the four children were found in the pond. With the help of villagers, the children's bodies were recovered from the pond. Seeing the four bodies together outside the pond, the family was devastated. Police arrived at the scene, took custody of the bodies, and sent them for post-mortem examination. However, the family members have alleged that the chil-



dren were murdered and then thrown into the pond. According to information, Prateek Sonkar, aged 11, and Prince Sonkar, aged 10, sons of Pradeep Sonkar from Husainpur hamlet of Ahmadpur Pawan village in Puramuti police station area, along with their relatives Priyanshu Sonkar, aged 11, and Karan Sonkar, aged 19, had gone from their home to the fields to eat chickpea greens around 3:00 PM on January 13th. After going to the fields, the four children suddenly disappeared and did not return home. When the four children did not return, their families became worried and started searching for them. The family members informed the police. The police also searched, but there was no trace of the children throughout the night. On January 14th, the children's bodies were spotted in a pond near a brick kiln, and with the help of villagers, the children's bodies were recovered from the pond. Upon receiving the news of the death of the four children, a large crowd of villagers from the surrounding areas gathered at the scene. Grief was visible on everyone's faces after the death of the four children. Upon receiving the information, the

police arrived at the scene, took the children's bodies into custody, and sent them for post-mortem examination. The simultaneous death of the four children has plunged the entire family into grief, and a wave of sorrow has swept through the village. Pradeep Sonkar, in his complaint to the police, alleged that the children were murdered, but the motive for the killings remains unclear. The cause of the children's deaths is now the subject of a police investigation. The police station authorities stated that the cause of death will become clear after the post-mortem report is received.

India's naval advancements will fuel its Indian Ocean ambitions

As India approaches its 75th Republic Day, the nation has achieved a significant milestone in strengthening its naval capabilities. In an exceptional move reflecting strategic foresight, Prime Minister Narendra Modi recently commissioned three advanced naval platforms in a single day: a destroyer, a frigate, and a submarine. However, in a fast-changing security environment in the Indo-Pacific, the developments in naval capabilities must be measured in a relative context—capabilities of arch rivals and a swiftly evolving security domain, that is. Now, five points need to be underscored in this context. The commissioning of advanced naval platforms highlights India's aspiration to establish itself as a net security provider in the Indian Ocean Region (IOR). Over the years, India's maritime security strategy has significantly evolved. The 2015 Security and Growth for All in the Region (SAGAR) vision reflects India's dedication to fostering regional cooperation in the Indo-Pacific. This vision is supported by initiatives such as the Indian Ocean Rim Association (IORA) and the Indian Ocean Island Countries (IOIC), which emphasise coastal connectivity and sustainable development. PM Modi's address at the 2018 Shangri-La Dialogue further reinforced India's strategic perspective for the Indo-Pacific. The SAGAR vision has gained traction through frameworks such as the Indo-Pacific Oceans Initiative (IPOI) and the Information Fusion Centre for the Indian Ocean Region (IFC-IOR), aiming to tackle regional security issues and counter China's expanding influence. While China's People's Liberation Army Navy (PLAN) has grown to become the world's largest by fleet size, it still lacks the operational capabilities and combat experience of the United States. India's navy, although the smallest of its armed forces, has consistently demonstrated efficiency and timely acquisitions. Compared to the Indian Air Force, which faces critical squadron shortages, the navy pragmatically acknowledges domestic limitations in engine development. It relies on foreign collaborations to fill gaps, ensuring progress. However, I'll turn to that later. To establish itself as a net security provider, the Indian Navy must sustain the momentum it has recently achieved in naval defence exports. Although this initiative began in earnest only in 2011, it gained significant traction after 2016. India has transitioned from being a cautious supplier of naval equipment, primarily targeting countries such as Mauritius, Sri Lanka, and the Philippines, to a more prominent player in defence exports. For many years, India's exports to nations such as Seychelles, the Maldives, Mauritius, and Sri Lanka were limited to refurbished ex-navy and coast guard vessels. However, this trend has undergone a remarkable transformation in recent years. Naval ships, as of 2024, account for over 61 per cent of India's total defence exports. This shift highlights India's growing capability to manufacture advanced platforms and its determination to emerge as a dependable supplier of defence equipment to neighbouring countries. This development is a critical component of India's regional and maritime strategy, especially given China's rapid ascent in modernising PLAN and expanding its influence in the Indian Ocean by providing naval assets to smaller nations. China has already established itself as the leading defence exporter to both Pakistan and Bangladesh.

It delivered two Ming-class submarines to Bangladesh in 2017, gifted a P625 frigate to Sri Lanka in 2019, and committed to exporting Yuan-class submarines to Thailand. Although the Thai deal encountered difficulties when Germany refused to supply key propulsion components.



Tulip's resignation in the UK is troublesome for Hasina. Spotlight on daughter Saima

The sins of fathers shall be visited upon the sons—this ominous pronouncement in the Bible has now come true for Tulip Siddiq, a 42-year-old minister in the British government, but with a twist. In her case, it wasn't her father's sins that visited upon her but those allegedly committed by her aunt, the deposed prime minister of Bangladesh, Sheikh Hasina Wazed. And it cost Siddiq her job. Slapped with a range of corruption charges by Bangladesh's Anti-Corruption Committee (ACC), which forced an internal gov-

ernment inquiry, Siddiq has strenuously denied any wrongdoing—except that of ignorance about benefiting from dubious transactions. But she has paid the price and resigned as UK treasury minister on Tuesday, though she stressed that an independent review found she had "not breached the ministerial code". If the sins of aunts can impact nieces, then can daughters escape their mothers'? Ever since Siddiq's case hit the headlines, the spotlight has slowly but surely turned to Sheikh Hasina's daughter,

Saima Wazed, also known as Putul, who was elected regional director of the World Health Organisation's Southeast Asia branch amid considerable controversy in February 2024. An editorial in the eminent medical journal The Lancet had earlier questioned if she was fit for the job, as she only held a master's degree in psychology while rival aspirants were doctors with years of public health experience. The ACC has now initiated a probe into how she got the job: on her own merit or her mother's

intervention as prime minister. All eyes are now on Putul and whether she'll be forced to follow in her cousin's footsteps. What does it all mean for 77-year-old Sheikh Hasina, who has been sheltering in New Delhi since fleeing Dhaka on 5 August after a violent student uprising against her 15-year continuous tenure as Bangladesh's prime minister? There is no doubt that the charges being hurled at her, her family, and her friends are coloured by political prejudice from those now in power in Bangladesh.

Capital expenditure (capex) continues to be a cause for concern



ture. At the end of June 2024, the growth was just about 2 per cent, but it has been rising since then, reaching 4.2 per cent by the end of the first six months of 2024-25 and climbing even higher to 7.8 per cent during April-November 2024-25. So, if revenue expenditure has gained momentum, why has capex failed to follow suit? A close analysis of the government's capex numbers presents an interesting picture. Over 90 per cent of the Centre's total capex during 2024-25 was accounted for by just six sectors—roads, railways, defence, telecom, transfer to states and new schemes. Their share in total capex in 2023-24 was a little less at 87 per cent. But the 12 per cent decline in the first eight months of 2024-25 is primarily the result of a marked slowdown in only two of these six areas—roads and defence, which accounted for over 40 per cent of the total capex outlay for 2024-25. Capex on the construction of roads and highways fell by 16 per cent, while defence saw a decline of 15 per cent. This is serious and has worrying implications

for both infrastructure and defence. The problem of slowing expenditure in these two areas should not have been difficult to fix. Either effective monitoring of spending is lacking, or there are serious problems with project execution, reflecting the poor expenditure-absorbing capacity of these two sectors. This is borne out by a relatively good performance of the Indian Railways, which accounts for over 22 per cent of this year's capex. At ₹1.68 trillion, the Indian Railways' capex is just about 1 per cent lower than its spending during April-November 2023. With regard to the transfer of special assistance as loans to states for their capex and additional central assistance for their externally aided projects, the Union government's performance was slightly better. In the April-November 2024-25 period, these transfers rose by about 5 per cent, although much lower than the budgeted increase of 41 per cent.

In contrast, such transfers during the entire 2023-24 had risen sharply

by about 24 per cent to ₹1.15 trillion. It appears that these transfers will take a hit in the current year and for the first time since this initiative to help states boost their capex was undertaken a couple of years ago. Significantly, this has not yet adversely impacted the states in a big way. The capex of 25 states (accounting for 95 per cent of all the states' and Union territories' total capex budget) has risen by just about 1 per cent in the April-November 2024-25 period, although states like Andhra Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Mizoram, Odisha, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, and West Bengal saw their capex fall by varying margins. Eventually, however, this will have an adverse impact on the states' capex programme and its growth-enhancing effect. There are two more sectors that account for another 13 per cent of the Centre's capital expenditure budget. But they bring out an intriguing aspect of why the government's capex has been slowing. They suffer from a peculiar problem, which has nothing to do with either the relevant sectors' expenditure-absorbing capacity or the absence of effective expenditure monitoring. The bulk of the capex under telecommunications was meant for infusing equity into state-owned Bharat Sanchar Nigam Ltd, or BSNL. Of the total capex of ₹0.84 trillion, the proposed amount for BSNL's equity infusion accounted for as

much as ₹0.83 trillion. But the total expenditure under this head in the first eight months of 2024-25 is only 6 per cent of what has been budgeted. In other words, a decision to transfer the equity amount promised to BSNL would increase the government's capex by a significant margin. Why this money has not been transferred is puzzling. Last year, against a budgeted BSNL equity infusion of ₹0.53 trillion, the actual infusion was higher at ₹0.65 trillion. This year, no action on this front even after eight months is a puzzle as this failure also contributes significantly to the decline in the Centre's capex. More importantly, the Budget for 2024-25 had allocated a significant amount of ₹0.66 trillion for capex on central sector schemes and projects. Of this, a large chunk, estimated at ₹0.62 trillion, was earmarked for new schemes that the government would announce during the year. However, in the first eight months of the current year, only 4 percent of that total outlay has been used up, leaving ₹0.63 trillion yet to be spent. It is likely that the government may not need this amount or it may have kept its powder dry to meet any new schemes that it might announce later in the year, for which such capital allocations will be useful. For the Union finance ministry, currently busy preparing the Budget for 2025-26, such a state of play with regard to slowing capital expenditure could well be an opportunity.

Will Israel-Hamas Ceasefire Really Lead To Peace?

On January 20, 1981, on the day Ronald Reagan took over as the new US president, Iran freed 52 American hostages it had been holding for over a year. That projected Reagan as a strong leader sending a powerful signal to US allies and its foes. His predecessor, Jimmy Carter, did all the negotiations and tried his best to have the hostages released while he was still the president. But Tehran would not let him take the glory. Forty-four years on, Donald Trump is taking the credit for the Gaza ceasefire deal, which will come into effect a day before his inauguration, cementing his reputation as a tough leader. Biden can say that the deal happened under his watch. But there is no doubt that it was Trump whose pressure led to achieve the goal. He declared on his social media platform Truth Social: "This EPIC ceasefire agreement could have only happened as a result of our Historic Victory in November, as it signalled to the entire World that my

Administration would seek Peace and negotiate deals to ensure the safety of all Americans, and our Allies." Days after he threatened that there better be a Gaza deal by his January 20 inauguration or "all hell would break out", his special envoy to the Middle East, Steven Witkoff, landed in Tel Aviv last Saturday. It was the Sabbath, the day of rest for Jews. But Witkoff insisted on meeting the Israeli Prime Minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, that day. At their meeting, he conveyed Trump's message that the incoming President of the United States wanted to end the Gaza war and demanded that a ceasefire agreement be signed immediately. The format of the three-stage deal announced on Wednesday was proposed by Biden in May last year and was later also endorsed by the UN Security Council. But both Hamas and Israel kept dragging the negotiations over it. In Israel, Netanyahu refused to give any concessions to Hamas and continued with his brute military operation in Gaza.

Investors line-up for Excitel's \$200-million equity deal

Extension of the Production Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme for solar energy value chain, increased allocation towards PM Suryaghar Muft Bijlee Yojana, and greater thrust to distribution and transmission infrastructure are likely to be the key features of the upcoming Budget, as far as the energy sector is concerned. Sources said these proposals figured not only in the budget wish lists of the industry, but also in the respective recommendations from the ministries of power and renewable energy to the finance ministry, ahead of the Budget. "Given the success of PM Suryaghar scheme with almost 600,000 installations in just nine months since its launch, one could probably see additional allocation to target more households," said Ashwin Jacob, partner at Deloitte India. "As far as evacuation of power from offshore wind projects is concerned, we would want to see the VGF or budgetary support to continue or get enhanced," he added. "We hope to see a decisive increase in funding to accelerate the green energy transition. Priorities must include scaling renewable energy by addressing grid and transmission challenges, advancing Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) for grid stability and reliable power, doubling energy efficiency and digitalizing the energy sector through AI, smart meters, and data-driven solutions. Streamlining rooftop solar programs with simplified approvals, financing, and monitoring is equally vital," said Saurabh Kumar, Vice President – India, Global Energy Alliance for People and Planet (GEAPP). Sharat Goyal, CEO of Impact Infracap also expects the government to remove restrictions on state wise caps on roof top capacity for net-metering for industrial establishments. "Further, adoption of batteries to substitute use of diesel generators for back-up power should receive incentives and policy support

given their role in reducing dependence on imports," he said. While the government is increasingly working towards enhancing the country's RE capacity, the distribution and transmission infrastructure for its evacuation still needs to be strengthened. With the peak demand for power growing at a rate of 8-9% annually, the industry is looking forward to strengthening of climate resilient infrastructure augmentation. "One can expect new allocations towards augmentation of power distribution infrastructure, especially in high density/ urban load centres, in view of the sharp rise in peak demand over the last few years," said Anujesh Dwivedi, Partner at Deloitte India. He noted that there may be some allocation towards supporting the preparatory work especially on the listing of power utilities, or some incentive mechanism for promoting initiatives on private sector participation or listing of utilities at the state level because they are increasingly being seen as the much needed structural reforms the sector needs. The industry is optimistic of a wider coverage of the Revamped Distribution Sector Scheme by including smart metering in infrastructure definition.

"This would direct more financing for a sector which seeks to bring down India's transmission and distribution losses to 12% and improve recovery for state utilities," Goyal said. Goyal also noted that power transmission despite significant potential has not seen any notable monetisation events which could address the latent investor demand. "Government should announce a time-bound privatisation programme for assets owned by PGCIL," he said. The sector also sees the PLI scheme for solar value chain to continue with possible reduction in the duty structures for solar equipment. Jacob highlighted.

Privatized entities can employ Aadhar authentication

Delhi: The ministry of electronics and IT (Meity) announced that the Union government has amended the Aadhaar rules to allow private entities to use Aadhaar authentication for service delivery. The amendments aim to give residents "ease of living" and "better access to services". Ministry Notified Aadhaar Authentication for Good Governance (Social Welfare, Innovation, Knowledge) Amendment Rules, 2025, revising 2020 rules. "The amendment allows government and non-government entities to use Aadhaar authentication, promoting trusted transactions for both providers and users," stated the announcement. It stated that the amendment will make non-government e-commerce, travel, tourism, hospitality, and health services easier to use.

The 2020 rules allowed the Centre to



allow Aadhaar authentication only "in the interest of good governance, preventing leakage of public funds, promoting ease of living of residents and enabling better access to services for them" to use digital platforms for good governance, social welfare benefit dissipation prevention, and innovation and knowledge dissemination. The amendments removed "in the interest of good governance, preventing leakage of public funds access to services for them" and added "promoting ease of living of residents and enabling better access to services for them" as the fourth purpose, expanding the reasons for authentication.

Prasanna S, the Supreme Court's advocate-on-record who challenged Aadhaar's constitutionality, called the expansion the "spectre of a surveillance state", "unwarranted" and in violation of the top court's ruling that struck down Section 57 of the Aadhaar Act, 2016 to bar private entities from using authentication services. The 2025 Rules change contradicts the five-judge Supreme Court ruling in *Puttaswamy v Union of India* (2018). Section 57 of the Aadhaar Act, 2016 prohibiting private entities from employing authentication services was overturned. He claimed this amendment practically re-legislates what was ruled down.

Women own almost 50% of small manufacturing businesses

A survey found that 58% of manufacturing businesses were owned by women in 2023-24, up 4% from the previous year. The Annual Survey of Unincorporated Sector Enterprises (ASUSE) 2023-24 found that 28.1% of workers were women. More than one-third (33.7%) of OAES' workforce is female in OAES (owned a co-op enterprises). Female-owned businesses rose to 26.2% in 2023-24 from 22.9% in 9.7% to 14.2% in other services. Female workers comprised 18.5% of recruited workers. Female workers were

most prevalent in manufacturing (46.5%), followed by other services (22.5%) and trade. West Bengal has the most female workers (12.7%), followed by Uttar Pradesh (10.4%) and Maharashtra (9.7%) in ASUSE 2023-24. West Bengal and Maharashtra have the most rural and urban female workers, at 16% and 13%, respectively. Non-incorporated non-far establishments are not registered under the Companies Act 1956 or the 2013 Act.

Every fourth proprietary establishment in India was owned by a woman. Women run one-third of private businesses in Gujarat, Karnataka, Telangana, and West Bengal.



Health and wealth benefit from flexible work hours

Delhi: The Economic Survey supports allowing manufacturers to average legally capped working hours over three weeks or longer rather than week-by-week. Industry captains want larger hours. It claims that agile regulations will assist management satisfy production

demands and grow. "New Labour Laws are an improvement. With flexible legislation and competent implementation, firms may develop and create more jobs. They protect labor rights and boost wages," it stated. The Survey complained that labor laws like the

WhatsApp claims Israeli spyware Paragon targets users



Delhi: After the hack, WhatsApp issued Paragon a cease-and-desist letter. WhatsApp stated it "will continue to protect people's ability to communicate privately." Paragon wouldn't comment. WhatsApp officials reported a hacking attempt on 90 users. A number of civil society and media figures were targeted, although the official did not specify who or where. He said WhatsApp has stopped the hacking and was referring targets to Citizen Lab. Officials would not reveal how they determined

Paragon was responsible for the hack. He claimed law enforcement and industry partners were informed but declined to elaborate. Paragon sells high-end surveillance software to government clients, claiming it is essential to combating crime and defending national security. However, journalists, activists, opposition politicians, and at least 50 US officials have found surveillance capabilities on their phones, raising fears about the technology's unregulated expansion. Paragon, which was apparently acquired by Florida-based investment group AE Industrial Partners last month, has strived to identify as a responsible industry actor.

The local administration on Monday afternoon issued the prohibitory order in parts of the district, but the two sides held simultaneous protests defying the order, prompting authorities to impose curfew. The controversy is said to have begun when two youths, Haider Ansari and Amanat Ansari, uploaded a video on TikTok in Janakpur, Dhanusha. Locals claimed the video hurt religious sentiments and handed the youths over to the police. Tension had started to flare in ward 6 of Kamala Municipality after a mosque was vandalized.

Pak church ransacked after dispute

A church has been attacked by a group of Muslim men who ransacked it and desecrated the Bible in Punjab province of Pakistan, police said on Tuesday. The Feroz Din Memorial Church in Kot Radha Kishan, Kasur district, some 50 kms from Lahore, came under attack in early hours of Monday by a group of unidentified men. Police, however, claim to have arrested a prime suspect, Allah Rakha, and booked him under blasphemy and other charges. Rakha had a quarrel with some members of Christian community in the village over some issue, police officer Mohammad Essa said. "To vent his anger, he entered the church and ransacked it. Some Christian religious symbols and church property were damaged and the holy book of Christians was also desecrated," the police officer said.

No Venezuela elections in next 30 days, says Trump

WASHINGTON

US President Donald Trump said the United States is not at war with Venezuela and will not push for elections there in the near term, arguing that the country must first be stabilised and its infrastructure rebuilt following the capture of its leader, Nicolas Maduro.

In an exclusive interview with NBC News, Trump said Venezuela would not hold elections in the next 30 days. "We have to fix the country first," Trump said. "You can't have an election if people can't even vote."

Trump said Washington's focus is on restoring basic order and rebuilding the economy. "We have to nurse the country back to health," he said, indicating that the transition would take time.

The president said US oil companies could play a central role in rebuilding Venezuela's energy infrastructure, an effort he suggested could take less than 18 months.



Assange lawyer in Maduro team

WASHINGTON

The legal proceedings against captured Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro took a high-profile turn in a Manhattan federal court on Monday, as the embattled leader appeared with Barry Pollack as his private counsel.

A partner at the Wall Street-based firm Harris St. Laurent & Wechsler, Pollack is no stranger to complex, international litigation. His new client, whom the U.S. government has

WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange, a role that culminated in Assange's 2024 release from a UK prison. The choice of such a prominent defender signals a high-stakes legal battle as Maduro prepares to fight a litany of federal charges.

A partner at the Wall Street-based firm Harris St. Laurent & Wechsler, Pollack is no stranger to complex, international litigation. His new client, whom the U.S. government has

characterized as an "illegitimate president" and a "narco-terrorist," pleaded not guilty on Monday to several severe counts. These include drug-terrorism conspiracy, cocaine-importation conspiracy, and the illegal possession of machine guns and destructive devices. If convicted on these charges, the former Venezuelan leader faces a maximum sentence of life in prison.

Nobel winner Machado vows to return home, bats for polls

WASHINGTON

Venezuela's main opposition leader María Corina Machado has vowed to return home quickly, praising US President Donald Trump for toppling her enemy Nicolás Maduro and declaring her movement ready to win a free election.

Trump appears, however, to hope for now to work with interim President Delcy Rodriguez and other senior officials from Maduro's government, disappointing the



opposition and contributing to the nervousness gripping Venezuela.

"I'm planning to go back to Venezuela as soon as possible," said Machado, 58, an indus-

trial engineer and mother of three who escaped from Venezuela in disguise in October to receive the Nobel Peace Prize, which she dedicated to Trump.

Europe stands by Denmark as US prez eyes Greenland

BERLIN

Several European leaders pushed back Tuesday on US President Donald Trump's comments seeking an American takeover of Greenland.

The leaders issued a statement reaffirming the strategic, mineral-rich Arctic island "belongs to its people." The leaders of France, Germany, Italy, Poland, Spain and the United Kingdom joined Danish Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen in

After Maduro op, Rubio will lead US strategy in Caracas

WASHINGTON

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio has been designated by President Donald Trump to lead implementation of Washington's post-operation strategy in Venezuela, the White House said, outlining a whole-of-government effort that spans diplomatic, economic, financial, and military tools.

Stephen Miller, a close adviser to the president, told reporters at the White House on Monday that Rubio has been asked to enforce the president's guidance and coordinate across agencies.

"The President of the United States has asked Secretary Rubio to directly enforcement of the President's post guidance and direction to be the lead on this process," Miller said, adding that the work involves "energy policy, Treasury policy, financial policy, military policy."

Miller pointed to US control over key pressure points. "We have an oil embargo on Venezuela," he said. "For them to do any kind of commerce, they need our permission."

He also cited the continued US military posture in the region. "We have our massive

fleet, our Armada still present there," Miller said. "This is an active and ongoing US government military operation. So, of course, we set the terms and conditions."

Meanwhile, Secretary of State Marco Rubio and other top officials briefed leaders in Congress late Monday on the striking military operation in Venezuela amid mounting concerns that President Donald Trump is embarking on a new era of U.S. expansionism without consultation of lawmakers or a clear vision for running the South American country.

B'desh Hindu man killed, 2nd in 24 hrs

DHAKA

A 40-year-old Hindu man, who owned a grocery shop, has been murdered in Bangladesh's Narsingdi city after unidentified attackers struck him with a sharp weapon, media reports said on Tuesday. The killing on Monday night, fifth since December 18 and second in the past 24 hours, underscores a spate of violence targeting members of the minority community ahead of the polls next month.

The victim, Moni Chakraborty, was attacked at Charsindhur Bazar in Palash Upazila at 11pm on Monday, bdnews24 reported. Police and local residents said he was returning home after closing his shop when unidentified attackers struck him. He collapsed on the spot. Locals rushed him to a hospital, where doctors declared him dead. His body was later sent to the Narsingdi Sadar Hospital morgue for autopsy.

Police name 17 in Hadi killing chargesheet


